Holt named top pupil, Miss Dye second

Jeffrey Holt, with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.955, was the valedictorian of the Class of 1976, Plymouth High school, the 97th to be graduated since the first class received its diplomas in 1872.

Jackie Dye was salutatorian, with a grade-point average of 3.952.

There followed Sharon Steele, 3.929; Sue Shuty, 3.87; Daniel Edgeson, 3.86; Bradley J. Turson, 3.829; John Gullett, 3.823; Patricia Rettig, 3.675; Diana Nesbitt, 3.598; Sue Wade, 3.595; Terri Moorman, 3.566; Kathy Drake,

3.442, and Guy E. Flora, 3.434.

These 13 and 19 others achieved cumulative grade-point averages of 3.0 or higher.

The 19 include Cindy Earhart, Sue Kuppes, Lori DeVier, Dianne Hale, Constance Kamman, Kathy Cramer, Jody Chronister, Donna Niedermier, Bonnie Enderby, Charlene Thornberry, Ken Bisel, Rhonda Dean, Mary Tucker, W. Todd Root, Tim A. Arthur, Charles Hickner, Debra Kelley and Wade Spencer.

The standings were announced during the annual awards assembly for 12th graders Friday.

Forrest Bent won the art award, Flora the world history award. Flora also won the "I Dare You" award. So did Miss Shuty, who was given the John Philip Sousa award as outstanding musician.

Turson and Miss Kelley won the athletic prize. Carol Lou Vanderpool received the Betty Crocker prize, Ka la Fenner the Crisco award, Patricia Woodmansee the Home Economics council award.

Hamilton wins over Mumea

William G. Hamilton resisted an organization effort to oust him as party central committeeman in Tuesday's primary election.

He won reelection by Democrats in Precinct A, downing Adam L. Mumea, 31 to 28. There were 84 Democrats who voted.

It was the only genuine local contest on the ballot.

Meanwhile, efforts by southern Huron countians, including three veteran Norwalk township politicians and a newcomer, to wrest control of the courthouse at Norwalk from the Norwalk oriented branch of the Grand Old Party went down to defeat.

William Carabin, a Norwalk insurance man, easily won his party's nomination for the commonwealthership that begins Jan. 2. He polled 1,046 unofficial ballots. Joseph Sherman got 945, Otto Bauerle 828, Kenneth G. Salisbury 656, Gerald Fife 579, Norene J. Kenne 219.

For the other seat, a term starting Jan. 3, Roy

Palm polled 1,234 votes. Frank V. Smith, New Haven township trustee, got 900. Dale V. Stearns had 874. Bernard McClure drew 484, Marian Filip 454, Dale Imml 356.

Among Democrats, there was one surprise. Mrs. Jane Adelman, a Norwalk housewife making her first venture into politics, won the nomination for the Jan. 3 term by defeating James Setz, 1,159 to 1,151. Clayton Bick won the other nomination with 1,302 votes. James D. Schaffer drew 1,035.

RICHARD RENCH's contention that Huron county ought to be represented in the General Assembly won support by Republicans. They voted for him in the number of 1,940. Mrs. Marie Tansey drew 1,298, Andrew Ormeroy Jr. 525, William J. Krantz only 253. The Erie and Lorain county totals, expected to give Mrs. Tansey a substantial local plurality, were not available when the newspaper went to press.

There were no surprises among Richland county candidates.

Plymouth stone in monument

Workshops completed in 1967 to serve the B&O railroad through Lodi in Medina county have been named to the Register of Historical places.

The stone for the viaducts came from the quarry which is now part of the property owned by Mrs. John F. Stambaugh, East Main street.

Three bridges of three arches make up the system, one of which can be seen from Route 224 just a few miles west of Lodi. The other two are in the village.

Graves marked of 1776 soldiers

Spectral red, white and blue markers have been placed on the graves of two Revolutionary soldiers by Plymouth Garden Club and the Mansfield Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution.

Peter Ervin is buried in Ervin's Rest in a family plot which also includes his grandson, who died at Andersonville during the War of the Rebellion.

The second graves that of James Dickson in Opake cemetery, Opake road, between Route 6 and Springfield road. Research by the DAAR showed him also to be a veteran of the Revolution, which was not known until now.

Shelby Y soliciting locally

Support among Plymouth citizens for the new Shelby Y Community Center has resulted in the announcement today of a special two-week campaign in Plymouth.

The center will serve people in the Plymouth, New Washington and Shiloh areas.

Jerrold Harrington, the Fate, Root, Heath Co., is one of the campaign organizers. He invites Plymouth residents to join the momentum that's been started in Shelby.

Harrington said, "Contact me or the campaign office, 160-347-1211, if you would like to be involved. I've seen a great deal of interest in the pool, gym, exercise and meeting facilities. And the handball courts."

As of Tuesday, the goal of \$831,800 for Phase I construction, featuring the pool, was exceeded by \$137,000. Campaign management was applying itself to raise the remaining \$622,349 to fund the gymnasium and more health facilities.

How will village house vehicles if armory goes?

Because the village must vacate the armory premises shortly, provision must be made to house village vehicles.

Village Administrator Thomas F. Baker suggested a pole building be erected at the water plant site. Baker said it should measure at least 120 feet x 40 feet. He and Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., are to prepare specifications and the village will advertise for bids for the building.

Ambulance rates were raised by an emergency ordinance. Trips to either Shelby or Willard will now cost \$40; to Mansfield, Norwalk, Bucyrus, Crestline, Ashland or Galion, \$55; to Columbus or Cleveland, \$125.

