With the finest record of any athletic team fielded by our school in 25 years, the girls' basketball squad begins Tuesday the tortuous route to a state championship in the Class A playdowns at Ontario. This team has been beaten twice, once by a state-ranked power that may just be the finest athletic aggregation ever assembled in these parts, of whatever sex and in whatever sport.

What will matter is whether they learned anything in our school, whether the money we spent on them was well spent. Still, it'd be nice if they won the state championship. Or even the district, or the sectional. But win or lose, they're ours, and we love every one of them.

Hearing first, then spending now required

New regulations applicable to disbursement of Federal Revenue Sharing funds are now in effect. A public hearing on the proposed use of Revenue Sharing Funds is required not less than seven days before it is presented to the legislative body for enactment. Any public hearing on the budget is required prior to its adoption.

Public notice of each hearing must be inserted in a newspaper of general circulation at least 10 days prior to the scheduled date. A report on proposed uses of Revenue Sharing funds and a budget summary must be published prior to the adoption of the budget. There must be published a notice that the budget summary and proposed use statement are available for review.

Akers resigns seat on village council

Hubert V. Akers resigned Tuesday night as councilman because he is moving out of the village. However, before he resigned, he moved to borrow \$3,800 from Peoples National bank to pay for a new water tanker for the fire department.

The 1,500-gallon tank is to be purchased from Progress Brothers, Inc., Artur, Ill. Its actual cost is \$3,497 plus \$279 for the cabinet. Several of the volunteer firemen will drive the chassis to Hillinois to bring it back, to save the cost of \$450 to have the company deliver it to Toledo.

The money is to be borrowed for one year and to be repaid from the operating fire fund.

Councilman and the mayor attempted to answer questions of irate villagers concerning

their utility bills. Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock finally said somewhere there is a problem after Councilman Duane Keene said she was responsible for all the confusion in the billing. The mayor said either meters had not been read previously and that the readings are catching up or that the meters had not been read accurately for the current bills. These bills in dispute are to be rechecked and complaints of leaking water meters taken care of.

Councilman Tom Patton defended Village Administrator Thomas F. Baker by saying that perhaps some meters had not been read in the past and there is the great possibility that the meters were not properly read by the new reader.

Baker told the council that as of now, the water is "holding its own". Later Keene suggested an ordinance to establish a procedure of what to do in an acute water shortage period such as the village experienced several weeks ago. His business, a car wash, and the laundry belonging to Edward O. Ramsey were and are close. Keene does not think this is fair. He said

the bars, a restaurant and beauty shops remained open during the shortage. He suggested that during a shortage water be closed off to businesses at the mains and where this would be assessed. He said that daily readings of the meter so that if the readings go over a certain quantity, a fine of \$100 a day be assessed. He said that this would protect householders and assure them of water.

No decision was taken on his proposal, although councilmen and mayor agreed it has merit and should be studied further as to its legal aspects.

CHARLES MOULTON, district manager of Ohio Power Co., requested the council pass a new ordinance for a 50-year period concerning the rights of the company within the village. One was passed in November, but since then the wording in one section does not permit the power company to increase its electrical capacity to the

Fate-Ro-Heath Co., which has now asked for more electrical service.

Councilman D. Douglas Brumback was wholly against making this change. He claimed the new wording would tie future councils down to something they would not want, and that F-R-H would own the village and could handle its own problem. Councilman James I. Jacobs, Sr., agreed with him on the point of the power company serving territory that might be annexed in the future. The wording was part of a routine paragraph, he says.

The Grantee (the power company) shall have the right to maintain, serve and supply electric energy to meet the needs and requirements of all of its present customers within the corporate limits of the village of Plymouth and in adjacent areas outside of said Municipal Corporation which may in the future be annexed into the Municipality.

The mayor asked if the village could possibly serve F-R-H with the

power it required. Baker shook his head vigorously. Patton also agreed the village could not do so.

The new ordinance was passed by vote of five to one, with Brumback voting nay.

The council accepted the mayor's report for February, which was a complete blank. The mayor said that one traffic ticket was issued during the month. The accused did not appear until Tuesday. The one pending case is a traffic charge and a DWI charge from January, which had not been completed. She said the village should be complimented that it had no other traffic violations during February nor any other problems involving the police. She added that it was the first time in her memory of Plymouth that there were none.

