GenTel starts expansion at Plymouth

Installation is under way on a \$49,500 addition of call-switching equipment for growth in the Plymouth exchange, General Telephone Co. of Ohio announced today.

Charles T. Winn, Norwalk, customer service manager, said the project will provide for 200 new customer lines and 200 new telephone numbers.

In addition, there will be a 33 per cent increase in trunks (calling paths) for direct dialed toll calls and a 22 per cent boost in trunks handling operator-assisted calls.

Winn said the entire project is scheduled for completion by mid-summer.

The Plymouth exchange serves 885 customers in a 27.4-square-mile area covering portions of Huron, Crawford and Richland counties.

New hunting, trapping rules adopted for '77-'78 season

Hunting and trapping seasons dates and additional new regulations proposed by the Division of Wildlife of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources have been approved.

The 1977-'78 hunting and trapping dates are: Cottontail Rabbit - Nov. 15 through Jan. 28, 1978. Hunting hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. with a daily bag limit of four and a possession limit of eight after the first day.

Bobwhite Quail - Nov. 15 through Dec. 31. Hunting hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. with a daily bag limit of two and a possession limit of eight after the first day.

Ring-necked Pheasant Cock and Chukar Partridge - Nov. 15 through Dec. 10 on private land and Nov. 15 through Jan. 28, 1978, on state public hunting areas. Hunting hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. with a daily bag limit of two pheasants and two chukars and a possession limit of four each after the first day.

The hen pheasant zone where either cocks or hens may be taken is Nov. 15 through Jan. 28, 1978. Hunting hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. with a daily bag limit of two and a possession limit of four after the first day.

Additional areas where pheasants or cocks may be taken include Auburn Marsh, Beach City Reservoir, Berlin Reservoir, Bellvue, Dillen Reservoir, Fallsville, Grand

River, Hamden Orchard, Highlandtown, Indian Creek, Pleasant Valley, Rush Run, Salt Fork, Shreve, Spencer, Spring Valley, Wellington, West Branch Reservoir, and Zepernick public hunting areas.

There is no open season for Hungarian Partridge, Redbreasted Goose, Sept. 9 through Nov. 12 on private land and Sept. 9 through Dec. 24 on state public hunting areas.

Hunting hours are 6 p. m. to 12 hour before sunrise to 12 hour after sunset, with a daily bag limit of four and a possession limit of eight after the first day.

Raccoon Hunting Season - Opening 6 p. m. Nov. 1 through Jan. 28, 1978. Hunting hours are 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. Nightly bag limit for raccoon is four. No possession limit.

Raccoon, Mink and Muskrat trapping Season - Nov. 15 through Feb. 18, 1978. The trapping season is extended through March 15, 1978, in Ottawa, Sandusky and Erie counties and in Lucas county east of the Maumee river. No restrictions on hours, daily bag limits or possession limits.

Fox, Opossum, Skunk and Weasel Hunting - Oct. 21 through Jan. 15, 1978. There is no bag or possession limit.

Fox Trapping - Oct. 21 through Jan. 1, 1978. No bag or possession limit.

Opossum, Skunk and Weasel Trapping Season - Oct. 21 through Feb. 18,

Four teachers quit jobs, two principals reemployed

Four resignations, including that of the head basketball and tennis coach, were accepted by Plymouth Board of Education Monday night.

An unprecedented number of teachers, 23, attended the session. Only one of them, Miss Janeane Cunningham, who is the president of Plymouth Education association, spoke publicly. What she said was a minor clarification of the PEA stand on an in-service day in mid-year.

William K. Northrup, 2nd, who has served as head basketball coach

three seasons, resigned, both as coach and teacher. He did not disclose his plans. He said he was resigning "for the good of the program."

Mrs. Beth Bishop, high school English teacher, and Miss Debra Wilford, kindergarten teacher, resigned as of the end of the year. Mrs. Claudia Dalton, high school home economics teacher, resigned as of Apr. 8 to join her husband in another state. She will be replaced by Mrs. A. R. Geller, formerly a teacher on the staff here.

One year contracts were approved for Mrs. Eric J. Akers, Robert Bass, Kathy Bell, David Boor, Edina Capell, Miss Linda Clark, Janice Collins, Christina Creamer, Janeane Cunningham, Mrs. Thomas Dawson, Keith Diebler, Daniel Donohue, Mr. and Mrs. David Dunn.

Also, C. Michael Fol-

lett, Michael Forsythe, Kathleen Green, Carol Knapp, John Leonard, Barbara McBride, Michael McFarren, Gary Miller, David Miller, Terry Pore, Mrs. Timothy Redden, Amy Robinson, Richard Rolly, Joyce Stone, Lora Stone, Vickie Stuckert and Martha Wilson. Diebler was appointed assistant baseball coach, on salary scale. Member David Howard inquired if it is wise to name an assistant coach in baseball, where nine players of a squad of about 27 appear simultaneously on the field, whereas in track and field the athletes are dispersed so much that a single coach cannot manage all of them.

