Two plans to build considered

Plymouth Board of Education may consider at its May 10 seaston when its May 10 seaston whenh or to ask for approval of a bond issue to fund a \$1,1 million junior high school addition at Shiloh. Its architect, D. James Crawfis, Marr, Knapp & Crawfis, Marr, Knapp & Crawfis, Minsfield, submitted two proposals during a special meeting Apr. 20.

A lesser program of building would cost \$803, 000, Crawlis said. To fund the larger one, bonds would have to be approved by the electorate in the amount of \$875, 000. The bonds would be retired over 22 years at a cost of four new mills of taxation.

To fund the lessor progam, bonds in the amount of 5600,000 would be necessary. Settlement of these bonds over 22 years would require an additional tax of three mills. As Crawfis envisages the new south section with eight classification of all new south section with eight classification of all new south section with eight classification. A second phase of the program would entail the constant of the program would entail the program would be remodeded to much certain modern requirements.

When the program is complete, there would be one less room shan in the present structure.