Additional charges for oxygen and extraordinary expenses will be billed separately.

Formal approval was given to the use of per-

missive license tax money to pay for additional work in Park avenue and Walnut streets that is not the responsibility of the sewer contractor.

The total amount is \$4,058. The council had earlier approved improvements in Dix street totaling \$1,435.48. This leaves a balance in Norwalk in the permissive tax fund of \$3,466.52. The money may only be spent in Huron county.

The council approved the bid of Morton Salt Co., Wadsworth, to furnish salt for the water softening system.

Councilman agreed to look into the acquisition of a new billing machine that would be capable of including the fuel clause for electrical bills.

The newly acquired machine from the Fate Root-Heath Co. cannot be programmed to include the added figure, so it will

have to be computed by hand each month. Brumbach said it should only take about eight hours each month to do it.

Several complaints received by some of the council members last week, Jacobs said, the cemetery could have looked a little better. All agreed that it looked better this year than last year, even though Brumbach said three people told him they had to do their own trimming around stones.

Board to seek four mill levy to build SJHS

Board of education voted unanimously June 23 to seek a \$880,000 bond issue to pay for construction of a new junior high school in Shiloh.

Only the Rev. Arthur Hamman was absent.

The motion to seek the bond issue was made by one of the two dissenters of May 26, R. Harold Mack. And it was seconded by the other, David Howard.

Cost of the proposed bond issue, four mills of fresh taxation.

A simple majority of votes on Nov. 2 is required to pass the issue.

The proposed removal of existing buildings and construction of a new one at Shiloh will cost \$1.1 million. The board has "squeezed" about \$220,000.

A special meeting will be conducted June 23 to approve a bond resolution and to engage the Cleveland firm of Dquire, Sanders & Dempsey, attorneys, as bond counsel.

He is an 11th grader in Plymouth high school studying graphic arts in Pioneer Joint Vocational school.

They're only pork chops, but try Williamsburg way!

If your travel plans for a summer vacation this year include the Arctic circle or Siberia and not Williamsburg, Va., then you are really missing something.

Everyone who has been there comes home with nothing but good words and this cannot be said about most vacation spots. Usually someone can find something wrong with the most ideal place. Not only is it fascinating to see, it is plain beautiful, and you are simply transported back a couple of hundred years and can forget the hustle and bustle of the nearby freeway.

Probably next to Philadelphia this year, it will be the most favorite vacation spot in the country. The means it will be crowded, so maybe it is better you put your visit off for another year. But do not forget to go, especially if you have a young family. They should see it.

Williamsburg has eight restaurants, all supervised by one man who knows exactly what he is doing. He has to, because they expect to serve almost four million meals,

and every soul is going to want that meal perfect. Here are two of the recipes that will be regular fare on the menus. They make a really nice meal.

The first is pork chops with sweet potatoes. Peel, boil, then slice four medium size potatoes. (This is for four servings.)

Dredge four chops through flour that has been salted and peppered and brown on both sides. About now turn the oven on to 350 and grease a small casserole. Melt two tablespoons of butter, add a half cup each of orange juice and currant jelly, a tablespoon of lemon juice and the grated rind of one lemon, a teaspoon each of dry mustard and paprika and a half of a teaspoon of ground ginger. Stir this little mixture all up.

Arrange the potatoes and chops in the casserole

and pour the liquid mixture over, but save some for basting while it is baking in the oven at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes.

The other recipe is for creamed onions with peas. And what is so nice about both is that they can be stashed in the oven while you can visit with guests.

Boil some small white onions in salted water until tender. Drain. Meanwhile make a sauce by melting two tablespoons butter, add two of flour, some salt and pepper, stir quickly into a roux, then slowly add two cups of heated milk while stirring until it is smooth and thickish. You can add some nutmeg too, just take a your can and sprinkle it around, it gives an added flavor. Put the onions in a buttered casserole and pour

the cream sauce over them.

Top it all with a half cup each of buttered bread crumbs and chopped up salted peanuts. The topping is the big secret of a really ordinary dish which becomes rather glamorous.

With such a meal, you do not even need a dessert, but if you feel you do, then find some beautiful navel oranges, and slice them up with the skins on and serve them on a tray. It is a very refreshing way to end a meal.

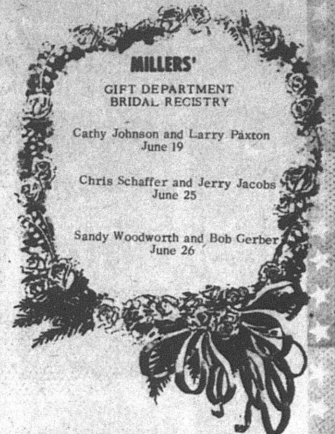
Cadet Hanline promoted again at Howe school

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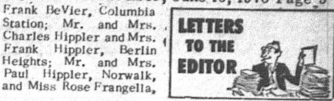

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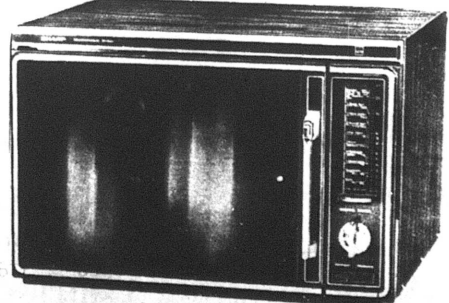
