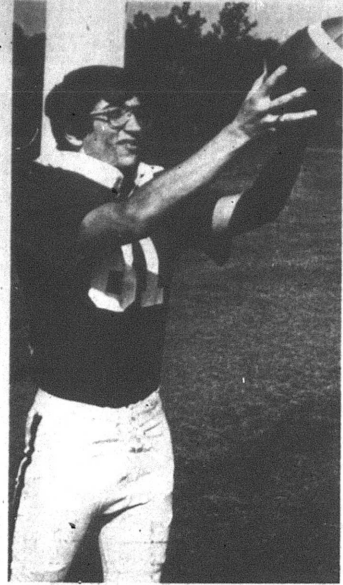

Police foil burglars

One suspect and a possible second one had to be released Saturday by Plymouth police for lack of evidence.

On Saturday at 2:40 a. m. a neighbor reported a car had dropped two persons at Mack's Foodland.

The police drove immediately and found the back door jimmied but not open and two persons attempting to open the front door.

These fled into a nearby field immediately.

The police were able to find the car with its driver

er from the description furnished by the neighbor. He was held until Saturday afternoon in the Plymouth jail.

Meanwhile, a friend brought the jailed man's wife to Plymouth from Mansfield, and the police said he fitted the description of one of the two who had fled.

Upon checking with the Huron county prosecutor, the local police were informed that charges could not be pressed since there was not enough concrete evidence.

Tirade ends council session

Village council on Nov. 1, dealt with some lesser matters, to which Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., and D. Douglas Brumbach contributed. So did Eugene C. Gerken, the sewer engineer.

Jacobs asked Gerken what happened to the village's request for federal funding for the rippapping of the sewer lagoons. The village's estimate of the work when initially sent in was about \$72,000, which fell under the classification by the federal government as "beautification."

Gerken said that before he had the time to update the costs, the funding had been turned over to counties, and suggested that the village seek of both Huron and Richland counties what funds they have available.

The village will advertise parts of village property for leasing to farmers since the present three year contract has expired.

Brumbach suggested the sewer lagoon land should be "porked" up with a new gate and that 40 feet from the roadside be reserved for landscaping. He thinks it is an eyesore.

The mayor said she has hopes of one day making the area into a park.

Two departments will meet soon with the well drilling company to determine what size well is to be installed, although they have suggested an eight inch one. First, the amount of water available is to be determined.

The village will pay Ohio Power Co. another month of service charges from the electric reserve fund, in order to catch up with payments due. At the moment the village is two months behind, with another bill forthcoming. Jacobs is still disturbed that former Village Administrator Thomas F. Baker has not returned a tool kit paid for by the village of just under \$100. He moved, with all council members agreeing, to file charges against Baker in Shelby Municipal court for its return or the market value paid.

As the mayor sought a motion to adjourn, Mrs. Brumbach rose to protest what she called "slander of her husband in The Advertiser and by the mayor." She said she is tired of "such going-on" and she used a word that is a commonplace almost everywhere save in the columns of this newspaper. The mayor said she is of the opinion that Brumbach is "mentally sick." Mrs. Brumbach promised she will continue to hang up when the mayor calls her in an inherited state.

A whopping rise in their tax bills come Jan. 1 and a whole new village council to deal with the problems of Plymouth are the results of Tuesday's general election.

The school building bond issue was approved handsily. It will cost \$4.51 for each \$1,000 for tax valuation. Two village levies were endorsed, a one mill tax benefit the cemetery, which won, 315 to 274, and a three mill tax to pay for a new fire apparatus, which was passed, 402 to 201. With incomplete returns, the school bonds apparently won handsily, over the objections of Plymouth voters, but not those in Plymouth township, 701 to 558.

Three incumbent councilmen were swept out of office. They finished eighth, ninth and 10th and dead last in the competition.

Successful candidates

are James C. Root, with 493 votes; Ervin Howard, with 326 ballots; David Howard, with 284 votes, and G. Thomas Moore, with 289 votes.

The Howards are the first brothers to serve simultaneously as councilmen in recorded history.

Others placed third: William C. Enderby, 186; Dean A. Cline, 190; James Fleck, 170; D. Douglas Brumbach, 159; V. Duane Keene, 145; John Ray, 110.

In the race for school board, incumbent Arthur Hamman outpaced the field with 726 ballots, unofficially. Don M. Eichelbarger scored 638, A. staff of the library and its branches has recommended to the board of trustees that the library officially be known as the Mansfield - Richland County Public Library. Trustees appointed by the judges are Mrs. Louis J. Ott, Mansfield; Joseph B. Polhemus, Mansfield, and Carolyn B. Studenmund, Belleville route 1.

