The printed word still best bargain in town

David Wisner, 13, Lexington, found this receipt issued nearly 50 years ago by George Reed, editor of The Advertiser, in the belongings of his grandfather, Robert L. McIntire, 70 Plymouth street.

The receipt, for a year's subscription, is for \$1 in coin of the Republic.

The present rate, for persons living in Huron, Richland and Crawford counties, is \$6 a year, an increase of 600 per cent.

Readers may wish to compare the change in rate or price since then of some every day commodities, such as: hourly labor, 30 times, or 3,000 per cent; a pound of beef, 16 times, or 1,600 per cent; a man's suit, 15 times, or 1,500 per cent; a pair of shoes, 15 times, or 1,500 per cent.

The circulation department of The Advertiser relies on these data to support its conclusion that the printed word, in Plymouth, at least, is still the best bargain of the century.

No alley, arbitrators decide

Judgment for plaintiffs, Mrs. George W. Cheesman, Hubert V. Akers and Eric Heden, against the Village of Plymouth was returned Jan. 31 by three arbitrators assigned by Richland county common pleas court.

Plaintiffs sought to compel the village not to open a 12-foot alley lying between Lots 257, 258 and 259 at the north and Lot 243 at the south, so that George Hicks could obtain access to the rear of his property in West Broadway.

The arbitrators, Thomas J. McDermott, chairman; Carl Swadener and Claude F. Ewing, found no alley had ever been dedicated to public use. The case was heard at Mansfield Jan. 24.

Schools reopened; water supply cut

Plymouth schools reopened yesterday, faced with two crises: no heat and no water.

Board of education agreed in special session Monday afternoon to Supt. John Fazzini's recommendation to reopen today.

But Member David A. Howard, fresh from a conference among state officials, gas supply experts and school authorities at Columbus, told the board he is "confident" Columbia Gas will request the extension of the curtailment, and then another, and then another, so that schools may not reopen before the middle of March.

Fazzini was notified by Columbia Gas Tuesday that allocations are restored and schools may reopen.

If Columbia Gas doesn't ask for an extension of curtailment, another crisis will loom on Monday.

All schools in the district will have exhausted their allotment of natural gas. "The procedure is," Fazzini said, that the gas company reads the meter, finds that the usage is over the allotment, allows three days, then sends a telegram ordering the user to desist. Five days later, gas supplies are simply cut off.

Monday is also the last day during which local schools may be closed without violating the state law on energy closing and calamity suspension. A total of 15 days of the former and five days of the latter will have been used by Monday.

Plans are to solicit from the state department of education a clarification of which days shall be assigned to each category later in the school year. Chief concern of the board Monday was that

12th graders will be afforded the opportunity to complete all required work in time to graduate on the appointed day and to meet state requirements. Plans are to use the elementary school at Plymouth, the only building that has not so far exhausted its allocation of gas, as the site for classes for 12th graders in such subjects as English, physics and mathematics.

Teachers were summoned Tuesday to report yesterday with lesson plans for one week. Whether to equip buildings to utilize an alternate fuel will be studied later. It's the high school where we need it the most," Fazzini said, "and that's the place where the problems will be the most difficult, because we will need another boiler and we don't now have any room for one."

Fazzini counseled against Saturday sessions now or later on. "The experience is," he insisted, "that only about 30 per cent of the pupils report for classes and the teachers simply waste their time, because with two-thirds of the class absent, the teacher has to go over what he's done on Saturday during the next session on Monday."

Whether the district will opt for an extension of the school year, or the convening of classes on legal holidays, such as Presidents' day, during the Easter recess, Memorial day and on Saturdays, will not be decided on the basis of whether it's expensive to do so because teachers must be paid extra. "We are determined," Fazzini said, "that whatever we do will be for the most good for the pupils, and if it costs us money and we have to

take from what we've saved, then that's too bad, it simply has to be done."

Cafeterias are operating with paper plates so that no water is needed for washing. High school pupils are forbidden from taking showers. Water will be trucked to flush urinals and toilets.

The basketball game here Saturday with Ontario will operate under the no shower rule.

Objections by the Village of Plymouth to the issuance of a liquor license to Sandusky Ward, 311 Sandusky street, were held by the Department of Liquor Control to be "not sufficient in law to result in the rejection of this application."

Accordingly, the license will issue.

Whys and wherefores of water shortage

Village Administrator Thomas F. Baker reported Monday that after a long and tedious weekend, pressure built up in the water tower so that service to all homes where water lines were unfrozen was restored.

Norstat, Inc., and the Fate-Root-Heath Co. resumed their work schedules.

Why did the water pressure drop?

