Sewer surety given notice: produce or face law suit

If no reply to the village's claim for damages and extra expense for the sanitary sewer is received by tomorrow, Robert A. McKown, village solicitor, will file a cross complaint for damages of \$328,000 against American Empire Insurance Co., Watertown, N. Y.

After a long discussion to try to determine why a delay had occurred and where the blame could be placed, the council made its decision.

During a Feb. 16 meeting with the bonding company, Apr. 1 was agreed upon as the date its decision would be reached. Either it would try to come to an agreement with the village or continue its law suit against the village, denying it is liable.

Councilman D. Douglas Brumbach vehemently emphasized the council "does not know what is going on." He said the village was represented by only McKown, Eugene G. Gerken, Mantary sewer engineer, and Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock.

The mayor said he and she had discussed this problem several years ago and agreed someone with access to councilmatic dealings was passing information to Cincinnati.

For this reason the proposal of Councilman James I. Jacobs, Sr., that the council caucus to go over the damages the village is claiming to see what items would be negotiable was turned down.

Jacobs then suggested Gerken and McKown decide between themselves and leave the mayor out of it. This was agreeable to the other councilmen.

The mayor told the council she met with the trustees of New Haven township and they agreed to an increase of \$350, making their annual rate \$2,350 for the first six fires, \$200 for each fire over the six, and \$25 for a false alarm.

Councilman Edward O. Ramsey said this is not a large amount of paper work along with being on the job outside.

Approval was given to James Fleck in Brooks county to connect. Keene made the motion, Brumbach was the only objector.

Robert Hall, Springmill

Brumbach suggested the ambulance go on each fire run. This was approved. He cited a recent fire when one fireman was overcome as it was fortunate that he had equipment in his own vehicle to revive him.

Councilman Duane Keene moved to allow Mrs. Arthur Nordyke and Basil Long to connect to the Riggs avenue sanitary sewer line.

Only Brumbach objected and voted no.

The next sewer request came from Brooks county. Brumbach asked Gerken's opinion and he replied, "As far as I am concerned, any hook-ups the solicitor has given you advice." He said more connections in that area will put a burden on the contractor doing the repairs. "You are putting it all on my shoulders, you six are not taking responsibility."

Keene said, "the council is not pushing and that the firemen are making money."

Councilman Toy Patton observed village had allowed others to connect, and the inspection of the firemen was not allowed to do so.

Ramsey said no court or jury would blame the village for what it has done and the inspection of the construction and other things were below par.

Gerken replied that inspection is no guarantee of work done and the only way to tell how well it has been done is to test it. He said that the village could afford only one inspector and that it included a large amount of paper work along with being on the job outside.

Why are funds asked for cancer?

We'd like to take this opportunity to bring you up to date on what our local cancer society has been doing.

The Richard-Shelby Unit of The American Cancer society includes Shelby, Plymouth and Shiloh and the townships of Plymouth, Cass, Bloomington, Butler, Sharon and Jackson.

During the period Aug. 31, 1974 - Aug. 31, 1976, we have provided services for a total of 64 patients. These services included assistance in paying for out-patient medications, dressings, sickroom equipment, rehabilitation, mileage for transportation to facilities for out-patient treatment, information and counseling, and also we pay \$50 toward the purchase of the first breast prosthesis for a mastectomy patient. The total cost for this period for LOCAL service was \$9,891.67. This also includes 112 visits to the cancer clinic, for which our unit pays three-fourths of the cost.

Public education during this time period included the distribution of over 10,000 pieces of literature, providing 121 programs to students and adults, and distributing professional education to doctors and nurses in the community plus two programs for nurses at the hospital and the CA subscription to the physicians. Total cost was \$3,218.92.

For natural research, medical fellowships, grants, and other cancer programs, our unit contributed \$13,902.11. For state-wide programs of professional education, community services, public education and other supporting activities our unit contributed \$4,715.24.

Our local unit administrative expenses for the two-year period included fund raising expense, supplies, administrative salary, office rent and totaled only \$3,026.65. Our only source of income for these activities has been through your donations - individual, memorials, Shelby United Way and Plymouth Community Chest and your support of our fund-raising activities. Our share of the Shelby United Way Campaign is \$9,850 a year and Plymouth Community Chest is \$200. So you can see how much your continued support is needed and appreciated, and we thank you sincerely for helping us to provide these services.

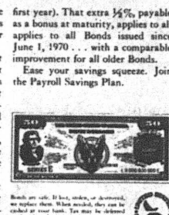
