Complaints of untidy yards laid before village council

Complaints by angry neighbors about untidy yards beset village council July 18, recording once again the seasonal appearance of householders who believe stoutly that property values are depressed if some practices are allowed.

A delegation of Maple street residents came in a body to complain about a neighbor whose yard is also filled with non-operable vehicles.

They also complained about the odors from dogs tied up and one resident said he could no longer picnic in his yard. Another said the debris was causing a rat problem.

William Ross, who was the spokesman for the group, said that Plymouth used to be a neat, nice town, and now it is not.

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock said that a notice will be sent to the offending householder asking him to comply with the ordinance and that the Huron county health department will be called about the debris.

New scale set for free meals in cafeteria

A new income scale for determining which children are eligible for free or reduced-price school lunches and breakfasts has been established for the 1978-79 school year, State Dept. of Public Instruction Franklin R. Walzer announces.

The scale is modified annually by the U. S. Department of Agriculture which sponsors the school lunch, school breakfast and special milk programs.

Eligibility is based on family income as it corresponds to family size. Children from a family of four, for example, with an income at or below \$8,110 would qualify for free meals and milk. Those from a family of the same size with an income between \$8,110 and \$12,660 would qualify for reduced-price meals. The charge for a reduced-price meal is not to exceed 20 cents for lunch and 10 cents for breakfast.

Children from families not meeting the income

criteria on the scale may qualify for benefits if the family has other unusual expenses such as exceptional medical responsibilities, shelter costs exceeding 30 per cent of its income, special education expenses for mental or physically disabled children, or disaster or casualty losses. If a family member becomes unemployed, children of the family may receive benefits during the period of unemployment, and in certain cases, foster children are eligible.

Schools operating child nutrition programs must provide assurance that no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin. The program must be administered in a way that no pupil becomes aware that another is receiving benefits. Applications for free or reduced-price meals and free milk will be sent to all families through the individual school districts.

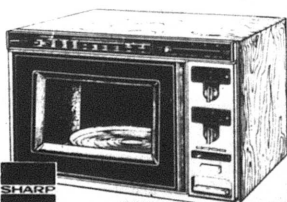

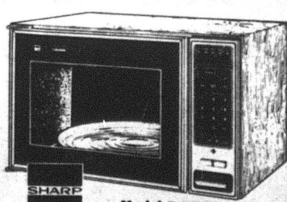

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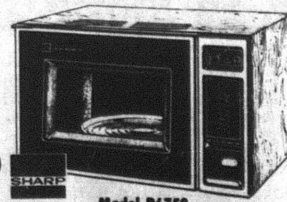

Class 9, "Seashore", calls for use of driftwood

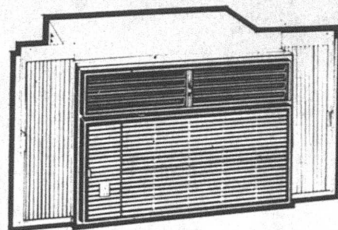
or shells. Class 10, "Disneyland", is for juveniles, in two divisions: up to 10 years
