New scale set for free meals in cafeteria

A new income scale for determining which children are eligible for free or reduced-price school lunches and breakfasts has been established for the 1978-79 school year, state Supt. of Public Instruction Franklin B. Walter announces.

The scale is modified annually by the U. S. Department of Agriculture which sponsors the school lunch, school breakfast and special milk programs.
Eligibility is based on

and special milk programs.

Eligibility is based on family income as it corresponds to family size. Children from a family of four, for example, with an income at or below \$8,-110 would quality for free meals and milk. Those from a family of the same size with an income between \$8,110 and \$12,660 would quality for reduced-price meals. The charge for a reduced-price meal is not to exceed 20 cents for lunch and 10 cents for break-fast. Children from families

not meeting

qualify for benefits if the family has other unusual expenses such as excep-tional medical responsitional medical responsi-bilities, shelter costs ex-ceeding 30 per cent of its income, special educa-tion expenses for mental-ly or physically disabled children, or disaster or casualty losses, if a fam-ily member becomes unemployed, children of the family may receive benefits during the period of unemployment, and in certain cases form certain cases, for children are eligible.

Schools operating child nutrition programs must provide assurance that no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin. The program must be administered in such a way that no pupil becomes aware that another is receiving benefits. Applications for free or reduced-price meals and free milk will be sent to ali families through the individual school districts.

\$16 million in law suits

Settlement out of court of damage suits totalling over \$16 million has been reached in the two-car collision at Boughtonville and Walnut roads, New Haven township, on May 16, 1977, that took one life and left two young boys in commas.

Raymond E. Enzor, 28, Willard, driving the west-bound car, was killed. Brother of Michael Bonham, driver of the north-bound car, Randy Bonham, and another passenger, Andrew Dannemiller, were so severely injured they went into comas and have been in Mansfield General and

willard Area hospitals ever since.
Three other passengers, all riding with Enzor, were injured. These
were Mary J. Kilgore,
Margie Kilgore and Anna
DeWitt, all of Willard.




