Stiff drug, alcohol, tobacco penalties set for pupils

New regulations governing punishment of pupils who use alcohol or narcotics in school or at school functions or tobacco in school buildings were adopted by Plymouth Board of Education Monday night.

But not without stout objection by R. Harold Mack, former president of the board who stepped down in January. Mack said "I am opposed to a hard, fast rule . . . I wouldn't want to be responsible for a dropout . . . I am not in favor of generalizing . . . I don't want to present something to young people of the school that they may want to challenge because it's there."

He voted nay. David Howard abstained on the motion to adopt the new regulations. Under parliamentary rules, his vote had to be counted as yes, because abstentions must be counted with the majority.

Pupils may not possess, use, transmit or be under the influence of narcotics or alcohol on school grounds or at any school function. First offenders will be suspended from school for 10 days and may be recommended to the superintendent for expulsion. Second offenders will be suspended for 10 days and must be recommended for expulsion. Any evidence of drug use will be turned over to the police.

Pupils who smoke in school buildings will be suspended five days from class and all activities. Second offenders will be suspended 10 days and may be recommended for expulsion. Third offenders will be suspended for 10 days and must be recommended for expulsion. Pupils under suspension will be accorded a grade of zero for all scheduled work and may not participate or attend school or school-sponsored activities.

Parents or guardians of such pupils will be notified of suspension by telephone or mail.

Three assistant coaching jobs won't be filled until there is sufficient pupil participation to justify assignment of another coach. These are girls' softball and track and field, boys' assistant wrestling coach, and boys' junior high track and field coach.

News From The Household Shop

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Hardboiled eggs? Make curry of 'em!

Radio still amazes me, even though it has been so replaced with television watching. Somehow it is so much more versatile. There is a little something for everyone, it seems.
And what a terrific source of knowledge it can be.
One interesting tidbit I heard last week was really fascinating. Did you know that in 1898 in St. Louis, Mo., there were exactly two automobiles and they managed to have a collision?

Then I discovered why our kitchen plants seem to grow better than the others scattered through the house. I thought it was because of a higher amount of humidity generated by all the dish washing we seem to do. It's really not. It is because the little radio is blasting out nice music. I kind of think they like the new Johnny Cash song about Detroit's auto industry. It is a funny song, and unfortunately rather true. Right after the song came out, one station interviewed an auto employee and he told the story of how four wholly made cars vanished in one year despite all the controls there were to prevent such things.

Another thing about radio which is a real fun thing is wondering what the people look like, and it is just as well we do not know. It spoils all the guessing and can be kind of disappointing, too. THEN THERE ARE THE little mysteries of what happened to certain voices. One day they are on the air and the next

completely gone. Years ago a station had a particularly funny disc jockey who came on about midnight. In those days we stayed up much later than we do now and after a hardworking, lousy day it was a joy to listen to him. Then he vanished without a word. Years later we discovered why. He got tired one night and simply signed the station off the air and went home to bed. The management did not like it one bit. So this is National Hard-boiled Egg week. If it has not been declared so officially, I am now doing it.

You can pickle the little potlickers or devil them and there are /so many ways to do that. Everyone has his favorite way. There are egg salad sandwiches to make, which with a hearty soup make a nice supper.

This is a very cheap recipe, providing you already have six hardboiled eggs available to start with.
Chop up a smallish onion and a clove of garlic. Sauté the two in a fourth of a cup of butter. Then add one and a half tablespoons of curry powder, two teaspoons of tomato paste and a little less than one cup of water. Simmer this for about 10 minutes, then add a dash of salt and a little lemon juice. You have to taste it to see how much to put in.

To this add the six eggs, which are cut in half lengthwise, and serve on rice.
It's the topping that makes this tasty. Curries, and this is just that, should be served with little bowls of raisins, dried peanuts, coconut, chutney, grated orange rind

and chopped parsley.
This can be a real party dish by doing a little extra. Soak the raisins in a little brandy beforehand. This really perks them up.
Curries, because they are kind of hot to taste, should be served with cold beer which takes the hotness away. Some people really do not like them, but they are a great way to use up leftovers and bits of things.

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WHAT ARE YOUR CHANCES OF GETTING CREDIT?

7 Things That Can Hurt:



1. Always paying cash for everything. It's a good old American virtue, and as bankers we wouldn't knock it. But avoiding all use of credit hardly gives you a credit rating. Good move for a young adult, open a charge account at a department store. Buy only what you'd buy anyway, and pay those bills promptly.



2. Always owing a small loan company. Let's say Larry R. has a long, consistent record of getting loans. What's more, he never gets quoted away. He's always applying for a new loan before the old one is paid off. We hope he won't be too shocked if a bank like FNB is leery of giving him credit. This doesn't mean loan companies are nicer than banks. It means they can afford greater risks. Why? They normally charge higher rates and may require more security.



3. Borrowing all over town. You're better off to get your loans at one place where they know you. Better still, at the same bank where you have your checking and savings accounts. It pays to build a good, strong relationship with one place that can handle all your banking needs.

4. Not having any roots. FNB knows that people change careers and jobs more than in grandfather's day. And that they move around more. Still there is a difference between the constant job hopper and the employee who tends to stay awhile. Also, between the transient whose address is a P.O. box and the homeowner who's active in the PTA.

5. Being up to your neck in payments. It's normal in today's credit society to carry some debt. But how much is too much? We believe a typical family with two children shouldn't have monthly debt payments totaling more than 40% of their gross (before taxes) monthly income. That is, if their income is \$900 a month, or \$10,800 a year, these payments shouldn't exceed \$360 a month.



7. A goof-up in your credit rating. Computers and credit people can make damaging mistakes. If you believe you've been wrongly rated a bad credit risk, first ask your local credit bureau what your rating is. (If you know its name, look for the number in the White Pages of your phone book. If you don't, call one of the major credit-reporting agencies listed in the Yellow Pages.) If you believe your credit rating is incorrect, check into the law that can help you correct it.

7 Things That Can Help:

1. Opening a couple of bank accounts at the same bank. A checking and a savings account. Good management of your checking account helps show that you're a responsible person. And building a savings account shows an awareness of thrift.

2. Having a good "Three C's of Credit" rating. Banks often use this formula in rating an applicant: Character, Capacity and Collateral. Character refers to your personal traits — honesty, reliability, good judgment — shown on the job and in daily life. Capacity means income enough to pay off your debts. And Collateral: tangible assets like a home, a car, a Picasso, or securities.

3. Being a person. Not long ago, getting credit at some banks depended on your sex. Or marital status. Now, happily, the Equal Credit Opportunity Act bars such discrimination. At FNB we don't discriminate if you're a man or woman, married or single. Our policies are based on the belief that people are people. Period.

4. Getting your own name established. Nobody is eager to do business with a John (or Jane) Doe. To qualify for credit, you should establish a financial identity. By maintaining your own checking or savings account, for example, or getting some credit cards in your name. Perhaps by taking out and repaying a personal loan if needed.

5. Keeping in touch with creditors. They realize that customers can get sick, get fired, have sudden reverses. If that's the case, let them know; don't suffer in silence. Creditors are more likely to help if you call them before they call you. Sometimes they will charge payment dates on installment contracts. Or stretch out payments.

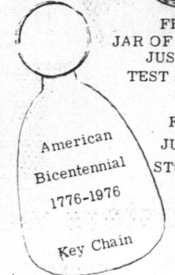

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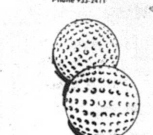
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
