He raised a fine family here, carticipated in church and fraternal affairs, freely gave of his time and experience in civic matters not connected with government, and ultimately, with his wife, the former Gladys Ruckman, donated the site on which the wasming pool was built.

The secret to his success was that he got along, And to get along, as the late Sam Rayburn once said, you've got to go along.

The rest of us who survive him could do worse than to follow Luther Fetters's lead. He went to his grave yesterday sure in the knowledge that he did the best he could, with what he thad to work with, and that his neighbors prospered by it.

At the same time, it is sad to record the passing of a young husband and father who fought like a tiger against a cerrible disease.

David Rath was a good Christian and a civic benefactor. The boys he sought to lead in the Cub Scout organization will miss him. To his family and his friends, grateful community extends its deepest sympathy.
