Tragedy

One tragedy and a near tragedy within 30 days ought to remind us all that we cannot be too careful.

The death of a young husband and father who was serving his community in its hour of need might have been prevented with \$15 worth of seat belts. Note the words are "might have been". We'll never know. But it is always better to be safe than sorry. And the mayor did right in directing the safety forces under her jurisdiction and others who operate or ride in the front seat of a village vehicle to fasten the seat belts or explain why they didn't, under penalty of dismissal.

Another tragedy could have occurred in the village jail on Jan. 2.

The prisoner should not have been permitted to retain matches or to have access to them.

Here again, it is always better to be safe than sorry.

No prisoner should be permitted to have matches, and especially one whose sobriety was under question because he had been arrested for disorderly conduct. If in the judgment of the jailer a prisoner is sufficiently in command of himself as to be able to smoke safely, a light should be furnished him. But one light at a time, and certainly not in the prisoner's hands.

The veteran police chief here deserves better service than what was given. Injury to the prisoner, such as it was, and to the jailer, such as it was, have already cost the village some time, some equipment and some money. Damage to the jail has cost the village some time and some money.

Our police dollars are too hard to come by and too carefully husbanded by the chief to be wasted in such fashion.

Perhaps the chief had better place in a conspicuous position in the police headquarters a large sign that says "It's Always Better to Be Safe than Sorry".

We'll be happy to pay for its preparation and installation.

Auditor sets 1976 taxes at \$45.90

Although owners of real estate on the Huron county side of the village got a reappraisal of property this year, which was uniformly higher, and in some instances double, their tax rate will be lowered. During 1977, for the tax year 1976, they will pay at the rate of \$45.90, down from \$47.30.

Owners of real estate in Plymouth Local School district lying in unincorporated areas of New Haven township will pay at the rate of \$40.70.

Commissioner Maurice Smith said services are being cut with the change. The commissioners must adopt a formal resolution to legalize the change.

Present hours are 8:30 a. m. until 4 p. m. five days a week and 8:30 a. m. until noon on Saturdays.

Borgia wins first round over defeated opponent

Complaints by Sheriff John Borgia of Huron county that his Democratic opponent, Gary McKinley, violated clean electioneering practices were heard at Columbus Friday by the Ohio Elections commission.

Some of them were thrown out as "trivial", but not without adverse observations by some members.

One of them was referred to the prosecutor, Richard Hauser, who's also a Democrat.

Four other charges were referred to the commission's staff for further documentation before final action is taken.

The prosecutor will decide how to act on the charge forwarded to him.

McKinley falsely, the commission held, said he kept the election that Borgia was on the payroll of a Norwalk bar while he was serving as sheriff.

Borgia told the commission he was paid \$200 a year by a construction company that may have owned a bar and that he kept the bar's daily receipts in his office.

But at no time, he swore, was he paid by the bar or on its receipts.

The charges sent to the staff for more documentation:

1. That Borgia maintained a \$12,000 slush fund built up from proceeds of the annual sheriff's ball.

2. That McKinley misrepresented Huron county crime statistics in a political advertisement.

3. That Borgia employs only Republicans in his office, as stated by McKinley.

During the height of the storm Monday afternoon, several houses in Brooks court found themselves without electricity.

4. That McKinley falsely said two women are employed as cooks in the Huron county jail, whose kitchen is manned, the sheriff said, solely by his wife.

The charges dismissed as "trivial" are that McKinley misrepresented his qualifications to be sheriff and that he used misleading photographs

and endorsements during his campaign.

McKinley told the commission "I made some mistakes and the commission will have to judge accordingly. But this is Borgia's way of making sure no one runs against him and making people who do sorry they ever did."

The Redmen won their own tourney with 205. Wynford was third with 148. Buckeye Central scored 78 and Willard Reserve 55.

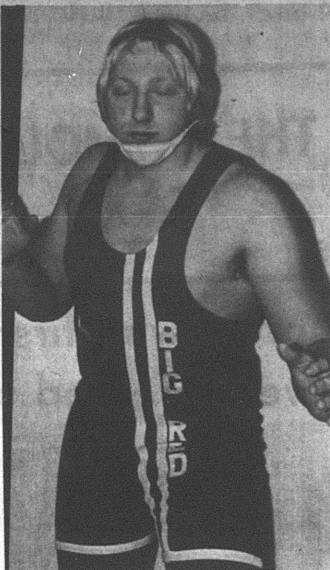
Second place finish won for the Big Red its first

Plymouth's defense broke down in the second half at Bellville Friday night and Clear Fork won its ninth straight from the Big Red, 79 to 72.

It was tied at 38 after 16 minutes. But then the Colts stormed the bucket and scored 22 points, largely because Plymouth didn't box out under its basket and because the Colts simply outbounced the Big Red. Overall, Clear Fork took down 47 rebounds, while limiting Plymouth to just 27.

Aside from the third quarter lapse, Plymouth gave Clear Fork all it bargained for, outscoring the Colts in the other 24 minutes.

Plymouth had the most trouble with Jay Guth, who scored 24 points. There were three other Colts in double figures, led by Brent Bennett with 16 and Kevin Welkie with 14. Randy Baker had 10.

Clear Fork put a remarkably poised freshman, Doug Ute, on the floor as a starter. He contributed eight points and played a good floor game.

Mike Weaver scored for the first time this season as he is capable of scoring, with 22 points. He bagged 16 of them in the second quarter. But it was his getting inside that

Clear Fork prevented after the half and that was what defeated Plymouth. Weaver was held to one bucket in the third quarter and to none in the fourth.

Mike Carry, whose head trouble keeping his spectacles together, netted 15 for the Big Red, the only other player in double figures.

