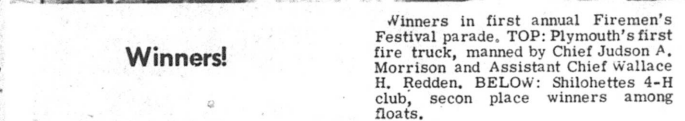

7% raise accorded to teaching staff

A new salary schedule and contract agreement with Plymouth Education association, the teacher's union, were adopted by Plymouth Board of Education Monday night. The contract document, over 30 pages thick, calls for a base teacher salary of \$8,750 for the holder of the bachelor's degree. The increase is \$550, or 6.6 percent. Teachers so trained may rise to \$13,088 after 20 years of service. The ranges for holders of the bachelor's degree plus 15 semester hours are \$8,881 and \$13,169, for a bachelor's degree plus 30 hours, \$9,363 and \$13,956, for a master's degree \$9,712 and \$15,313 and for a master's degree plus 15 hours \$9,888 and \$15,488. Supplemental contracts were authorized at seven levels of responsibility. The athletic director will start at \$578 and may rise to \$633 after two years. The head football and basketball coaches will start at \$1,100 and rise to \$1,256 after two years. The head coaches of wrestling, track and baseball and the assistant coaches of football and basketball will begin at \$495 and rise to \$578. The head cross country, golf and tennis coaches, the high school musical director and the head of girls' sports will be paid between \$556 and \$415. The high school cheerleader adviser, the play director, the marching band supervisor and the annual adviser will start at \$275 and rise to \$319. The assistant wrestling, track, cross country and baseball coaches and the assistant coaches in golf and tennis will start at \$248 and rise to \$302. Junior high school athletic director, intramural director, girls' athletic director, the newspaper adviser and the junior high school cheerleader adviser salary range is from \$220 to \$264. Elementary base salary range is from \$200 to \$240. Elementary base salary coach and freshman cheerleader adviser will be paid \$154. Advisers to the 12th and 11th grades will be paid \$15, to the 10th and ninth grade \$100. National Honor society adviser will get \$75, student council advisers \$75.

NEW RULES GOVERNING athletic participation were adopted unanimously. Drinking, smoking and use of illegal drugs, when detected by any coach of the school, and only by him, will result in suspension of athletes from all athletic participation for one year from the date of detection. Athletes must attend classes all day on the day of a sports event unless excused for valid reason by the coach, by the athletic director or by a physician or dentist. Curfews for all athletes are 10 p. m. on weekdays and at parental discretion on weekends. Miss Diane Sanford, junior high school principal, physical education teacher, was permitted to resign. She will take an administrative post in Michigan. Her replacement is C. Michael Follett, reassigned from a sixth grade class. Three certificated personnel were hired. Richard Price, Findlay, recent graduate of Bowling Green State University, was hired to be instrumental music teacher. David Sorota, Shelby, a 1970 alumnus of Kent State University who took a master's degree from Bowling Green in 1974, will be the new guidance director. He taught four years in Lakota schools and a year in Fields school at Mansfield. John Voldrich, Columbus, a 1975 graduate of Kenyon college at Gambier who earned the elementary education certificate from Miami University in 1977, will be the new sixth grade teacher. ITT Continental Baking Co. was awarded the baked goods contract. Smith Dairy, although it was second low bidder, was given the contract, which is expected to amount to \$24,259.20. Whetstone Agency, Willard, received the fleet insurance contract, on a bid of \$2,460. Personal Service Insurance, Plymouth, bid \$3,251.27. Pupil accident insurance coverage was renewed on the same terms as last year, with the same insurer, Tallman agency, Shiloh, is the local representative.

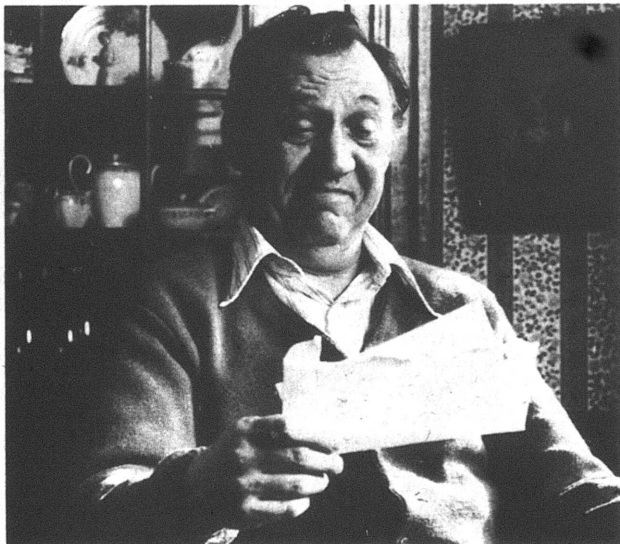

Don't let anyone sell you the idea that ours is a sick society. It is far from perfect, but it is also far and away the most enlightened, most unselfish, most compassionate in the world's history.

In a day that abounds with prophets of doom we need to accentuate the positive. The Gospel is still GOOD NEWS. Men are still being forgiven for sinful past. Broken, twisted lives are still being mended and straightened. God's Spirit still cleanses and empowers for holy living. As someone once said, "Our future is as bright as the promises of God."