Shiloh to buy water softener

A contract to purchase a new water softener from Culligan Soft Water Service was approved by Shiloh's village council Feb. 25.

Cost is \$59,660. Water rates, which are now \$2 a household a month, with usage unlimited, may have to be increased.

Water revenue during 1976, reported the clerk-treasurer, Mrs. Robert Book, was \$8,521. Expenses of the water system for supplies and the remainder for repairs.

Appropriations for 1977 in the amount of \$177,895 were approved. These are up from last year when they were \$174,407.

But the village spent only \$153,062 last year.

General fund appropriations amount to \$32,694. Sgt. Lawrence Carr, ONG, volunteer disaster program coordinator for Richland county, urged the council to join Shiloh with the county emergency and disaster program.

Red trims Freddies

Plymouth made a first half lead stand up in its final game of the season here Thursday night and walked away with a 73 to 63 victory over Fredericktown in Johnnie Appleseed conference play.

The Big Red concluded its season with a 10-and-8 record, and 8-and-6 in league play.

Plymouth should have defeated the Freddies by a bigger score. That the winners were charged with 27 turnovers while compiling a remarkable shooting average of slightly under 50 percent with 28 successes in 57 tries suggests the score could have been higher.

It was the second quarter that produced the difference.

Only two points separated the teams after eight minutes. Then Plymouth went on a scoring rampage with 20 points in its defense was holding the Freddies to just 15.

Jay Haver scored eight, Mike Weaver eight, Blane Baker six and Bob Davis four in the big outburst.

After Plymouth went ahead at 6:34 of the second period, when Blane Baker made a field goal on an assist by Haver, the Big Red never was headed.

Mike Cary was carried from the floor earlier, with an apparent leg injury, and did not return.

Fredericktown carried it to Plymouth during the second half and indeed outscored the Big Red by one, 32 to 31. But the damage had been done.

Joe Miller tried valiantly to keep the Freddies competitive until he fouled out. He was high scorer for the night with 22, 11 of them in the second half.

Plymouth controlled the backboards, taking down 41 rebounds. Fredericktown was credited with 36.

The Freddies did not shoot well. They got off 24 tries for field goal and made only 24 of them, slightly less than 33 per-

cent. Neither were they so accurate from the free throw line, where they missed an even dozen of 27 tries. Plymouth failed with nine of 26.

The Big Red had four players in double figures, led by Weaver with 14. Baker had 12, Steve Shurt, who played only briefly, 10, and Bob Davis with a career high of 11.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Sir,

This letter concerns the American Red Cross and the need for a community campaign in Plymouth.

First, I would like to make a correction to the article which appeared in The Advertiser last week. There was a discrepancy in the information submitted for the article. While there were 37 units of blood used by patients within the community, these were all replaced by the American Red Cross. Ten units were replaced that were used by area residents in other than local hospitals, such as Cleveland, Columbus or out-of-state hospitals (for anyone who might have been temporarily away from their residence). The other 27 were replacements to local hospitals (Willard, Shelby).

Perhaps there were other units of blood used by patients in hospitals in addition to the 37 mentioned above. I have no figures available on this. However, I do know that the cost of blood used from the ARC is not charged to the patients. Only do the hospitals charge for the processing that relates to blood usage. I also know that the average cost per unit of blood on the open market would be in the area of \$50 and rare types more than that. The ARC does encourage friends and relatives to help by their donations of blood to the blood banks. This provides for the essential future needs of others. In addition to the figure of \$662.54 provided to those who were burned out by fires the ARC also provided assistance to two service families with special emergencies.

Yes, indeed, we have gotten more than we've given. We look to the future and never know when the emergency will be ours. Isn't it a comforting thought to know that when that emergency does occur that there is an organization to depend on like the American Red Cross?

Please give generously to the ARC when one of the volunteers calls upon you and if you can, give your donation to the blood bank that someone's need may be assured.

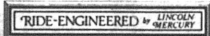

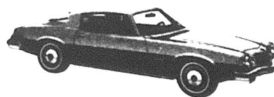