All trustees serve seven year terms.

library district, formerly limited to the Mansfield school district, now includes all of Richland county except the Shelby school district, which receives its library service from the Marvin Memorial library in Shelby, and small portions of the county which receive their library service from the school district libraries of Ashland, Crestline and Loudonville. The residents of these four areas would not vote on levies or bond issues which the Mansfield-Richland County library might have placed on the ballot in the future.

Residents of these areas are, however, permitted to use the Mansfield-Richland County Public Library. Ohio public libraries are supported by the intangibles tax, a five percent tax on the dividends on stocks owned by individuals. This tax is collected on a county wide basis and a library is eligible to receive the proceeds if this tax only if it agreed to serve all residents of the county.

The library serves the county with the main library in Mansfield, a branchmobile serving the shopping centers in Mansfield, branches in Bellville, Plymouth, Lexington and Butler, and a bookmobile which serves villages and public schools in the county.

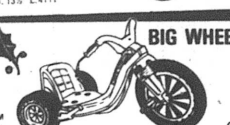

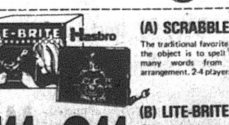

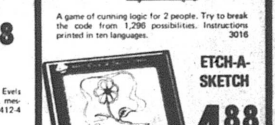

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Messer runs for 213 yards, 12 points, Red wins, 14 to 0

If there is a better Class A running back in Ohio than Mike Messer, you've got to prove it to his teammates and fans at Plymouth.

All the stocky 11th grader did Friday night was carry the ball 30 times for 213 yards and two touchdowns to lead Plymouth past archrival Crestview, 14 to 0, in Johnny Appleseed conference play.

Plymouth did not pass once, did not punt once, and did not fumble once, and refused to allow the Cougars to penetrate inside its nine yard line.

The Big Red had two possessions in the first half and scored with each one.

After Crestview reached the Plymouth 26 on its drive with the opening kickoff, Plymouth took over on downs. There began a 67-yard march that produced the first score in 18 plays. Messer squirted home from the five with a minute gone in the second period. He carried 11 times in the drive, gaining 55 of the 67 yards to the end zone.

Jim Wallace booted the PAT and Plymouth was ahead to stay.

CRESTVIEW COULDN'T get past the Red 47 with the ensuing kickoff and Brian Osborne punted deep to the Red three, where Marty McKenzie fielded it and got back to the 12. It was the only punt of the game, and a dandy that carried 44 yards.

Plymouth set out to score again and did so with 150 left in the half. Messer ran the last 23 yards with his 18th carry of the night.

By the time he was through for the evening — Coach Mike McFarren lifted him with less than a minute to play so he could get the plaudits of the

relative handful who turned out to see this one — Messer had gained 1,073 yards for the season. No back in Plymouth history, or since Illinois football was reestablished in 1948, has gone over 1,000 yards.

During the second drive, Messer carried seven times for 42 yards. Wallace was compelled to kick from the seven but he got it through the uprights and that was the end of the scoring.

At halftime, Plymouth was farther ahead than the scoreboard showed. Crestview had four first downs with 22 plays, having gained 34 yards on the ground and 53 through the air, on four completions in seven tries. The Cougars had been penalized three times for 35 yards.

Plymouth, meanwhile, with 30 plays, had made 12 first downs, with 155 yards rushing.

THE SECOND HALF was a seesaw battle of defenses.

Plymouth had its chances but could not apply the crusher. Penalties in the early going cost the Big Red 35 yards. Nevertheless, Plymouth reached the Crestview 30 before running out of downs in the first series.

Mckenzie intercepted a Cougar pass by the ace quarterback, Terry Chronister, at the Red 11 to stop a Crestview drive in the next series.

Only a miraculous tackle by Terry Tash against the Cougars' supreme running back, Tony Crank, saved Plymouth from a touchdown. Crank gained 35 yards with the play, which came on first down from his 30.

Plymouth showed signs of going to the air for the only time of the night at the end of the next series.

Mike Berberick, earlier shaken up and his glasses knocked off when tackled after a rollout, returned to his post and on fourth down made as if to pass. But he either slipped or was compelled to eat the

ball and took a seven yard loss to the Crestview 42.

Crestview struck back, determined to score. Wallace intercepted a Cougar pass at the Plymouth 19 when Crestview

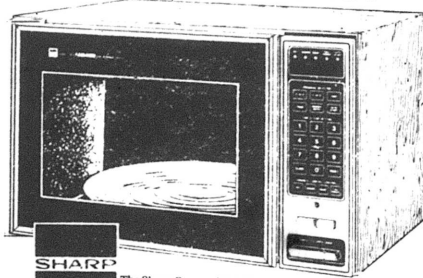
