

Who'll get the free ride?

It may be a bit early to assess the arguments of the two protagonists who seek the highest office in the land on Nov. 2.

There is some doubt that the one nominee actually supports every plank in his party's platform. And it's unsure that the other is happy with his.

Nonetheless, it strikes us that there is, or ought to be, one overriding issue in the coming campaign. It is this: who'll get the free ride, and how much of a free ride will he get?

In a middle class community, there is nothing quite so nettlesome as to stand in line at the checkout counter while the preceding customer settles with food stamps his tab for items we can't see our way clear to afford.

Already, the courts have ruled that a move by the federal government to cut several millions of people from the food stamp rolls is not proper and have stayed the move by injunction.

In two counties in eastern Ohio, persons on welfare have banded together and filed suit against the county commissioners seeking to enjoin them from refusing to fund their welfare.

A woman down the street is divorced. She has seven kids. Her former husband is under court order to pay child support. He is many months in arrears. She won't turn a hand to compel him to do so. Why? "I'm on welfare and I get more from it than that no-good would pay me in child support." What's more, she protests that the welfare payment isn't enough to carry her through the month and for the last 10 days or so she must frequent low dives in search of male company who will pay for her favors. To her credit, she has of late kept to one man, who is no better nor worse than she is.

That her family is broken up is a great tragedy. But the fact is that she is getting a free ride.

To what extent shall society give free rides to those who failed to lay aside enough to cope with murderous inflation and must now depend upon all of us to keep the wolf from the door? How much of their real estate tax bill shall we forgive? How much of their utility bill shall we pay? How much of their medical and hospital bills shall we pay?

None of this is to say that we should not do something for all of these people. The problem is, how much? And for whom?

The whole question of social security benefits needs to be reexamined. When a married woman who has paid into the system for her whole working life is compelled to get a divorce and live in sin to qualify for the benefits she is entitled to, things have come to a pretty pass. Yet there are some who receive social security benefits who're free riders and they ought to be weeded out.

And the time is coming, if it has not already come, when every man Jack of us will think and think seriously whether we ought to go on giving so many free rides.

Free riders vote. And they vote for those who gave them the free ride. They make a special point of voting to do so. Which is why the politician breaks his neck to get to the buzzer to record his ballot for free rides. And then speeds equally fast to his office to dictate puff pieces to send to the folks back home about what he did.

Nor are these unfortunates the only ones getting free rides. There are those who can buy and sell most of us who benefit from free rides in the form of tax breaks. One reason why they can buy and sell us is that those breaks enabled them to evade otherwise legitimate taxes

It seems clear to us that the candidate who comes straight forward with a vigorous plan to reduce most of the free riders and eliminate some of them will earn at least two benefits: one, he'll be able to sleep with himself at night and two, he'll have our vote, for whatever it may be worth.

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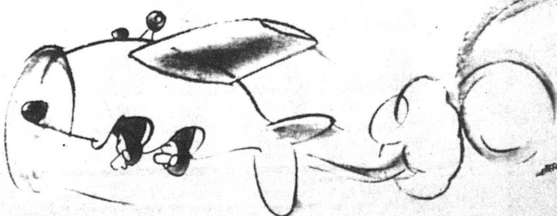


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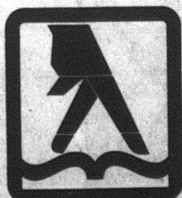

Can peasant eat as well as king?

Everyone must be traveling this year. Never have we seen so many different license plates, from one end of the country to the other, as we did last week in Route 80 in Pennsylvania.

And they were all playing games with the state patrol, within reason, I would say. Most of the cars and trucks were simply cruising at 65, and we have driven that road so many times when everyone whipped over it at 80.

It is really a beautiful drive and at 65 you can admire the trees and mountains really better than at 80.

It was also a happy ride until we got to the Delaware Water Gap and discovered that inflation has hit the toll bridge. There we were all ready with our dime to toss in the container to get over it, and there is a large sign that says "Passenger Cars 25¢". It just about ruined the day.

The next day was a great success, though. We visited a quaint little town on the Delaware river where the houses are built right up to the sidewalk and are about two feet wide. The houses for the most part had been converted into lovely little art, gift, antique, yarn, you name it - shops. It was interesting and plain historical, but it would have been a little better if the other 10,000 who decided to visit it had stayed home that day.

We literally collapsed into a very nice restaurant, and their prices were surprisingly low for what we had, dainty little shrimp sauteed in butter with lots of garlic and a George Washington potato. This I had never seen, eaten nor heard of before and our waiter had to explain it.

Peel elongated potatoes, slice them the long length, about half an inch thick, bake until just about done, then dip them for a few seconds in a deep fryer.

Another meal we had was slices of veal that had been sauteed in butter and had a gentle sauce of Madeira. This prompted me to dig out a cookbook and look up the recipe.

This also works on nice thin slices of roast beef and is a real company dish. Melt two tablespoons of butter in a skillet, add two tablespoons of finely minced scallops. Cook for five minutes, but do not let the butter brown.

Then add a cup and a half of brown sauce; you can use canned beef gravy and two tablespoons of lemon juice. Bring to a boil, add a fourth of a cup of Madeira wine and simmer for a few minutes.

EVERY DAY EATING can be tasty, too, and pure economical with ground beef dish, and most of the meal should be growing in your garden. Melt two tablespoons of shortening, slice a clove of garlic and add it, then remove it after a few minutes. You just want the flavor. Then brown a pound of ground beef. After that is done, add two cups of tomatoes and with the skins removed, natch, and two cups of whole kernel corn.

In another pan melt four tablespoons of butter, stir in five tablespoons of flour. When this is mixed, add it to the meat and stir until it boils. Then add a half teaspoon of brown sugar, some salt, a dash of paprika and either a fourth of a teaspoon of curry or chili powder, depending on which you like.

Put it all in a casserole, don't forget to grease it first, and cover it with pie crust or biscuits. Bake for about 20 minutes at 425 until the topping is done.

There is no reason that us peasants cannot eat like kings. It may be that it takes a little extra time, but it is worth it. And you can do so much more with some ground beef than with a large thick steak. That takes no imagination at all. It might help your

social position, but that is all. My favorite meal is still a good meat loaf, so I am a true peasant.

A Plymouth student in the college of law of Ohio State university is the co-author of a highly controversial piece in "Columbus Monthly", a magazine published in the state capital.

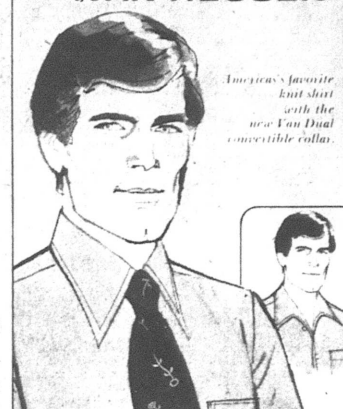
