Proper honor

Today is Pearl Harbor day.

Thirty-seven years ago, "a day of infamy", Japanese troops attacked Pearl Harbor.

There are still some of us around who fought and bled in the ensuing conflict.

And we resent the cavalier attitude toward the flag and what it stands for.

There've been three home games in the basketball season so far. During each of those, the national anthem was played. The number of persons who paid proper honor to the flag we can count on all 10 fingers. Some of those who violated the rules ought to know better. Some of them are in charge of our children every day.

For their benefit, and for anybody else concerned, here're the facts:

An American citizen is required by law to stand, face the flag, uncover (which means take the hat off, dummy!), and place the right hand over the heart if attired in civilian clothing. Uniformed personnel should render the hand salute.

It goes without saying that non-Americans (and we doubt that there are any to speak of) owe it to us as their hosts to respect our customs and perform similarly.

It's just struck us that we watched only the home side of the floor! Doubtless, the same conditions — and certainly the same rules — apply to the visitors' side.

New parking, traffic rules win approval of council

Changes in through and stop streets and parking regulations proposed by Police Chief W. Robert Seel were approved informally by village council Tuesday night.

With two exceptions, all east and west streets will be through streets and north and south ones will be stop streets, with the exception of West High, which will become a through street and Bell a stop street, and Park avenue, which is now a through street and will remain so until Walnut street is expanded.

Five lanes will be designated in all outgoing lanes of streets leading from the Square save for Plymouth street, which is wide enough for parking and traffic.

There will be no parking in either side of Spring, W. Wall, Dix and New streets.

Because of the location of the Plymouth Elementary school bordering on New street, it will be suggested

that teachers who now park in front of the building be provided with a parking area at the north end of the playground. This would then free the area for mothers to pick up their children and leave New street free for buses.

Cars are to be parked in the side of a street with the flow of traffic. If they are not, a fine of \$10 will be charged.

The entire Square with the exception of designated 20-minute spaces will be limited to two hour parking from 8 a. m. until 6 p. m. Mondays through Saturdays. Sunday and holiday parking will be allowed.

The fine for more than two hours will be \$2.

No U-turns will be allowed in the Square from the west to the east end. The penalty will be a \$10 fine.

Two 20-minute parking spaces will be in front of the village utility building from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. on weekdays, two spaces in front of Plymouth Pharmacy one space in front of Plymouth Schwinn Cyclery, one space in front of Broadway Market.

There will be no parking from the Broadway Market to McQuate's Furniture store unless it is an emergency for the doctor's office.

There will be no parking in the east side of Plymouth street from the post office to the intersection.

Violators using these designated areas can be fined \$2.

This is the first part of a comprehensive traffic code to cover all traffic problems in the village.

Councilman David A. Howard was the spokesman for James Babcock of the Consumers Council, who was unable to be present but will be at the second meeting in January, when he will have all the data completed regarding the village's dispute with Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc., over a new contract.

Now he is recommending the village continue with rates of the contract which expired Oct. 30 until the company and village can reach an agreement.

Howard conveyed some statistics Babcock furnished him, namely, that the company will be getting \$10.966 the first year of its proposed three year contract and the second year a total of \$29.941 more than the present rates, making a total increase for two years of \$40.907 for the 630 gas users being served.

Robert Simmers, Columbia's representative, said the company had no new offer to make and is standing pat.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown was instructed to prepare a "nuisance" ordinance, which may solve the problem of a Sandusky street tavern and its neighbors. Both Councilmen G. Thomas Moore and Michael Taylor said it is necessary that the business and its neighbors have a good environment in

which to exist. Seel told the council the proprietor, Michael Ward, is cooperating and has discontinued the loud music.

The problem for the most part is caused by some unruly customers, Taylor said this is a police matter. Seel said the village does not have a large enough force to keep an eagle eye on the offenders and still take care of the rest of the village.

James C. Root, village administrator received one bid for zeolite for the water softening system. It was from J. Ulligan, Mansfield. If what is there now can be reused, the cost will be \$5.912 plus freight, and if not, it will be \$7.817.