"There were two reasons," Baker said Monday. "First, we found three breaks in mainlines south of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. and we didn't get them fixed until late on Feb. 1. Second, by this time all the water we had stored was used up -- we can store almost a full day's supply -- and we weren't pumping from No. 4 well at the rate that is normal, so we couldn't catch up with what we lost and what the people were using as fast as we could get it pumped. On Saturday and Sunday, everybody, it seemed, began to use water like it was going out of style and we couldn't build up enough to keep even with the demand. After sundown on Sunday, when water de-

mand dropped off, and with a good night of pumping with all pumps, by Monday morning we had a fifth of the storage built up."

Is the water safe to drink?

"Sure it's safe to drink. But to make sure, we called the Huron county health department to make some tests."

There were some rumors that sewerage flowed into the drinking water. What about these?

"Whoever said that ought to be horsewhipped. There never was any of that. There were times when we didn't treat the water as normally, because we couldn't build up enough in the water plant to do it, but it has always been free of sewerage. For two days we urged everybody to boil the water before drinking to be on the safe side."

Are there any other water leakages? "We don't think so, but maybe under all this snow there is a leak that we can't see."

What about the capacities of the wells? "We have had an expert in here from Mansfield, a man who has

drilled in our well field before, and we are investigating the possibility of putting down a 12-inch shaft next to No. 4 well so that we will have a pipe that's twice the diameter of the present casing and therefore have four times the capacity."

Are we at full service now?

"No, we are not. And for this reason I've asked some places to simply close up, like the American Legion dance on Feb. 8 and the firemen's dance on Saturday. And I've told the schools that we simply can't stand the demand of water of the high school and the elementary school this week. Since 1970, the production of our wells has been steadily going down. The council in 1970 got into it a little bit but then it dropped it. We'd like to acidize one or two wells to see if we can't get more production from them but we can't afford that down time."

What will the schools do?

"Mr. Fazzini tells me that if necessary they'll have to turn in here to flush the toilets."

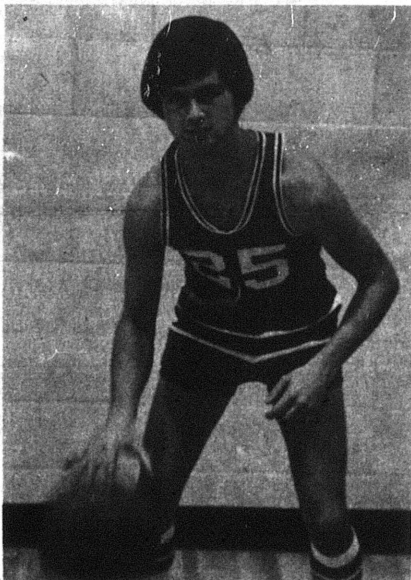

Population up by 280

Births exceeded deaths in Huron county during 1976 by 280, the department of health reports. Births were 10 fewer than during 1975 and deaths were 55 more than in 1975.

Births occurred chiefly in the county seat, Norwalk, which has the largest hospital. A total of 416 was born there. There were 290 born at Willard and there was one born elsewhere.

Deaths also occurred chiefly in Norwalk, 231 of them. There were 115 at Willard and 81 elsewhere. Male deaths numbered 249, female 178. Male births numbered 376, female births 337.

Chief cause of death was cardiovascular disease, 266. Other causes: cancer, 37; respiratory disease, 39; accidents, 21; homicides and suicides, four; disease of early infancy, one; other causes, 39.

There was one death of a centenarian. There were five deaths of residents under 10, nine of residents 10 to 19, five of residents 20 to 29, 10 of persons 30 to 39, 20 of persons 40 to 49, 31 of persons 50 to 59, 75 of persons 60 to 69, 103 of persons 70 to 79, 136 of persons 80 to 89, 32 of persons 90 to 99.

PEOPLE ARE STILL getting there, I guess. Still today in our highly civilized world, we still hunt down and try to abolish prey. Translated into today's language, it means those we do not like. At least we are past the stage of great animals trying to devour us. Now we merely deal with people who want to do this.

People are really silly, but then we are all people. Beat you just forget them all. Let them do their evil, which they will do anyway, so hole up in your kitchen and wait for them to attack.

Make this recipe and do not give those characters one bite. They do not deserve it. This is for friendly friends, the good

guys. The others can have bread and water without the bread. That is getting to be a real luxury.

These should be eaten when they are really warm, so when a neighbor calls up to see what you are doing and broadly hints she would like to whip over for a short visit, tell her to wait maybe a half hour. Then whip into your kitchen and get everything out. You need one and three fourths cups of regular flour, three teaspoons of baking powder, a tablespoon of sugar and a half teaspoon of salt.

This is the beginning of making scones, which the Scotch people love so much.

Into these dry things,

you mix in four tablespoons of butter (and I would recommend the real thing for this), blend it all in like you do with pie dough, then add two beaten eggs, but hang on to two tablespoons of the eggs, which are to be added to a third of a cup of real cream.

