Colts victor over Red

Plymouth held Clear Fork even for most of the game here Tuesday night, whereupon the Colts strung together 12 unanswered points and walked off with an 80 to 69 victory.

It was the second time this season Clear Fork has beaten Plymouth. The Big Red led for the first period and trailed by only two at the half. The lead was just three going into the final eight minutes. Plymouth was to close the gap to one but could not come closer. Behind by three at 61 to 58, the Big Red called time with 4:36 on the clock. Whatever the Plymouth coach did or said, it served no purpose. Because Clear Fork went to work and with baskets by Doug Ute, Jay Guth and Brent Bennett and four free throws, promptly blew Plymouth all but off the floor.

Plymouth shot well enough to win a dozen games and indeed matched the Colts shot for shot from the field. It was at the foul line that Plymouth was beaten. Clear Fork canned 16 of 22 tries, Plymouth five of 15.

Mike Weaver fouled out for the Big Red, which had five players in double figures, including Weaver with 11. Mike Carry and Jay Haver had 10 apiece. Holly Tuttle 12, Blane Baker 15.

Darryl Jones led all scorers with 22. Guth contributed 17 and Bennett and Ute 14 each. It was a ragged game. Although Plymouth took down 34 rebounds, its turnover rate was tremendous: 27 in the entire game. The Colts were charged with 17.

Mayor refuses to resign, despite six votes to do so

Councilman Duane Keene, acting as spokesman for the other five councilmen, chastised the mayor with vigor Tuesday night for laxity in collecting fines and by motion asked for her resignation, to which all the council agreed. She refused.

At the instigation of Police Chief Robert L. Meiser, Keene produced court records of unpaid and partially paid cases which she said were not processed properly.

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock said she considered them "unfinished" where fines were only partially paid and had not entered them in the mayor's docket nor forwarded the required arrest record to the Division of Motor Vehicles, Columbus, nor did she deposit what money had been collected.

She said when the total fine was paid, these things were done. Then she was asked to produce the mayor's docket, which she said was at home and too heavy to carry. With that she was furnished with an escort to bring the records to the council room.

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The mayor said this started over his "crossing" the police chief. In 1970, when Councilmen Hugh W. Washburn and William Forquerer and

Mayor William Fazio attempted to remove him from office, she was the only council member to defend him, she noted.

The mayor said that a bond of \$50 came up missing between the jail and the utility office. The arresting officer had collected two such bonds, but the receipt was written in the police receipt book, which is kept by the utility clerk, who also serves as court bailiff, for only one bond.

The arresting officer had issued a receipt on a piece of scrap paper, which was brought to the village office several weeks ago.

Both young men had appeared in court as ordered last July, but the arresting officer had not written a warrant for their arrest in a charge of disorderly conduct stemming from a bar room fight and failed to do so when a message was sent to him by the mayor. The mayor had already refunded one bond to the young man who had the valid receipt. This came a month later, when still the officer had failed

to put any charges in writing. The officer was not identified.

The mayor said she called Akers, chairman of the police committee, and Solicitor Robert A. McKown to see how the village could repay the bond. McKown suggested that the mayor, clerk and members of the police department "pass the hat". The mayor said this was not fair, because the money obviously vanished into the hands of only one person, which could not be proven. Akers then suggested it be taken out of the Policemen's Ball fund.

In any event, the council will request an official state audit.

The mayor told the council the village has estimated damage from the recent snow storm and blizzards at \$68,500. She said to date the cost actually hovers around \$14,000 in actual figures, but when the snow melts further damage will be found.

Student finds Soviets modern, only difference 'ideological'

A little over a year ago, a distinguished American who is a retired ambassador told Plymouth High school pupils that Americans have the wrong attitude toward the Russians. Now a 1975 alumnus of the school, James Cooper Miller, says substantially the same thing. A sophomore in Bluffton college, he passed much of January in the Soviet Union, visiting Moscow and Leningrad.

They were totally free to walk around on our own, though, contrary to what many people believe. However, we were not allowed to take pictures of certain places such as airports, railroad stations, subway stations and so on. So there are some

seemingly strange restrictions, but not nearly to the extent most Americans believe.

Still, the Soviets are all people just like you and me. Really, our only difference is ideological. They are raised in socialism and a communist type of living is their eventual goal. They are taught to believe in only this way. We have been reared in a democracy and are taught to question what we are told. Our systems are quite different. But we are all people. We laugh and play, sing and dance, live and die, and a smile is universal.

Of course, of course, their system has faults. So does ours. We both have our good points. It is true that some things were hidden from us. We were shown mostly the good side, told mostly the good points. A great deal is put on or covered up.

The Soviets have gone to great lengths to preserve their history. Many palaces and cathedrals have undergone painstaking restoration since the Second World War and are now open as museums. I had expected things such as these to be hidden away, especially anything concerning religion, instead of being glorified. However, they are looked upon as objects of national pride in a glorious past, but glorious only for those few who ruled.

That which I disliked the most about the Soviet society was the loss of individualism. It seemed that all its done for the state and nothing for the individual. They are not free to say and do whatever they wish. In fact, in Leningrad, individuals are no longer allowed to own private homes. All must rent apartments built by the state. They have no choice. One student told me they are as free as we are, only our definitions of freedom are different. Many of our "so called freedoms are unnecessary." I am sure none of us would agree. Things like this ever the more great appreciation of the freedom we enjoy.

