Britons delighted with Buckeye state

Fair set at Norwalk Monday

Three Englishmen, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hogarth and Miss Joan Taylor, have returned to their home in Preston, Lancashire, after spending a month in Huron county.

The Englishmen stayed with Mrs. Sally Baldridge in Shelby. While here they attended the Shiloh ox roast with Mr. and Mrs. Ray Baldridge and were amazed at the way the meat was cooked.

In England the houses are brick and built close together with six foot brick fences in the back of each home. They marveled at the grass and observed that the houses are beautiful. They went to a French market in Columbus, toured the Kinwood Center in Mansfield and were impressed by the beauty of the flowers. They were amazed at the Richland Mall on how many buildings could be under one roof.

They said that food and clothing here are about the same price as in England but that cigarettes cost 45 pence or almost \$1 in England and that petrol or gas costs one pound or \$1.70 for an Imperial gallon of five quarts.

1,490 pupils expected Sept. 7

With 13 new teachers and an enrollment increase estimated to be about one per cent, Plymouth schools will open Sept. 7 for 1976-77 year.

The 13 new teachers will report for orientation Sept. 2. All teachers will report Sept. 3.

First prolonged recess will occur over the Thanksgiving holiday, which begins Nov. 24 at 3:15 p.m.

Annual Valedictorian recess begins Dec. 22 at 3:15 p.m. and ends Jan. 4 at 3:15 p.m.

Supt. John Fazzini anticipates enrollment will increase by about one per cent to 1,490 boys and girls, or thereabouts. One new administrator starts his career in the Plymouth system. He is a home grown product, Mary Sheely, a 1969 graduate of Plymouth High school who has just obtained a master's degree from the University of Akron.

He took his baccalaureate degree from Bluffton college in 1973 and taught at Lucas before joining the Plymouth system as sixth grade teacher in Shiloh. Of the 13 new teachers, three will be assigned to Plymouth Elementary school, in the first, fourth and fifth grades; four to the high school, in industrial arts, foreign languages, English and vocational home economics, and six to Shiloh, in third and sixth grades, kindergarten, in learning disabilities and two in educationally mentally retarded classes. Board of education will meet in regular session Monday at 7:30 p.m.

Hicks says he is harassed

George Hicks, who has requested access to his property via an alley rear of his premises, told the council children in his neighborhood are harassing him, probably because, he said he requested the opening of the alley. He was told by the mayor he can file charges against the juveniles. It was plain that Hicks wished the village to proceed promptly to pave an alley between Bell street and the alley running between Franklin street and West Broadway.

The mayor said the village is struggling to verify that this alley is indeed dedicated. Solicitor Robert A. McKown said "This is a matter between two attorneys and their clients, and the village should not be a part of it."

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock swore Richard Farmer as a member of the fire department. Payment to McDaniel Construction Co. for work already completed on the Beelman-Nichols street sewer line in the amount of \$32,388.17 was approved.

Payment to Eugene C. Gerken for engineering and inspection service for \$1,728 was also approved.

Councilman Toy Patton asked for approval to loan the cemetery fund \$1,000 from Revenue Sharing money until more tax money is forthcoming. This was approved.

Judge names county visitors at Norwalk

Appointment of new members of the board of Huron county visitors, some filling unexpired terms, is announced by Probate Judge Thomas E. Heydinger.

Charles F. Furey, Jr., Norwalk, will serve as president of the board for a term of two years.

Phyllis Bailey, New London, will be secretary of the board for a term of three years. Other members are Helen Ellis, Willard, for a term of two years; Walter H. Stapf, Bellevue, for a term of three years, and Marian Edwards, Norwalk, and James Seitz, Norwalk, both serving one year terms. The board serves as a citizens' watchdog over correctional and charitable institutions in the county, the duties of the board including the personal inspection of all such facilities in the county and reporting on conditions and management of these institutions to the probate court and the Department of Public Welfare in Columbus.

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10% pay raise given to village employees

A 10 per cent pay increase for most of the salaried and hourly employees of the village was approved by the council during a special meeting Monday night.

Although the ordinance was not officially adopted by the council because of numerous changes were made, it will be presented for formal adoption Tuesday night and will be retroactive to Aug. 8.

The village administrator's salary went from \$9,864.25 to \$10,850. At the suggestion of Councilman D. Douglas Brumback, reference to paying overtime was deleted.

During a heated discussion, Councilman Duane Keene said the administrator deserves to be paid overtime if it is necessary.

Mayor James L. Jacobs, Sr., said it should be "cut down."

Last year the administrator, Thomas F. Baker, received \$4,671.37 in overtime pay.

Brumback said "there should be some control" the village is "over the hump with sewer problems, the problem should not exist except in a dire emergency, such as occurred about a month ago when a tree fell in West High street, and village employees worked most of the night to repair the damaged electrical apparatus."

A compromise was reached when Baker and the council agreed that at each council meeting he will present his overtime with an explanation for approval.

This will also apply to salaried employees of the police department.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser will be paid \$9,445. He now receives \$8,585.

Class I patrolmen serving a probationary period will go from \$6,209 to \$6,830. Class II from \$7,598 to \$8,360 and Class III, part-time police, from \$2,775 to \$3,530 an hour.

