Voters in all parts of Plymouth Local School district save Cass township spoke and spoke emphatically Tuesday: they don't want their school building dollar spent in Shiloh.

For the second time in seven months, a bond issue to raise \$1.13 million to pay for a new junior high school on the present site at Shiloh was beaten. And it was beaten so badly that the board of education may be forced to revise its planning.

The unofficial balloting on the school bond issue was 575 favoring, 470 opposing. The two precincts in Cass township, that in Shiloh proper and that in the township building, were 375 favoring, 470 opposing. The vote in the village was 88 for and 32 against. The vote outside the village was 70 for and 48 against.

But in almost every other precinct, including Bloomington, which supporters of the issue said has kindred interests with Shiloh, the issue was soundly whipped.

Only in New Haven township was there any semblance of competition. There the vote was nine ballots for and nine against.

But in Plymouth A, the Richland county precinct, the vote was 61 for and 156 against.

against, in Plymouth B, the Huron county precinct, it was 76 for and 128 against, and in Plymouth township it was 21 for and 65 against.

In November of 1976, the difference was only 56 ballots. This time, with a much smaller turnout at the polls and no candidates to draw voter support, the defeat was much more overwhelming.

The total vote for the bond issue was only 42 per cent.

The proposed three-mill operating levy to benefit Plymouth Fire department was defeated, 206 opposing, 197 favoring. Oddly, the issue was beaten where it was figured to do well, in Huron county. Huron county voters cast 93 votes for and 110 votes against. Richland county voters favored the issue, 102 to 96.

There were three reasons why the issue failed, one experienced pollwatcher told The Advertiser Tuesday night.

"The first is that there are more voters on the Richland county side than on the Huron county side. Rent contracts and agreements between what they are in this town, the rent they could afford to support the

new levy because they would be unlikely to have rent increase. Property owners, on the other hand, facing the new valuations in Huron county, were especially careful not to load themselves down with any more taxes until they can see what the new tax bills will call for.

"The second is the wording on the ballot. It said 'for current expenses', whereas it was the intention of the council to save the proceeds until there is enough to buy a new fire engine. Perhaps the law requires that the state that way, I don't know, but there were some who came to the polls wondering what the hell was going to do with the money."

"And the third is that the firemen themselves, who stood to benefit more than anybody else by the passage of the levy, didn't do diddlybeats about promoting the levy. There was no word of promotion, no rapping on doors, no newspaper advertising, no nothing. I think we have a right to have those who are going to benefit by the passage of a levy to get out and work for it."

Then why, he was asked, did the school board issue fail?

"There was some advertising but it wasn't anywhere near enough and it didn't start soon enough. Nobody explained where the children would be put when the building is torn down. Plymouth voters are sick and tired of paying for Shiloh's sewer system and they're getting ready over there -- it said so on the front page of your paper -- to let the sewer and water rates by plenty, and they were only holding off till after this election."

Course vs. surety decided, but council keeps it secret!

What Plymouth will do in the face of the refusal of the surety for the defunct sewer contractor to settle the village's claims was decided behind closed doors Tuesday, but neither the mayor nor any council-

man would reveal what it is.

The executive session occupied the first part of the regular bi-monthly session. It was requested by the solicitor, Robert A. McKown. Under the Ohio sunshine law, there are only six reasons why a public body may go into executive session and its clerk is required by law to state publicly what the reason or reasons was or were.

The vendor of the new billing machine, Burroughs Corp., Mansfield, was put on formal notice by motion that it must correct deficiencies in the machine before June 30 and it must be represented at the next council meeting June 21. The alternative, the council said, is that it will default the contract null and void and sue for its

money.

Should the village pay for two weeks of leave for Sgt. James Refett, who has been unable to work since Aug. 31, 1976, owing to an injury he claims to have received while quelling a brawl in Weber's Cafe?

Refett argues that he is on sick leave and his normal annual leave accumulations without obstruction. Beef raisers may register until June 17

Huron county agricultural stabilization and conservation service (ASCS) office will register beef producers until June 17 to vote on the beef research and information order, says Paul Sengstock, Huron county ASCS committee vice-chairman.

Beef producers who fail to register cannot vote in the July referendum.

If over half of registered producers vote in the referendum and two-thirds of those voting approve the order, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a beef board, composed of not more than 68 beef producers from names submitted by producer organizations. The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the \$35 county office to mail registration cards.

All persons who produced beef during calendar year 1976 are eligible to register.

Producers may be feed lot operators as well as dairymen. Each production entity, such as a family, partnership or corporation, is entitled to one vote. A 4-H or FFA member may register, provided he or she produced beef independent of the family operation.

Until June 17, the ASCS county office will daily accept registrations registered to vote in a conspicuous place. A final list will be posted June 22. Anyone may challenge the list to a parent-teacher conference.

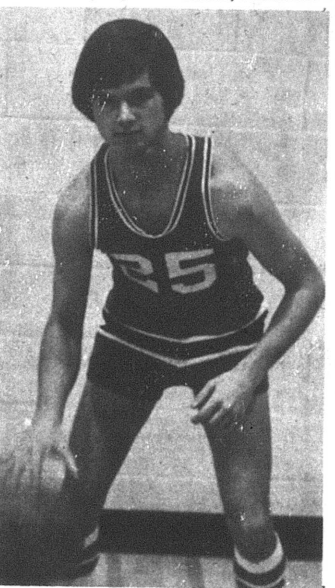
