Worst autumnal snow since '45 swats village, clogs highways

Heaviest autumnal snowfall since World War II struck Plymouth Thursday.

It came on top of four inches already covering the ground. By Sunday night, the depth in some places was 10 inches.

Schools were closed Friday. The basketball game set here with Loudonville Friday night was postponed. It will be played here Tuesday. The basketball game here with Mapleton set for Saturday night was called off. It will be played later, when a mutually agreeable date can be settled upon.

Route 61 to Shelby was all but closed during the height of the storm. Visibility was poor when the lashing winds were at their highest velocity, estimated at Lahm airport Mansfield, to be 45 miles an hour. The curve at the stock farm was down to a single, and very narrow, lane, with visibility at near zero.

Route 61 to the north was impacted with snow. State highway salt spreaders no longer allow salt to fall over Route 61 within the corporate limits. Even so, it was beyond the corporate limits that driving was treacherous, notably opposite the village sewer lagoon site.

Route 224 east to Green- was passable but barely so. To the west, save for constructions east of the railroad crossing, it was more so. Village crews worked all night Thursday until Friday at 5:30 a. m. to plow streets. They did not get to alleys until Saturday, when the mayor counted on an earlier order by another and in-

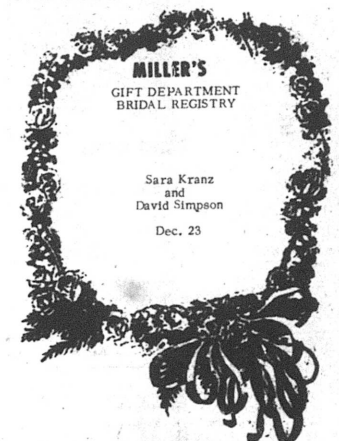

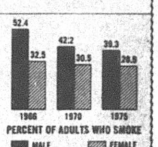