Members of the fire department will be increased from \$2,900 an hour to \$3,200.

Kin of villager, Donald Wertz dies at Willard

Father of Gary Wertz, 115 Trux street, Donald J. Wertz, 45, Willard, died at his home there Friday. He went to Willard 25 years ago from Tiffin. A veteran of the Korean conflict, he was employed as maintenance expert by Midwest Industries, Inc., Willard.

He is also survived by a daughter, E. Veldean Gearhart, Martin, Ky.; his parents, the Orville Wertz, Bloomville route 1, two brothers, Roy and Alton, both of Bloomville; five sisters, Mrs. Eugene Fatzinger, Mrs. Paul Fatzinger and Mrs. Doni Zeiler, all of Bloomville; Mrs. Kenneth May and Mrs. Don May, both of Sycamore, and three grandchildren. Services were conducted at Willard Monday by the Rev. Charles Saltee. Burial was in Maple Grove cemetery, New Haven township.

Donald Vanderpool, chief of the ambulance service, told the council his department does not wish to be raised from its present rate of \$5 for a local run and \$2.80 an hour for longer runs. However, instead of a driver and one attendant on ambulance calls, there will be four certified attendants in the driver's one each run now as required by state law.

Vanderpool will continue to receive \$100 annually.

Class I employees in the utility department will be paid \$4.40 an hour, Class II \$4.10, Class III \$3.50, Class IV \$2.75 and Class V \$2.75.

The park custodian will continue to receive \$200 a month during the park season. Brumback said he discussed the raise with members of the park board and they wished the salary to remain the same because of lack of funds available.

The cemetery sexton will receive \$2,760 annually. The position is now held by Burton Forquer. That is all he is allowed to earn under social security regulations. Common labor will be paid \$2.65 an hour and student and part time help \$2.20.

All village employees will work a regular 40-hour week except the utility clerk, who works 35. That salary was increased to \$4,400.

That employee also serves as curbside bailiff, which will pay \$1 an hour for more than 10 hours of work a week.

Vacation pay, sick leave, hospitalization and paid holidays will remain the same as before.

Effective with the passage of the new ordinance, all village employees hired in the future will be required to reside within the village after a 30-day period following the completion of satisfactory probationary service. This does not affect present employees who live outside the corporate limits.

The proposed ordinance provides for a technical advisor to the water and sewerage departments, because none of the vil-

lage employees holds the required permits. Brumback, who served as the first administrator from 1968 to 1970, holds the certifications and he offered to do the reports required monthly by the Environmental Protection Agency on a volunteer basis, which would save the village \$1,200, which is being paid annually for the service.

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock said the offer was generous but suggested no decision be made until after a meeting being planned with the EPA, the village and Eugene C. Gerken, sanitary sewer engineer, within a few weeks.

She said she spoke to Gerken by telephone during the afternoon and he said that correctional improvements are necessary at the sewer lagoon site and that his newly hired employee is qualified in that field.

The second comment was why television is so important as the evening's entertainment in so many homes.

Could it be that we have become so lazy that reading a book or writing a letter is a great task? But, on the other hand, think of all the knitting, crocheting and needlepoint that is done when people settle down to watch a favorite program, so television watching is only half bad.

His last comment, I really do not agree about at all. She said, in derogation, that food is the focal point of all American social occasions.

It is, to a degree, and should be. Somewhere along the line we grew up with the idea that one always offered refreshment to anyone who entered one's home. Friends, let us say. There are some who come to our door that I would not even give a bare bone to.

It is hard for me to think that a European would make such a comment, because the ones we have known really out-did themselves and sometimes made us look kind of odd about what we produced for a tea or a dinner.

IF FOOD IS OUR BAD national habit, then we should happily develop a bad habit.

With cabbages developing in gardens, this is timely, and it is a Swedish recipe to boot.

Shred a smallish head, mix it with two mashed up bananas, about five table-spoons of mayonnaise, a teaspoon of lemon juice and a dash of salt. Chill well. With cold meat, this makes a supper for special friends.

Should you just ask some neighbors in for a beer or two, you can make it a very elaborate evening by serving little shrimp things.

First make up a batch of baby cream puffs.

Measure out a half cup of water and add a fourth of a cup of butter to it. Heat until the butter melts. Add a half cup of flour and stir until it is all mixed. Remove from stove and let it rest for five minutes while it cools. Then add two eggs, beating well after each one. The mixture

will be stiffish. Drop tea-spoons of it on a cookie sheet. Bake at 375 for at least 40 minutes or until you do not see any moisture on them.

This recipe doubles beautifully. There is, however, one big catch to it. It should not be made on a dark, cloudy day. You need bright sun-light.

When they are cooled, carefully cut partly through the middle, enough so you can get the stuffing in.

There are great varieties of stuffings made of shrimp, but about the easiest is simply to chop up some shrimp with onion, add mayonnaise mixed with a little curry.

These even go well with plain iced tea and this is a fine way to indulge in bad habits. You can even make larger cream puffs, fill them with ice cream, and pour hot chocolate sauce over them. That is a really impressive desert.