John Fazzini explained "we don't have an assistant coach available for track and field but the point is we'll take it."

Mrs. Leo Russell resigned as library aide at Shiloh. She will retire.

Mrs. Katherine Harpster, elementary art teacher on leave of absence, notified the board she will not return.

Mrs. Gerald Lillo, junior high school librarian on leave of absence for maternity reasons, told the board she wishes to return. She will be guaranteed a position. There is no certainty, the board said, that she can be assigned as librarian.

A calendar for 1977-'78 was adopted.

Classes will begin Sept. 6 and end on Dec. 8, Oct. 7, Jan. 16 and Feb. 20 are in-service training days. Thanksgiving recess is from Nov. 24 through 25, Christmas

recess is from Dec. 22 through Jan. 2. Easter recess is from Mar. 23 through 28. Memorial day will be observed May 29.

Approval was given to an application of the FFA to farm eight acres belonging to the Richard Hortons. A cash rent or crop share plan will be arranged and filed with the board.

Francis D. Snyder resigned as substitute bus driver. Mrs. Herbert Caudill will replace him.

Fazzini called the shortage of custodians, bus drivers and cleaners "critical" and urged candidates for such employment to call him.

"Until we get a letter from somebody ordering us to appear before the council," said Mrs. Roger Pugh, the board president, we'll leave it like it is. The clerk was instructed to prepare copies of correspondence between the council and the board that purport to state the council's agreement to pay half the cost of blacktopping the access road to Mary Fate park.

No county funds for streets here

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock met briefly with the Huron county commissioners Monday morning to ascertain if county funds are available for street repairs.

She was told that all funds are earmarked and that the county is not long-term sharing costs, as was done several years ago.

However, George Russell, who is charge of federal grants for Huron county, is meeting this week with the Richland county officer and he is to inquire if there are funds the village can apply for.

The village has a balance of \$5,976 in permissive tax money in Huron county, which is for street repairs in Huron county only.

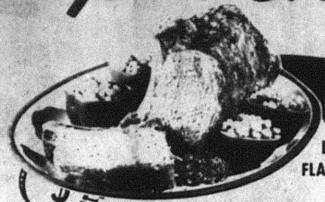

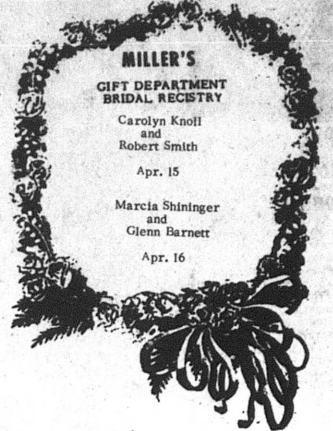

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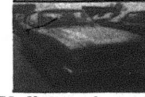

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO OHIO POWER COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, THE RIGHT TO ACQUIRE, CONSTRUCT, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE IN THE STREETS, THOROUGHFARES, ALLEYS, BRIDGES AND PUBLIC PLACES OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO, AND ITS SUCCESSORS, LINES FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF ELECTRIC ENERGY TO THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, AND THE INHABITANTS THEREOF FOR LIGHT, HEAT, POWER AND OTHER PURPOSES AND FOR THE TRANSMISSION OF THE SAME WITHIN, THROUGH OR ACROSS SAID VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO.

OHIO.
BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same that:

SECTION I:

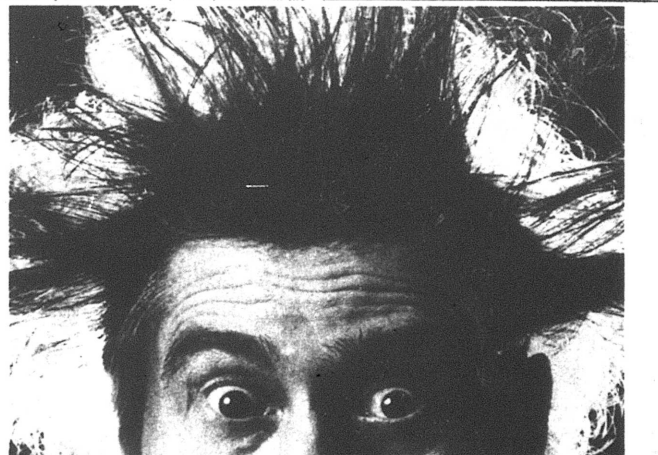

If you're not careful your CB antenna could put you in touch with a lot more than you bargained for.

Unfortunately, your CB base station antenna will not only help you reach more people, it could also put you in touch with our power lines. And the slightest contact between you, your antenna and our lines could be fatal.

So, before you put up your antenna, here are a few suggestions you should follow.

First, we recommend you have a professional do it for you.

Okay, if you're determined to do it yourself, look out for power lines. The ones attached to poles. And the ones attached to your house.

If you can't tell a power line from a phone line, don't experiment. Steer clear.

Then make sure you locate your antenna (including supporting mast and guy wires) at least one and a half times its total height from all power lines. Which means, a 30-ft. high antenna should be 45 feet away from all power lines in all directions.