Make a hole in the mid-

dle of the dry ingredients in their bowl. Then pour the liquid stuff in and mix as quickly as you can. Then get it to a floured bread board and pat it until it is about three fourths of an inch thick. Take a good sharp knife and cut it into squares or diamond shapes.

Put on a greased cookie

sheet and brush the top with the egg mixture you saved and sprinkle a little sugar on top, either white or brown.

They bake at 450 degrees for about 15 minutes, so time the visits and have a teapot going. Scones go with tea, not coffee, for some dumb reason.

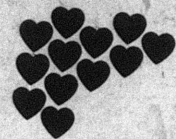

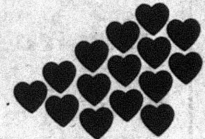

What to do if the gas goes off...

The coldest winter in more than a hundred years has caused massive use of gas and more winter lies ahead with its continued threat of additional extremely cold weather. Columbia Gas is doing everything it can to prevent the loss of gas service to residential customers. However, since a gas outage is a possibility, here are the things you should do in that event.

1. Turn off the valves ahead of each gas appliance if possible.
2. Turn off the gas shutoff valve immediately ahead of the gas meter.
3. Use all auxiliary methods of heating such as electric heaters, fireplaces, etc.
4. If there is a possibility of freezing, drain all water lines. To do this, turn off the water supply valve for the house, and open all faucets and drain water heater, leaving drain valve open at bottom of heater.
5. Take precautions so any standing water in drain lines or bathroom fixtures will not freeze.
6. Drain hot water or steam-heating equipment.
7. Stay at home, but if you must leave your home, provide entrance for the gas man who must have access to the meter and appliances. Leave a note on the front door or gas meter, telling him where you can be reached, so that gas service can be restored to your home as soon as possible.
8. Help your neighbors. If a neighbor is unable to turn off his gas or does not have the tools, give him a hand. The Gas Company may be unable to respond promptly to each individual request.
9. Call the Gas Company only if the odor of gas is detected and you are unable to turn off the main gas valve, or if gas is detected outside the home.
10. Stay tuned to your nearest radio or television station for up-to-the-minute information on the situation.

Keep this information available for handy reference. Additional copies are available at your local Columbia Gas office.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CLERK OF SAID VILLAGE TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH BACON CHEVROLET OF GREENWICH, OHIO, FOR THE ACQUISITION OF A 1976 CHEVROLET CHASSIS AND CAB (CE 66403) FOR THE TOTAL SUM OF \$8,146.00, TAX, TITLE AND DELIVER TO PLYMOUTH, OHIO, INCLUDED IN SAID AMOUNT AND TO AUTHORIZE THE CLERK - TREASURER OF SAID VILLAGE TO ISSUE A VILLAGE DRAFT UPON THE FIRE RESERVE FUND OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH IN THE AFORESAID AMOUNT AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS: The Water Tank previously owned by the Village of Plymouth and used by the Village Volunteer Fire Department to transport water for use in connection with the fighting of fires, was irreparably damaged in an unfortunate accident which recently occurred while said vehicle was engaged in and official fire department business and fire fighting activities.

WHEREAS: The Fire Department of the Village of Plymouth is presently without adequate facilities and equipment to transport water to areas not having available water supply for fire fighting purposes.

WHEREAS: The Village of Plymouth is obligated by contract to render fire fighting services to portions of Richland County, Huron County and has a duty to protect the homes and lives of the inhabitants of the Village of Plymouth and to honor reciprocal fire fighting commitments to surrounding cities, villages and townships.

WHEREAS: The Council of the Village of Plymouth, because of the exigent circumstances and possibility of great loss of life and property, finds that a bonafide emergency does exist and that the Village should forthwith acquire a chassis and cab and to place the same into service without formality of bidding as normally required by law.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, HURON AND RICHLAND COUNTIES, OHIO, FOUR-FIFTHS OF THE MEMBERS CONCURRING THEREIN.
Section 1: That the Mayor and Clerk of said Village shall be and are hereby authorized to enter into a contract with Bacon Chevrolet, Greenwich, Ohio, for the immediate

delivery of a 1976 Chevrolet chassis and cab (CE 66403) for the sum of \$8,146.00, tax, title and delivery to Plymouth, Ohio, included.
Section 2: That the Clerk shall be and is hereby authorized to issue a draft from the Fire Reserve Fund of said Village in the aforesaid amount of delivery of the vehicle to the Village of Plymouth, and upon receipt of an Ohio Motor Vehicle title to said Chevrolet chassis and cab.
Section 3: That the Clerk shall immediately, upon receipt of title to said vehicle shall notify the Village insurance carrier and cause said vehicle to be fully insured in the amount of the purchase price plus the value of any additions, attachments or customizations.
