

10 seeking election to four council seats

Ten candidates, including three incumbents, seek four seats as village councilmen.

Incumbents D. Douglas Brumbach, Duane E. Keene and John A. Ray have filed nominating petitions. Brumbach and Ray were elected by popular vote in 1973. Keene was appointed to complete an unexpired term.

Their opponents are Dean A. Cline, William C. Enderby, David Howard, G. Thomas Moore, James C. Root, James Fleck and Ervin Howard. Cline and Howard, high school classmates here, last minute filings. Brumbach had nominating petitions in blank in his possession but the Richmond county board of elections had no record that he had ever asked for them. Neither had it any record for Enderby, who obtained his petitions from a friend.

Cline's father is a accountant at Shiloh. He is married to the former Percilla D. Thornberry. He lives at 11/2 East Main street. He is employed at Mansfield Warren Rupp Co.

Howard is an alumnus of Ashland college who will enroll in Claude Pettit college of law, Ohio Northern university, Ada, at month's end. He is also a member of Plymouth Board of Education, a post which he believes is not in conflict with a councilmanic seat if he should win it. "I'll decide later, when the time comes," he says. He is unmarried. Brumbach is a 59-year-old retired field officer of the Air Force. He was the first village administrator, appointed in 1968, and served until he had a falling out with the council and resigned at its request in 1970.

Root is the eldest son of

the H. James Root, a graduate of Plymouth High school employed by Charles Ritter Co., Mansfield. He is married to the former Dixie Fortney and they are the parents of two daughters.

Fleck is manager of Landmark operations at Shiloh. He and his wife are relative newcomers here. They now live in Brooks court, having formerly resided at Birchfield and Mulberry streets.

Ervin Howard is David's elder brother. Married and the father of two, he is employed by Plymouth Locomotive Works, Inc. INCUMBENTS HARRY L. Foster, Frank E. Cline and David Siger seek re-election as councilmen at Shiloh. Their competitors are Gerald L. Strong and Vickie L. Eichelberry.

High hopes held for well in new field at water plant

The water well now being drilled is likely to produce an abundance of water, Councilman Ed. Ramsey said Tuesday.

Because of a mishap by the Saltzger Well Digging Co., the casing on the well it had dug next to fail in the same vein as the six inch test well, was broken and it was necessary that a new hole be sunk.

This is when Ramsey went into action and had his friend, former Mayor Hugh Washburn, bring out his witching stick. Washburn contends there is water on the north side of the water plant outside the fence.

Ramsey told the council there should be two veins of 50 feet each that cross.

He told Mayor Elizabeth C. Paddock about his wife's last week and suggested that is where the well should be dug. She agreed. She told the council Tuesday night "the village needs the water, and maybe it is time to take a good gamble, since the existing wells come out of the same vein on the south side of the water plant."

This is the date council had asked for two weeks ago, but Tuesday it refused to accept it and told

primitive method of finding water, but did not object strenuously.

Ramsey said the people should be thanked for conserving water. The acute shortage came last week when the water tower was down to eight feet. It is now at 16, but should be close to 30.

Councilmen were again in complete agreement that the Burroughs Corp. is not treating the village fairly since it said the new billing machine would be programmed and in perfect running order by Mar. 1.

It was on June 27 when this occurred. It has since then developed a few more "bugs", one of which was static electricity last week because of climatic conditions.

William Ragan, Burroughs' district manager, told the council the company is willing to accept June 27 as the date the warranty and service contract would begin.

The mayor prepared a chart of expenses of the electric fund for the first seven months of this year to point out how close the

The village will also enter into a mutual aid program for emergency services with all Richmond county fire departments.

Solicitor Robert A. McKee will be asked to prepare an ordinance for the next meeting.

A lifeguard testing program implemented last year by Slough City, Iowa, is helping to keep lifeguards on their toes, according to City Manager Gary Pokorny. At least once a week, at each of the city's six pools, a staff designated "victim" dives into the pool, unknown to the lifeguards, with a black T-shirt under his arms. The victim puts on the black shirt underwater, then resurfaces in a dead man's float. Any lifeguard who fails to respond within 30 seconds receives a two-day "vacation" without pay. A second failure means termination. In Slough City, all the rescues have been carried off within the time limit.

Each Sunday there are "drowning victims" in many churches. There are those who are drowning in sorrows, disappointments, doubts, fears, addictions, etc. They know only too well the reality of the song, "I was sinking deep in sin, far from the peaceful shore." The tragedy of this is that some are drowning right in front of the lifeguard's stand. The songwriter also penned these words, "Soon will the season of rescue be o'er, Soon will they drift to eternity's shore; Haste then, my brother - no time for delay, But throw out the Life Line and save them today."