He asked the council to table the bid for a few weeks until the results of tests of the old zeolite are completed.

Only one bid was received for one fire department vehicle, the 1947 International Three, were advertised. Fire Chief Wayne E. Strine sent a message to the council that he does not think they were adequately advertised. The mayor sent the ads to one municipal magazine and three daily papers.

Because Eugene C. Gerken, sanitary sewer engineer, has not sent the figures that the village needs for its latest work with American Empire Finance, David Howard made a motion instructing Clerk Raymond L. Brooks to write to Gerken stating that it is necessary that he comply with the village will resort to legal action.

Fireman's widow suing village for \$1.17 million

The widow of a fireman who was killed Dec. 19, 1976, when a water truck operated by the fire department over turned in Townline Road 111, Ripley township, seeks \$1.17 million in damages from the village and three equipment manufacturers.

Dorothy Didion Miles, remarried and living in Waynesville, southeast of Lima, accuses the village and its mayor, Elizabeth G. Paddock, the metal products division of Goodyear International Corp., Akron, Inter-

national Harvester Co. and Porterville Stainless Equipment Co., Porterville, of negligence and breach of warranty.

Her attorney, Stanley M. Chesley, Cincinnati, who filed the suit in Huron county common pleas court Nov. 29, alleges in the suit that the village was negligent in failing to notify Didion that the truck had not been inspected and in permitting him to ride in an unsafe, defective vehicle. It further states that the three manu-

facturers breached warranties in that the truck was in fact defective and not properly inspected. Porterville manufactured the truck's stainless steel water tank and Goodyear made the rim assembly that held the tank in place.

Mrs. Miles, now the wife of Larry Miles, claims \$920,000 in compensatory damages, \$250,000 in punitive damages and attorney's fees.

The village was given 28 days in which to reply to the suit.

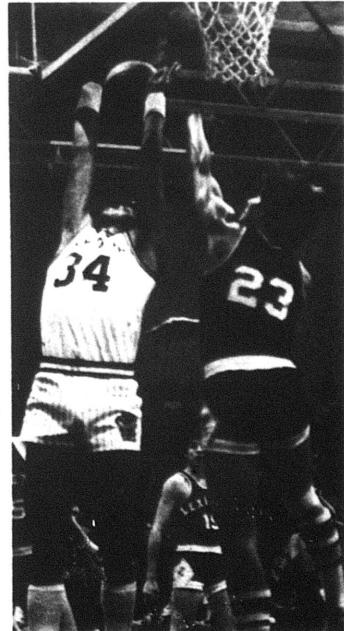

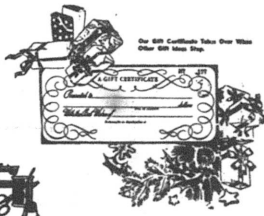

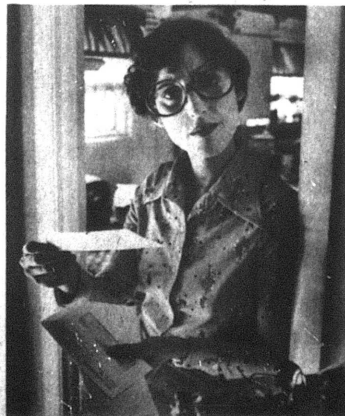

Red nips Bucks, 54 to 52; Lexington victorious

Plymouth managed to defeat a stubborn Buckeye Central team here Saturday. But it took a perfect performance in a three minute overtime to do it.

The score was 54 to 52.

And the hero was Ron Schuller.

He shot two free throws with 47 seconds left in regulation play and led the lead at 45 to 44, only to see it tied with nine seconds left when Dan Wurm bugged a field goal from underneath, after Jerry Wheeler had shot a free throw to make it 46 to 44.

And Schuller came through in the clutch in overtime when, with 30 seconds remaining, and the score knotted at 52, he tipped to the line after Wurm fouled him and calmly shot two more free throws.

