Merger erases Peoples bank, on Square since 1903

In 1873, Peoples National bought the premises and occupied them. Since then, the bank has expanded westward on two occasions, both by purchase, first from the late Mrs. Harry Dick, then from Charles Neas, a hardware man who had bought the business of the late Royal W. Eckstein, Sr.

Earl C. Cashman, who succeeded his late father-in-law, J. Elden Nimmons, as chairman of the board of directors and president of the Peoples National, has been elected a senior vice-

president of First National and will continue to supervise operations here.

Cashman has also been elected to the board of directors of First National bank.

Other officers of Peoples National, James C. Davis, J. Harold Cashman and Quentin R. Beam, have been elected by First National to be assistant vice-presidents and Mrs. Douglas A. Dickson has been elected as assistant cashier.

At the time of the merger with First National, which was approved by the comptroller of the currency, Peoples National showed assets of about \$17 million, an increase of \$10 million since 1965. It is the intention of First National to increase its business in 19 banking offices in Mansfield, Bellville, Crestline, Lexington, Shiloh, Ontario and Plymouth.

No changes in personnel staffing the Plymouth branches of First National are anticipated, Hand said.

The glasses were wonderful and we brought a couple of them home, so after a few nights our kids had learned all the Derby winners from the very beginning, which was 1875.

I wish we still had one, but they were used and you know what happens to glasses when they are used three times a day. Anyway, the little lady turned to me, and said, "the next time you order a julep, I will sweeten it for you." Here is this dignified little lady and out comes a flask of bourbon from her handbag. It was really funny, and all we could do was to thank her. I remember her so well but to this day cannot remember which horse won.

I wonder what she told her friends when she got home. Could she possibly have said "I met two nice ladies from Ohio?" I hope so.

That was the time we ended up in real "moonshine" country. Somehow the friend we were with took a wrong turn and we were really off the main road. Since he did not believe in putting gas in his car when it was half down, we were dangerously low and lost. The countryside in May down there is plain beautiful. He finally found a house way back in a lane, and turned in to ask for directions. Two men were on the porch, and as we turned in, one vanished into the house.

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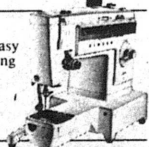
