

Shiloh's ox roast to start tomorrow

Biggest event in northern Richland county gets off the ground at Shiloh tomorrow when the firemen stage their annual ox roast, parade and festival.

About 9,000 persons are expected to attend if the weather cooperates. A bicentennial parade is set for Saturday evening. Firemen will sell roast beef Friday evening and all day Saturday.

Pupils of 4-H clubs are arranging a sweet corn roast. A pony pull will begin Saturday at 2 p. m. A 70-pound roasting pig will be given away in a drawing Saturday.

Car leaves road, eight injured

A one car mishap early Sunday morning sent eight youths to Willard Area hospital for treatment.

The car driven by Walter J. Tackett, 18, Plymouth, at a high rate of speed missed a curve in Route 224 east of Willard and skidded off the road for a distance of 250 feet, then back on the highway for 45 feet, off again for another 20 feet and then hit the house of Pamela J. Kuhn.

The impact knocked the porch off its foundation. Tackett and his passengers, Jack Green, 18; Robert Mulverson, 19; Lynn Conley, 19; Plymouth; Ann Wheeler, 16, Susan Lyons, 18, Jeanette Wheeler, 15, Shelby, and Brian Cole, 18, Willard, were taken to the hospital.

Tackett has been charged by the Ohio Highway Patrol with driving under the influence.

Stover freed on plea to mayor

Because the warrant charging him was served at his home on a minor, Walter Stover's plea through an attorney, John Baird, Norwalk, in mayor's court Friday afternoon was upheld by Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock and charges of a first degree misdemeanor against him were quashed.

Stover and two others, Ellis and Jimmy Beverly, were accused as the result of a fight in Weber's cafe July 17. The complainant was Mrs. Elaine F. Tackett.

The Beverlys pleaded not guilty and their cases were referred to Shelby Municipal court.

Bauerle spent \$841

Otto Bauerle, former Willard councilman who sought the GOP nomination for a county commissionership in the June 8 primary, spent \$841.24 in his unsuccessful campaign.

Frank Chapman, president of Willard United Bank gave \$25. Donald Burchin, Norwalk, gave \$20. And an anonymous donor left \$25 at Bauerle's place of business. He contributed the rest of the money from his pocket.

Gary McKinley, Willard, unopposed for the Democratic nomination for sheriff, appointed James H. Hinebaugh as his campaign treasurer. Hinebaugh swore in a report to the county board of elections he received contributions of \$110. There is a balance of 30 cents, the rest having been spent.

Clayton Bick, treasurer of the Democratic central committee, himself a candidate for a commissionership, reported a balance of \$1,122.94 at the beginning of the campaign, receipts of \$318.16 and disbursements of \$34.96, leaving a new balance of \$1,406.14.

His GOP counterpart, Paul R. Smith, reported a balance of \$2,954.57 at the beginning of the campaign, expenses of \$606.47, more than offset by contributions of \$1,505.26, leaving a new balance of \$3,853.36.

The contenders for Huron county prosecutor, Michael Fegen, running on the Republican ticket, and Richard Hauser the Democratic candidate, reported their finances.

Fegen's campaign manager says contributions totalled \$230 with no expenditures for the primary ballot. Hauser received \$160 and spent \$43.68 of that sum. His contributions come from William Zou, Holiday Lakes, who gave \$150 and Lindsey Smith, whose contribution was \$10.

MRS. M. JOAN DOUGLASS, the Mansfield Republican who seeks to return to the Ohio Assembly, reported she received contributions of \$2,805, including \$1,440 from her own pocket and \$500 each from former county GOP chairman Donald Timmer and Mrs. Timmer, and spent \$2,390, including \$1,400 to Barbara Teng, Mansfield, a campaign consultant.

Her opponent in November, Rep. Sherrod Brown, unopposed on the Democratic ticket, said he received \$1,071 in contributions, including \$500 from the Democratic executive committee and \$200 from the Brown family, and spent \$1,302.

Slagle loses class action vs. GenTelCo

Dismissal of a class action suit by Gene Slagle, Inc., Gallon, against General Telephone Co. of Ohio was ordered July 22 by the Lucas County Common Pleas court.

Slagle, a state senator (D-26, Gallon), sought about \$153 million in damages from General. He alleged the company illegally charged higher rates during a three-month period in 1972.

Robert M. Wopat, Maricopa president of General, said the basis for Senator Slagle's suit was removed when the Ohio Supreme Court on May 8 reversed a previous decision.

The Supreme Court, in its later ruling, said a utility could charge a

higher rate while its case was being appealed and remanded back to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio for further action, Wopat noted.

Wopat said General had appealed a 1971 rate hike. But after the Supreme Court remanded it to the PUCO for clarification, General continued to charge the higher rate. Judge John J. Connors, Jr., Lucas County Common Pleas court, ordered Senator Slagle's case dismissed. He acted on motion by General that the court lacked jurisdiction on utility rate matters.

Wopat said "we're happy to see the end of this case. We would have disliked to have it become a part of a political campaign."