Even so, Schuller and the Red team and about 60 high school pupils and a gaggle of adult diehards who turn out for every game had to gnaw their nails for the victory. Because Buckeye Central came storming back and Jeff Ream, named most valuable player of the weekend series of two games, had a chance to expand the lead. He went to the line on a violation by Joe Hicks but he missed the first of a one-and-one situation.

There were six seconds left when Ream essayed his free throw.

Plymouth shot out to a comfortable lead early in the game. The Big Red matched the Bucks shot for shot in the first period, which ended in a tie at 10, and then forged to the fore in the second quarter with a sterling performance from the floor. Plymouth bagged seven of 14 tries for field goal. The Bucks had to settle for a poor two of nine. Only five free throws kept them in contention.

The visitors outscored Plymouth by a point during the third period, when Plymouth shot five of 11 and the Bucks only five of 16.

It was in the final quarter that Buckeye Central began to move.

Its shooting improved and it carried the game to Plymouth with good results.

The Bucks managed eight field goals in 13 tries in the final eight minutes, whereas Plymouth missed 12 of 14 tries. Only Plymouth's accuracy at the free throw line, where it went eight for 10, kept the Big Red in the game.

During the overtime, Plymouth shot twice for field goal and was successful each time, once by Schuller and once by Ream. An outburst of 10 players shot two free throws.

Plymouth overall shot 21 of 48 field goal tries and 12 of 15 free throws. The Bucks went 23 of 56 and six of 11.

Lexington handed Plymouth its head late in the first half here Friday night and a good beginning resulted in a horrendous defeat.

The score was 75 to 49.

Plymouth made a contest of it for 16 minutes and actually led for a time midway in the second quarter. But the Minutemen strung together nine unanswered points to close out the first half and the resulting lead of five points at 34 to 29 was never challenged again.

Lexington went to work early in the second half and blew Plymouth from the floor. After the Big Red had in 300 baskets, Lexington scored nine more unan-

sweet points and never was in trouble again.

Plymouth was limited to six points, all field goals, in 11 shots during the third period, while the Minutemen were scoring with nine of 17 tries for field goal and adding three free throws for 21.

Overall, the Minutemen outshot Plymouth badly. They made 33 of 69 tries for field goal and missed only five of 14 free throws. The Big Red, correspondingly, scored with only 17 of 47 shots at the basket and missed 11 of 26 free throws.

Lexington outreached Plymouth, despite the fact Ron Schuller outjumped his opponent at center jump. Schuller took down 13 of Plymouth's 26 rebounds. Lexington was credited with 31 rebounds.

Eleven Lexington players broke into the scoring column. Brent Yates had 22 points, lead all scorers. Steve Calendine scored 15, the only other Minuteman in double figures.

Schuller had 16 and Jeff Ream 12 for the losers.

Coach Keith Diebler stuck with his starters most of the

way in a futile effort to contain the Lexington attack, which was relentless from the opening whistle. The Minutemen made good on nine of 19 in the first period, establishing an 18 to 13 lead; on five of 12 in the second period, on nine of 17 in the third quarter and on 10 of 21 going to the end.

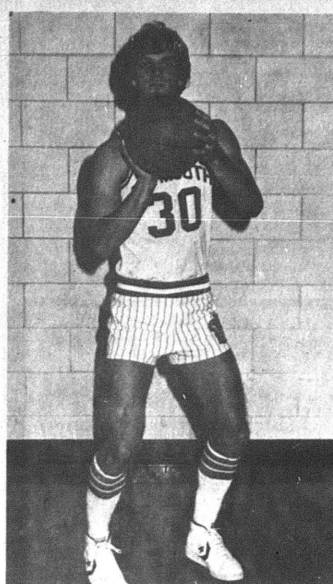

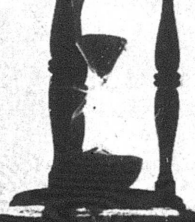
