Revenue sharing funds set to pay for car, trucks, streets

A public hearing Aug. 20 at 10 a. m. will be conducted to consider expenditures of federal revenue sharing funds.

There is a total of \$11,883.02 in the fund, with none of it earmarked for expenditures so far.

It will be budgeted with \$1,250 for a used police cruiser to be purchased from the state highway patrol, providing an adequate one can be found; \$2,500 for a used dump truck, \$5,000 for a pickup truck, and the remainder of \$3,133.02 to be used for street repair.

This is one of the few funds in the village not operating in the red as of July 31.

Because the utility bills are three months behind, the council said this was the reason for the deficits. Councilman Toy Patton, finance committee member, refused to sign any bills at Tuesday's meeting because "there is no money".

Again the mayor suggested that the council give careful thought to the electrical rates, which she says are not keeping up with the Ohio Power bills. Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., blames the plight of the funds solely on the slow billing.

Gary Bolus, representing Burroughs Corp., from whom the village purchased its new billing machine, attempted to explain that once the machine was adequately programmed, it was time consuming to set up the punchcards and now ledgers.

Once this was done, they would last, he said, and an ordinary month's billing could be done very quickly.

He also explained that Mrs. Joseph Maynard, utility clerk, was receiving her training "on the job" she has been learning the new machine while doing the actual billing.

Bolus explained that it would be possible to do a two month bill, but not the month of the water readings, which Mrs. Maynard did not think could be done. It is hoped now that the July and August bills can be done together.

Homer McClain, a Sandusky street resident, expressed his displeasure with the late billings and said he could not understand why it took anyone so long to learn a machine.

Councilman D. Douglas Brumbach suggested to Bolus that his company pay Mrs. Maynard's salary for three months, because he considered it Burroughs' fault that the machine was not programmed and ready to be used the day it was installed.

It was installed Feb. 28, and it was not until June 27 that the programming was completed and it could be used as planned. The entire council was in agreement that June 27 be the date of the beginning of the service contract and warranty on the machine. Several weeks ago Mayor Elizabeth C. Paddock met with representatives of the company and they agreed then to give the village a two month period to May 1 from the time the machine was delivered.

The ultimatum given to Bolus was to agree to the June 27 date or to remove the machine. Only Patton voted against this, saying "we'll be stuck for another six months."

The council also showed its displeasure concerning the changing of the hours of the utility office. Several meetings ago it voted to maintain Saturday hours. The former village administrator sought an opinion from Solicitor Robert McKown. The opinion clearly showed that since there were no resolutions nor ordinances by the council, the administrator had the power to regulate such hours.

Brumbach said he would prepare a resolution for the next meeting to revert to the old hours, which included Saturday morning, although the mayor, clerk and utility clerk said they had not received any complaints about the change.

The mayor told the council publicly at the meeting, although they had all been called previously, that she had approached the First National Bank of Mansfield about borrowing a sum of money by which the sewers could be repaired and put to use. This move had been agreed upon at a meeting with McKown, Eugene C. Gerken, sewer engineer, and representatives of Squire, Sanders & Dempsey as the most logical way to handle the problem while the litigation continues with the bonding company.

She said the bank's one stipulation was that the Cleveland law firm, which has been hired to assist the village in the litigation, sign in writing to the bank the village's ability to repay a five year loan. Meanwhile, McKown has written to the Farmers Home administration to arrange groundwork of obtaining a long term loan, which will repay the short term loan of five years from the bank.

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PHS alumnus named dean by university in California

A Plymouth High alumnus is the new dean of the school of education of United States International university near San Diego, Cal.

He is Dr. Raymond N. Hatch, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Walter O. Hatch, who was graduated by Ashland college after an outstanding athletic career. He won varsity letters in football, baseball and track and field.

He took his master's degree from Michigan State university at East Lansing, where he was later to teach for a generation before he retired, and the doctorate from Oregon State university at Corvallis.

In the interim he served as an officer of the Corps of Engineers during World War II.

At MSU he was chairman of the department of counseling and educational psychology and served as assistant dean in the college of education and as director of the bureau of research. In 1961-62, he was in charge of an advisory group in Oldenavia that established an educational planning program for the University of the Ryukyus. From 1964 through 1966, he was chief of party of an MSU staff in educational planning for the government of Thailand.

Dr. Hatch is the author of a number of books on educational counseling and guidance, some of which have been published in foreign tongues. Three of them are regarded as definitive texts in the field.

Early in his teaching career, he served on the faculty at Shelby and was a popular basketball referee.

In 1963, Dr. Hatch bought the office of state superintendent of public instruction in Michigan. The GOP, however, carried all counties save one -- Wayne -- and was defeated by 27,000 votes. He is married to the

former Grace Norris.

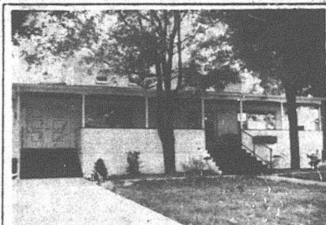

A quiche is a quiche, even in Kentucky style!

The very best way to see America is to have your kids move around.

After three Christmas visits to California, we have seen a great deal of that state, and now we have seen the Cumberland river with its great dam and the Tennessee river. I never dreamed that the latter was so wide and so beautiful. I could not help from wondering what the early settlers thought when they came out of the woods and saw it before them. If you have not seen it, you should head for southwestern Kentucky. It is a state park area and worth a visit. The highways are lovely, and the scenery is beautiful. I did not see one patrol car on it, but take your time between Columbus and Cincinnati.

One of the most polite officers I have met up with lurks between the north and south lanes. We met him going southward, and coming back, there he was, and I watched him in

the mirror turn on his red light and take off after a gray car which had just sailed past five other cars.

Hopefully part of our family will stay in Kentucky a while until we see it all, then I think I will pay them to move to Niagara Falls, which I have been trying to see for a lifetime. Since we have two children, I hopefully would like to visit New Orleans, too. If we weren't so lazy, we could simply get on a plane and see it all, but it is much nicer to have someone to visit, isn't it?

It helps our recipe collection, too. Do you know what they eat for breakfast in Murray, Ky? Here in Ohio it would be a dinner, and it is good. You can mix it up ahead of time

and have it about ready to put together in a short time.

It is quite a quiche, and this recipe really serves six instead of four.

Prepare a nine inch pie crust. Push it aside for a while.

Brown a pound of bulk pork sausage with about a half pound of small whole mushrooms until the liquid is evaporated from the mushrooms. Drain the excess grease and add a half cup of minced parsley, fresh if possible. In a bowl beat up three eggs with a cup of light cream and a half cup of grated Parmesan cheese and a fourth of a teaspoon of salt. Mix together, pour in the pie shell and bake at 400 degrees for about a half hour. By then it should be "set". Let it

stand a little before slicing it.

ANOTHER RECIPE WE came back with is strictly for "munchers". It is not Kentucky but got there via Dallas, Tex., and I am quite sure it got to Dallas via some other place. This is what is so nice about people moving around, the recipes go with them.

This is called Jazabelle sauce, and this makes a great deal and can be cut down, but if you make it, it will come in handy for little presents.

In one large bowl mix an 18 oz. jar of pineapple preserves and one of apple jelly, a can of dry mustard, the small size, a small jar of horse radish and a tablespoon of cracked black pepper. The last three can be mod-

erated as to how hot you can eat it, so taste before mixing it all in. Once this is composed, it is a topping for softened cream cheese, into which

you dip little cracker-like things. It will keep very well in the refrigerator. Now I wish I had brought some back, but I will have to make it up myself.