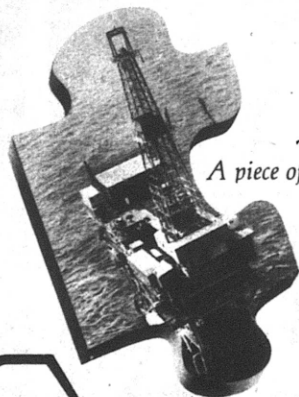

Undefeated, once tied -

Best team was in 1956

The coming football season marks the 20th anniversary of Plymouth's most successful, and only undefeated, all-but-once tied, team.

The 1956 aggregation won seven and tied one in an unbeaten season. It was coached by Lew Pettit, a young Ashland college graduate who taught physical education and coached all three sports - football, basketball and track and field, which was all the Pilgrims, as they were known, offered. His assistant was Robert Martin.

The Pilgrims opened with Green Springs and Eddie Taylor ran wild in a 45 to 0 rout. Taylor again scored heavily in a 49 to 0 trouncing of Ashland Reserves. Plymouth measured the Barbers of Seville with a strap and a razor in a 45 to 0 victory.

Came the big one, when Carroll B. (Snag) Sanders, who is now principal of Edison High school at Milan, brought his Berlin Hts. Tigers, led by Dewey Acord, to town. Each team scored a touchdown and an extra point in the first period and that was how it ended, although Acord and the Tigers were storming the Plymouth goal line when time ran out.

The doughty leader of the Pilgrims, Ray Einsel, now a promising bank executive in Cleveland, was ejected from the game in what seemed to be a staged argument and Plymouth's offense went to pieces.

Plymouth took Lodi, 42 to 0, walloped Westfield, 44 to 6, then stormed over Townsend-Wakeman, 24 to 0. That one clinched the North Central conference championship. There was one more game, at Burgoon, on a

murky November afternoon. The game was stopped for several minutes because hordes of starlings descended on the field at Burgoon, preventing play. But Plymouth prevailed, 62 to 0, as everybody but the water boy, now a professor at Bakersfield Cal., scored.

Who were some of the others on that vaunted eleven and what are they doing now?

Ted Fox, starter at left end, obtained his degree at Ohio State in horticulture and agronomy and is in business for himself at Shelby. John Elliott, starter at left tackle, is living in Michigan. Jim

Wasserman, the opener at left guard, took his medical degree and obtained certification as a psychiatrist. He lives in Arkansas. Franklin Eckstein, the center, is a lawyer living in Willard. Don Barnhouse, the watch charm right guard, married a local girl, lives in Plymouth township and works for the Fate-Root-Heath Co. Jim Jacobs, the right tackle, lives here and is employed by R. R. Donnelley & Sons Co., Willard. Jim Fidler, the right end, lives in New Haven and works in the shipping department of Fate-Root-Heath Co.

Taylor was one of two

brothers on the team. He lives in Mansfield, where he sells textbooks. His brother, Bill, a substitute, lives with his parents here. Jimmy Hunt, the right halfback, works for National Cash Register in Louisville, Ky. Duane Utis, the big fullback, lives in Mansfield. Others on that team

were Doug McQuate, a non-commissioned officer in the Marine Corps assigned to Okinawa; John Ganzhorn, who lives here and works in Mansfield; Dennis McGinnis, who's just opened a camper site at Shiloh; Dick Akers, an engineer living in Macedonia but working in Cleveland.

tection Agency has been yipping about for years, the Eaton Corp. has successfully experimented with a system that can be used away with all sewer lines. And the EPA likes it very much.

It was carried out at one of their office buildings in Willoughby, and was used for restroom wastes. But the recycled water has tested to be of drinking water quality.

It all empties into a special tank where the wastes are biologically consumed by an aerobic digester, it is stored in a tank and pumped back inside for reuse.

When the tank is filled to its capacity, an automatic sprinkling system gets going, and the grass is watered.

WHY DIDN'T WE ALL know about this sooner? We could be eating steak and lobster every night instead of dreaming up cheap dishes.

If you have onions and marigolds growing, this is nice. It is even nice if you must buy the onions and borrow a couple of marigolds from a neighbor.

bor. Cook about a pound and a half of small white onions until almost tender. Drain them and put into a buttered casserole.

In a small bowl mix together three tablespoons of melted butter, two tablespoons of soy sauce, two tablespoons of bread crumbs, one teaspoon of fresh parsley and one and a half tablespoons of chopped fresh marigold petals (bright red would look good with the white onions). Sprinkle over the onions and bake for about 10 minutes.

This is another combination that is not too easy to do, but it can be done if you have a green thumb and are a great success with violet plants.

Start with 24 medium size mushroom caps which you saute in butter and drain.

Fill them with this mixture: three fourths of a cup of sour cream, a teaspoon of lemon juice, two teaspoons of chopped chives and two of chopped violet blossoms.

To make it plain beautiful before serving, a violet can be placed in the center.

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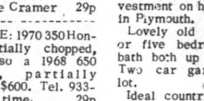
