Schools renew classes in religious education

By unanimous vote, Plymouth Board of Education Monday night approved renewal of released time religious instruction on a volunteer basis for pupils in grades one through six.

Paul Egner, North Richland County Council of Christian Education, made the request. James Cheatham will be the instructor.

Supt. John Fazzini told the board the proscriptions of the U. S. Supreme Court against such instruction remain in force. The board passed over what he said.

Procedural standards for the suspension and expulsion of pupils and conduct of pupils were adopted without dissent, to conform with new federal law guaranteeing due process to each pupil.

Daniel Humrichouser was hired as school bus driver, to succeed Cledith Lewis, who resigned.

David Howard was named principal delegate to the Ohio School Boards association capital conference, Mrs. Roger Pugh as alternate.

Pupil fees applicable last year were unchanged. Workbook fees for the new year were approved.

A policy governing free and reduced price lunches was adopted, to assure federal subsidy money.

When the board meets in special session Wednesday at 7 p. m., it will give final consideration to new rates for renting school premises. High school gymnasium fee advances \$1 to \$12. Old high school gymnasium advances \$1 to \$6. Junior high school and elementary school gymnasium fees advance \$2 to \$3. Fund-raising activities will now pay \$5 instead of \$1.

Non-civic organizations will pay \$35, up \$10. The board agreed that custodial help working in excess of eight hours a day to service rental of school premises will be paid at time-and-a-half, chargeable to the renter.

Pay raise action delayed by mistakes in ordinance

Because of errors in the proposed ordinance sent to Village council Tuesday night by Solicitor Robert A. McKown, it put off the emergency passage of it until it is corrected.

The ordinance will be retroactive to Aug. 8, giving village employees a 10 per cent raise, and will most likely be passed at the first meeting in September.

Pay bills will again be late this month because of the malfunctioning of the old billing machine. A representative of National Cash Register Co., who was to help the utility clerk learn to operate the new machine, did not return from her month's vacation until Monday. Billing was begun on Tuesday afternoon, with about 20 percent of bills made out, the new machine developed a mechanical problem.

The clerk, Miss Anita L. Riedinger, told the council NCR is sending

someone to repair it immediately.

The council took no action to extend the penalty for late payment because it did not know how long it may take to make any needed repairs.

Both Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock and Councilman Hubert V. Akers said the utility department would be much better off if a new machine had been purchased several years ago.

Councilman D. Douglas Brumbach said the rebuilt machine has a warranty so the village should have no problem.

Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., reported that catch basins are being cleaned. He suggested a new one be installed in Trux street. Village Administrator Thomas F. Baker said it would be of no use in a heavy rain.

Jacobs objected to dogs running loose early in the morning and ripping rubbish bags, which are put out to be collected. The mayor said she had also had serious complaints from residents in her neighborhood. Calling the dog warden did not help, she said, because by then the dogs were gone. She pointed out the village has an ordinance in effect that states village police may shoot any unmuzzled dog running in any village street, alley or grounds.

Even the non-dog owners among the council were not receptive to the

enforcement of this ordinance.

She said there is no fine involved in the ordinance and that in a nearby town, persons allowing their dogs to run loose are being fined \$100.

Numerous complaints of the pieces of metal in West Broadway, where the sewer line crosses the street, were received. Cars driving over them cause a large clatter. The contractor is to be asked to remove them as quickly as possible.

Baker is to ask a contractor to present at the next council meeting to discuss repairs to the water towers. Several years ago the village received an estimate of about \$20,000 for the work. It could not afford it, Baker has spoken with another, who told him the work could be done for about \$5,000. Jacobs said it has been put off for too long. Brumbach said the work would have to be advertised for bids. He said the last time repairs were made in 1972 it cost almost \$5,000 and they did not last for 15 days.

The mayor suggested the council give some thought to raising water rates for users outside the corporate limits. They now pay 10 per cent over the village rate, which was all that was allowed by the Ohio Revised Code when the raise was

Two operating levies to benefit Christie Lane school at Norwalk will appear on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Huron county commissioners approved Aug. 2 a resolution to request renewal of a four-tenths mill levy and a fresh four-tenths mill levy.

Each tax would raise about \$22,000 a year for 10 years.

Christie Lane school is operated by the Huron County Retardation board for handicapped children.

New plant for water suggested

How to cope with a water system that is too small to serve municipal needs occupied village council at Shiloh Aug. 11.

Problem: Capacity of the present waterworks is about 100 gallons a day. Consumption amounts to about 122,000 gallons a day.

Solution: A new building and equipment so that a 250,000-gallon capacity can be realized.

How to go about it: Richard Engineering, Mansfield, will prepare preliminary plans so that the new plant can be constructed in phases.

No action was taken on the resignations of two trustees of public affairs. The third, Everett Pace, has said he will not resign. The two, Robert Moore, chairman of the trustees, and James Blankenship, quit in a huff after criticism of the operation of the water system was leveled on Aug. 3 by Councilman Frank Cline.

Councilman Harry Foster said Joseph J. Cihla, former utilities superintendent, should be named as a trustee. Mrs. Kenneth Shafer agreed.

Since there are two resignations, McDonald said, there couldn't be a quorum for the meeting of Aug. 17 so he postponed it.

Huston asked the board to reduce the charge to a misdemeanor so that he could be tried in mayor's court.

He was told the matter is out of the board's hands, since neither the board nor the superintendent is the accuser.

Huston appeared Friday at a preliminary hearing in Norwalk. The court noted he was not represented by counsel. The case was continued and bond retained, presumably until Huston can retain counsel.

If it tragic that so little time was used on Monday to say goodbye to a man who gave the best years of his life to his community.

He was the first non-newspaper person we met in Plymouth when we got here in 1954. "This is a good town, better than some, worse than others," we remember him saying, "and if you keep your sense of humor and understand what you're doing, you'll get along all right."

He led by example. If he ever was depressed, he didn't show it. He held his convictions but he never jammed them down anybody's throat. He was understanding of one's faults and never horsewhipped anybody, that we ever know of, for having them.

He was a loving husband and a kind father. He was a good friend, generous with his time and his experience, loath to give advice even when it was asked for lest he give one to think he was trying to dominate.

We cannot recall a single instance, over the 24 years we knew him, that he ever turned us down when we asked for help.

If our friends and neighbors will say as much of us when our time comes, we shall have lived a good and full life.

E. B., we shall miss you, May God rest your soul.
