Blue ribbon committee idea debated by school board

A blue ribbon committee to study the need for a new junior high school building, including a site for it, and make recommendations, which won't be binding, to the board of education may be approved Saturday.

That was the outcome of a discussion Monday night by the board in the wake of the second defeat, the second time by a margin double the first time, of a bond issue to fund construction of a new junior high school.

The proposal to appoint such a committee came from the Rev. Arthur Hamman.

It drew prompt support, but not without some stern warnings, including those of Supr. John Fazzini, who said the committee must be made aware early on that it has limited authority, and it won't have any right to evaluate our teachers or assign the classrooms and such.

Board members would seek input from all segments of the school district, including building principals, and choose a committee that "mustn't be unwieldy as to size."

Hamman's motion to this effect died for want of a second. Reason: his colleagues apparently thought the board would be suspect if it chose the members.

CAN THIS BE DONE and the results had in time to put the issue on the November ballot?

Ninety days of advance notice to the board of elections is required.

The board expressed some doubt that the consultations envisaged can in fact be had and discussed what can be done as a stopgap measure to make the Shiloh Junior High building usable in the interim.

But no decision was reached.

Annual budget hearing will take place July 11 at 7:30 p.m.

The board will meet in special session Saturday at 8:30 a. m. to discuss personnel matters. Fazzini may recommend at that time the appointment of a new administrative assistant.

TWO TEACHERS WERE hired and a new basketball coach appointed at Monday's session.

Mrs. Dorothy Olewiler and Miss Molly A. Heck, both of Shelby and both June graduates of Ohio State university, were engaged to teach vocational

home economics, on salary schedule.

Each will be assigned to coach girls' athletics.

Keith E. Diebler, 25, an alumnus of Heidelberg college who has for three years been assistant basketball coach and football coach, was named head basketball coach, to succeed William K. Northrup, 2nd, resigned. Diebler teaches physical education and driver education. He hails from North Robinson.

Mrs. Wayne H. Strine, librarian, was hired for not to exceed 90 hours at \$6 an hour to engage in library service work during the summer.

Miss Sara Kranz, girls' physical education teacher who was offered a continuing contract, protested in writing that the contract as drawn is illegal, since it stipulates that she must engage in coaching activities in addition to teaching.

An opinion of the Richmond county prosecutor's office was read to the effect that if an activity requires a teaching certificate, then a teacher may be bound to that activity in the teaching contract. Fazzini acknowledged that coaching doesn't necessarily require a teaching certificate and so Miss Kranz's contract, and that of Miss Diane Sanford, will be amended so that a supplemental agreement of a limited nature to cover coaching will be drawn.

Vacancies in the faculty were reduced to five with the hiring of the two home economics teachers. These are kindergarten, remedial reading, high school English, high

school social studies and high school business education. Fazzini said he has a multitude of candidates for all posts save that of business education.

Fazzini and Edward M. Kinsel, junior high school principal, interviewed this a number of candidates for maintenance-custodial work to be funded by CETA.

Should village renew lease on water well?

It was Councilman D. Douglas Brumbach who said the village should negotiate a five year agreement and should not drop the option.

IN A DISCUSSION OF "housekeeping" items in the village, Keene asked that Brooks Court be offed to keep the dust down. Jacobs asked that something be done about dusty conditions in Willard drive, at the request of James C. Root. Ramsey said that numerous property owners are guilty of letting weeds grow out of bounds.

Notices are to be sent to the property owners to cut them, and if they are not, the village will do it and bill them.

Ramsey also complained again about beer bottles thrown in the street near the two taverns on the Square. Jacobs said the police "should crack down on this".

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock reported that on the day after the village employees had worked so hard to clean the Square for Memorial day, she and a friend picked up many cans and bottles early in the morning.

Keene reported Plymouth ambulance made 10 runs during May, which is double its monthly average. Seven were in the village, one in Plymouth township and the other two in New Haven township, for a total of 119 miles and use of 27.2 gallons of gasoline.

It was obvious to the councilmen that the new ambulance, which is considerably heavier than the previous one, will use more gasoline.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser asked the council to allow diagonal parking in the southeast side of the Square so that more parking spaces would be available while the annual Booster carnival is in session.

Keene moved to allow this for the week, which was agreed to by the other councilmen. This was done in spite of Brumbach's protest that the Department of Transportation would not approve it and that the village may lose out in highway funds in the future, and that of the solicitor, who said that the backing of cars will disturb the traffic flow as the Square is now arranged with turning lanes.

Boyd Hull, 72, dies at Willard

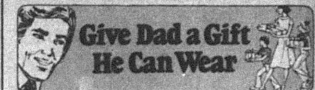

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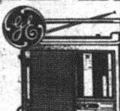