As I have talked to people since I have returned, I hope I have dispelled many of the myths we have about the Soviet Union and their people. It is amazing how distorted our picture

FORGET THOSE SILLY Polish jokes and brew up a good Polish recipe. Shred a medium size red cabbage and scald it in boiling water and drain. Slice up two tart apples and pour a fourth of a cup of lemon juice over them and let them sit in a bowl. While they are sitting, gather together a half cup of red wine, a fourth of a cup of sugar, three tablespoons of red wine vinegar, a half teaspoon of salt, an eighth of a teaspoon of white pepper and of nutmeg, less than a quarter teaspoon of dried dill and two minced garlic cloves. In a sturdy frying pan,

melt up chicken fat if you have it, otherwise use shortening, and put it all together — and simmer while covered for a half hour.

To this mixture add a pound, and it would be even better if you add more, of kielbasa sausage. Cook this another 15 minutes or so.

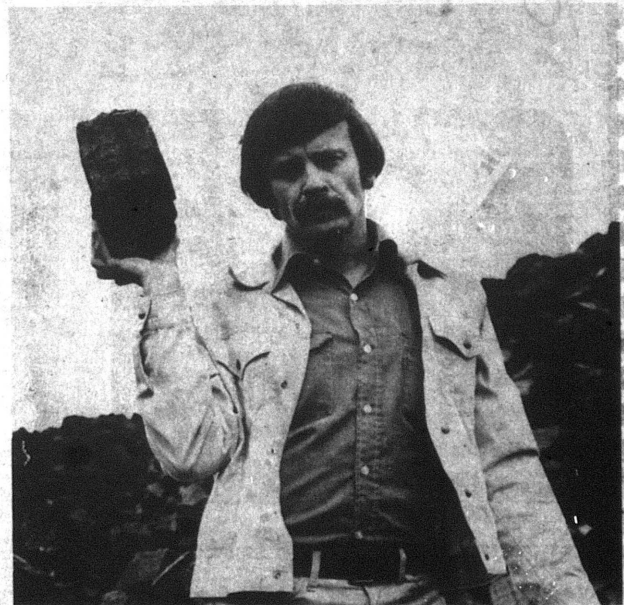

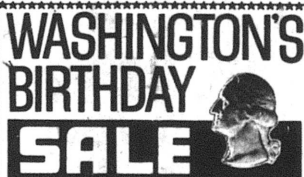

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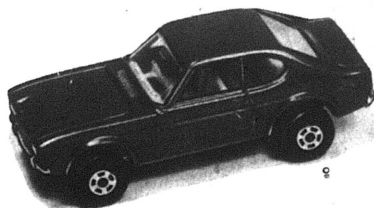

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Big Red trims Ontario

Plymouth defeated Ontario for the second time this season here Saturday night, and that doesn't happen more than once in 22 years.

That it was hardly an artistic triumph doesn't matter. Twenty years from now it will be recorded as a victory, and that's what counts.

Plymouth led at every turn and came away with a 52 to 32 win. The Big Red used the fast break and a tight zone defense to prevail over the hapless Warriors, who made complaints, often with justice, about the refereeing.

Mike Weaver, coming into his own late in the season, scored 17 points to lead both teams. Mike Carthy came on in the last period, when he scored seven, and wound up with 13. No other Plymouth player was in double figures but there were three over five points a

piece. Jay Haver had a career high of nine.

Neither team played well. Ontario had nine turnovers in the first period alone. The Warriors had 20 overall. Plymouth was charged with eight turnovers in the first period and 25 over all.

Nor did the taller Warriors shoot well or rebound effectively. Ontario bagged only 22 of 62 tries for field goal and missed 10 of 18 free throws. It took down just 30 rebounds.

It was obvious the long layoff enforced by foul weather and the energy crisis hurt both teams. Which did it hurt the most? The Ontario coach will say it hurt his team, more and it would be hard to fault that statement. Ontario is bigger and faster than Plymouth and it is stranger that the Warriors were outscored by five.

Plymouth improved its floor game in the second half after stumbling to a 23 to 20 lead after two periods. Each team managed 18 points in the third period and it was the Big Red's superior success from the field in the final eight minutes that produced victory. Plymouth went eight-for-12 in the last quarter.

There was some hassle about Blane Baker's jersey and Coach Vic Pitzemayer of the Warriors made an issue of it on two occasions. Baker was not outfitted with the correct shirt and Pitzemayer made hay out of it. At the outset, Baker was ruled ineligible to play and he showed what he thought of that. Then, when he went onto the floor, Pitzemayer insisted he be ruled off. The referees awarded Ontario a technical foul shot instead. It didn't connect.

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Schools see light ahead

Barring exceptionally cold weather in March, Plymouth schools can survive the current heating season without altering the school calendar or closing their doors.

Supt. John Fazzini told the board of education Monday night that "pooling" worked out very well for us so that we saved 3,095,000 cubic feet of gas. He said the schools have a "cushion" of about 2,000,000 cubic feet to carry them through the remainder of the heating season.

Nevertheless, he asked for and got a ruling that no part of any school may be used for any non-school function for the next 30 days. This means all buildings will be closed and placed on standby heating after the last class each day, save for regularly scheduled school activities.

To make up for two days when calamity forced closing of schools, sessions will be conducted Monday, Presidents' day, and on Apr. 7, Holy Thursday, Apr. 8, Good Friday, and Apr. 11, Easter Monday, will remain as holidays.

Two parents, Mrs. John Ganzhorn and Bill Young, protested the lack of water in Plymouth Elementary school. They said failure to use water in the toilets caused unsanitary conditions that endangered the health of their children.

Fazzini explained he was told by Village Administrator Thomas F. Baker not to open the schools because of the critically short water supply but worked out a plan to utilize non-village water in order that classes could resume.

He told the inquirers the village will allow use of water by the schools starting Feb. 15.