Plymouth did not shoot all that badly. It was 26 of 54 from the floor. The Colts were 35 of 72. The Colts missed four of 13 free throws, Plymouth six of 26.

The Colts broke into a lead of two at 44 to 42 with just under five minutes left in the third period and never looked back. Their lead amounted to 10 points with 4:44 left in the game. They swelled that lead to 14 points before Plymouth came on to close the gap. But the outcome was never in doubt and the Plymouth coach showed that by clearing his bench early.

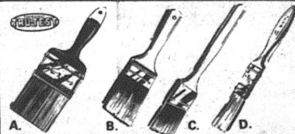

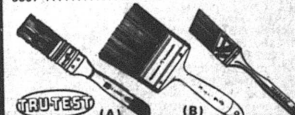

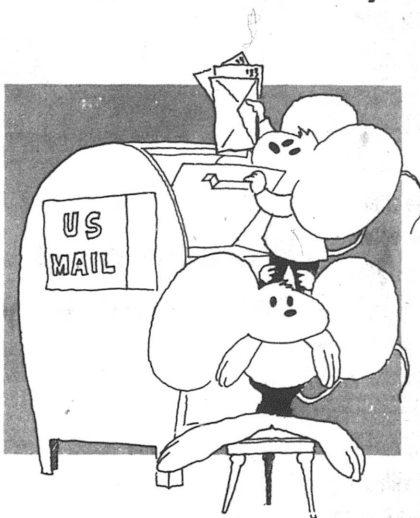

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Back jelly beans still with us!

We are really a nation of crises.

The funny part about it all is that people seem happier when we have them.

Secretly, I have always thought it was just being lazy. Let someone else dream it all up and do all the ground work. It saves a lot of thinking, which at times can be very time-consuming.

Thank heavens for those who do the thinking. The black jelly beans have been saved, which will certainly please many Easter rabbits.

Remember back in the days when a bag of jelly beans had maybe five black ones and everyone made a dive for them? Then progress came, and you could buy bags of all black ones.

Last summer the Food and Drug people decided that the black dye that everyone had been eating for years was bad, bad and worse. Some thing called carbon black was being used, but scientists have come up with something else that keeps those happy little jelly beans deliciously black.

At the same time it was found that the red dye for food coloring and maraschino cherries is also dangerous. There is nothing like a bright red cherry to perk up a fruit cup or half of a grapefruit.

This is what I would call a real crisis in the kitchen. If you are lucky enough to still have a jar in your cupboard, hoard that red gold for special times.

Our big gas shortage, contrary to what a lot of people say, seems to be really real and the coming spring will probably be the happiest one we have ever had.

We have been going around the house swathed in large afghans, which does make it a little hard to make kitchen things.

But when there is a Super Bowl game on, you have got to have a special treat.

It is not exactly a whole Sunday dinner, but very tasty to nibble on during a two hour period.

Mix together a pound of ground beef with a half cup of bread cubes (fresh ones, not dried) that have been soaked in a half cup of milk for a while. Then add some finely chopped onion, some salt and pepper. And one egg.

Shape the balls into little one-bite or two-bite sizes. Dip in a beaten egg, then dip into cornstarch. Sauté them until they are a nice color. Meanwhile, have a saucepan ready with this mixture: a little less than a cup of chili sauce and a half cup of grape jelly, add maybe a half cup of water, heat it until it simmers, then drop the meatballs in and simmer them until they are a little on the crusty side, which should take almost an hour.

This is a sweet and sour mixture. Actually, if you want this to be a real meal, skim the

fat off the sauce and add about a half cup of sour cream and serve on noodles.

George Hicks will be released to walk the streets with you and us unless enough concerned citi-

zens can show that he should not be released. We know of no one, including members of the Hicks family, that wants to see him released.

You can show your concern with us by writing a letter stating your cause or reasons why he should not be set free to the following people: David Lee, his social worker, Dr. Dillon, his psychiatrist, William McIntosh, his psychologist, and William Balson, the superintendent of Lima State Hospital. All have mailing addresses in care of Lima State Hospital, Lima, Ohio 45802.

We urge you to do this immediately. Thanks very much for helping us in the fight to keep George Hicks institutionalized.

Plymouth scored on nine of 15 shots and during the final 16 minutes the Big Red scored 37 points, 36 of them onfield goals, with 18 successes in 34 tries.

Had not the Mounties slipped away to such a big lead in the third half, when Plymouth called only one time out, the Big Red would have walked away with this one and kept a record of not having lost to a Firelands conference team this season. Plymouth leads that league.

Carty finished with 18 points. Greg Foster of the Mounties scored 20. Al Clark had 14. Each is an

exceptional shooter.

Early on, the Mounties used a simple three-and-two zone defense that Plymouth simply could not penetrate.

Indeed, the Big Red started so slowly that its handful of fans -- and there were fewer than 50 residents of the school district in the gymnasium -- all but despaired of its chances. Plymouth fired for field goal no less than 17 times in the first period and made just four. Its performance in the second period was much better, with six of 12.

Photographs used first in other local media will not be published.

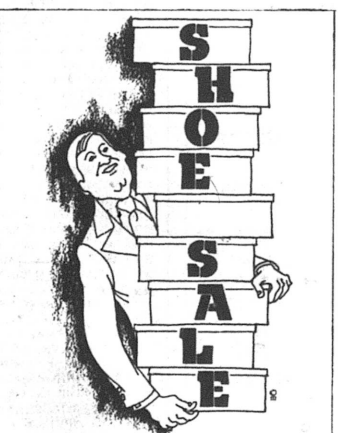
