Man crushed at New Haven

A 31-year-old Ashland man was crushed to death Friday in a sanitation truck at New Haven Elementary school.

John William Lander was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. John V. Emery, deputy coroner of Huron county, after his body was removed from the vehicle.

One report is that the school custodian noticed Lander, said to be newly hired by the owners, Nelson Sanitation, Ashland, was overlong at his tasks. When the custodian investigated, he heard noises that indicated Lander was still alive, he having been snatched up head first into the dumpster of the vehicle. Police surmise that the apparatus became jammed and Lander sought to remove the obstruction without disengaging the power. Hav-

ing jarred the apparatus off, having removed the obstruction, Lander was drawn into it when it elevated.

Born in Martins Ferry, Lander lived in Ashland three years.

When some travel writer starts making lists of the great buildings of the world, there are always a handful that reappear and reappear, like St. Peter's in Rome, palaces scattered around the world, some tombs like the Taj Mahal and the great pyramid outside of Cairo. But they always leave one building out that should really be there. It is a fascinating place filled with good works of art, decorated with priceless crystal chandeliers. And if that is not enough, the fact that it has 435 rooms and covers 14 acres ought to put it right up on the top of any list of things in this world to see. It is our country's Capitol.

Some of the more fascinating rooms, however, an ordinary visitor will never see. They are the hide-a-ways, privately used by our senators and representatives to relax. One story has it that the late President Johnson managed to gather up seven rooms for his own use. These his friends referred to as the "Johnson Ranch East".

It was in another such room taken over by Sam Rayburn, who was then the speaker of the House, that Harry Truman was notified President Roosevelt had died and he was to be president. Rayburn and some of his buddies were sitting there sipping their favorite refreshment and telling stories.

Each room is so filled with the history of our country, and it would be a terrific bicentennial project to write the story of each of the little hide-a-ways, where probably most of the great decisions made in Congress actually began.

Maybe someone has already started such a book. I hope so.

It might even have some good recipes in it. The story goes that a senator from Louisiana used his little room as a kitchen to cook Creole dishes for friends.

One of the great Creole dishes is jambalaya and is a great way to use up leftovers like chicken and ham. It can be made with shrimp and kind of falls in the stew class, which every part of the world has so they can use bits of this and that.

This version can be partly cooked, then stashed away in the refrigerator and brought out again to finish cooking the rice.

First turn your oven on to 350 degrees. Then a skillet melt two tablespoons of whatever shortening you use. Add a cup each of finely chopped onion and green pepper and two minced cloves of garlic. Stir until the onion and pepper are tender. Add a cup of cooked chicken and ham with about a dozen small link pork sausages cut into pieces.

This is to cook for five minutes.

To all this add two and a half cups of undrained canned tomatoes, a cup of raw white rice, one and a half cups of chicken broth (you can make it with cubes, but make it double strength), a half of a teaspoon of thyme, a tablespoon of parsley, a fourth of a teaspoon each of

ground black pepper and chili powder and a teaspoon and a half of salt. All this goes into a fairly good sized casserole. Cover and bake until the rice is fully cooked, which should take about an hour and a half.

It can also be made on the top of the stove by using cooked rice.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HURON COUNTY, OHIO, APPROPRIATING AND INSTRUCTING THE CLERK OF SAID VILLAGE TO PAY TO ELISE ONEY, MARY BLUME, LULU BREEDLOVE, CHRISTINE BURKHALTER, MARIE GIBSON, ROBERT ONEY AND WILLIAM ONEY THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS AS AND FOR COMPENSATION FOR DAMAGES ARISING OUT OF THE TRESPASS OF ONE OF THE LANDS OF THE PLAINTIFFS SITUATED IN LOT NUMBERS 224, 225 AND 226 OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH AND AS DAMAGES FOR THE ALLEGED WRONGFUL REMOVAL OF CERTAIN PERSONAL PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE PLAINTIFFS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE AWARD OF THE BOARD OF ARBITRATORS SIGNED UNDER RULE OF COURT IN CASE NUMBER 25-196.

WHEREAS, Elise Oney, Mary Blume, Lulu Breedlove, Christine Burkhalter, Marie Gibson, Robert Oney and William Oney have instituted an action against the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, alleging that the Village and or its agents trespassed upon the property of the plaintiff to survey and render an appraisal; that the Village and or its employees wrongfully removed and trespassed upon stone and gravel pallets, snow fence, tile and miscellaneous other personal property belonging to the plaintiffs and caused damages to the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars.

WHEREAS, The said matter was heard by a majority of the Board of Arbitrators under Rule of Common Pleas Court, Richland County, Ohio, who heard all evidence on February 24, 1976.

WHEREAS, The Board of Arbitrators, after consideration of the evidence, awarded to plaintiffs the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and for total damage is the above case number 25-196.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO

Section 1. That there be hereby appropriated and the Clerk of said Village shall be and is hereby instructed to issue the draft in the amount of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars payable to the Clerk of said Court for distribution to Elise Oney, Mary Blume, Lulu Breedlove, Christine Burkhalter, Marie Gibson, Robert Oney and Samuel Oney.

Section 2. That said draft shall be forthwith transmitted to the Board of Arbitrators of the Common Pleas Court of Richland County, Ohio of Section 3. That this Ordinance is an emergency measure and it is necessary that the immediate preservation of public peace, safety and welfare and shall be placed into effect immediately upon its passage.

The reason for this emergency being that installation of a sanitary sewer line in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and through the property of Elise Oney and William Oney, deceased was necessary to carry away sewage and the damage generated by the inhabitants of the Village of Plymouth thereby protecting the health, happiness and general welfare of all the inhabitants of the Village of Plymouth. Passed this 26th day of March, 1976.
