

Interest conflict?

Case of July 24 at issue

Whether it was proper for the presiding magistrate of Plymouth mayor's court to have adjudicated a case in which a beneficiary of a plea of no contest or guilty was his brother will be brought before village council Tuesday night.

On July 18, at 10:35 p. m., Donald A. Dalton, Willard route 2, was charged by Plymouth police with failure to maintain an assured clear distance after his car struck that of Randall Howard at Route 61 and Parkwood drive.

Dalton was summoned to appear in mayor's court on July 24.

On that day, Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock left the state for a brief summer sojourn.

The president pro tempore of the council, in her stead, presided over the mayor's court that afternoon.

David Howard enrolled in court in proper fashion, so far as The Advertiser can ascertain.

When Dalton was asked to plead, Howard did not state that he is related to the only beneficiary of a plea of no contest or guilty, Randall Howard, who is his younger brother.

Dalton pleaded no contest and was found guilty by David Howard. He assessed a fine of \$50 and four costs.

"A magistrate or a

judge," sources in the Ohio Bar association at Columbus told The Advertiser, "must not only be honest but he must not give the appearance of being dishonest. It is not proper for a magistrate or a judge to hear a case in which a member of his family is involved, even if only as a witness. The magistrate or judge should excuse himself and have another judge hear the case."

Solicitor Robert A. McKown, the village's legal adviser, told The Advertiser "Mr. Howard did not at any time ask me or my associate, Mr. Schaefer, about this matter. It was wrong for him to have heard the case."

Earlier, in a case in which her husband was the complaining witness, the mayor excused herself and had the then president pro tempore of the council, James C. Root, preside over the court.

How is Randall Howard a beneficiary of a noncontest or guilty plea? Conviction of the accused means he is liable for damages to young Howard's vehicle.

Plymouth schools will open Tuesday.

Room assignments for high school pupils will be posted on the north door of the building outside the principal's office.

Warning bell will be sounded at 7:45 a. m., tardy bell at 7:48 a. m., dismissed bell at 2:40 p. m.

Tenth graders may collect their schedules Wednesday between 8 a. m. and 3 p. m.

Elementary pupils will begin classes at 8:45 a. m. and dismiss at 3:45 p. m.

Bus schedules will operate at the same times as on the last day of school. Pupils who ride buses should be ready to board ten minutes early on the first day.

Parents are reminded that a new Ohio law requires that all pupils be immunized against diph-

theria, tetanus, whooping cough, poliomylitis, measles and rubella. Pupils not satisfactorily immunized may remain in school for 14 days until the immunization is completed.

All cafeteria will operate as usual.

Lunch prices have been advanced five cents. These are 55 cents for pupils in grades one through eight, 65 cents for high school pupils.

Applications for free or reduced price lunches will be sent home with pupils on the first day of school. Until these applications are approved, all

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pupils must pay full price for lunches.

Some workbook prices have advanced. These are kindergarten, \$5.15; first grade, \$12.35; second grade, \$7.95; third grade, \$7.35; fourth grade, \$9.70; fifth grade, \$8; sixth grade, \$6.20.

10% Schools give pay raises

A 10 per cent pay raise for administrators and non-certificated personnel was approved by Plymouth Board of Education Aug. 23.

The board's architect, D. James Crawfish, Mansfield, was present to discuss energy-saving remodeling of Plymouth Elementary school but no decisions were taken.

Willard Taxi Co. was awarded a contract to transport handicapped pupils to schools outside the district.

Mary Chronister, Shiloh, was hired as part-time cook in the Shiloh cafeteria. She succeeds Carolyn Seaman, on sick leave.

Booster club was accorded permission to use pupils to solicit funds.

Red opens last JAC season here tomorrow

"Although team spirit is at a record high, Plymouth's Big Red football team is given almost no chance of winning the 1978 Johnny Appleseed conference championship in late its final year in the league."

The "experts" say the title will be decided by the "four big schools" -- Lexington, Ontario, Clear Fork or Loudonville. At Loudonville, in particular, the coach flatly says,

by excluding Plymouth, that "those four will fight it out for the championship."

Plymouth opens its 1978 campaign here tomorrow night against Seneca East with a seasoned offense and a defense that needs some experience. The first half of the season is comprised of engagements with Class A schools of lesser achievement, whereas the last half is taken up with

JAC opponents, of whom only one, Crestview, in the season finale, is Class A.

This is Coach Mike McFarren's fourth season at the helm of the Big Red and this year's team shows it.

It has size up front, some speed in the backfield, and some promise from younger players.

One setback was the failure of Mike Messer,

the all-conference running back of 1977, to turn out for the 1978 team.

But McFarren is looking to other seasoned players to take up the slack.

His offensive line is seasoned save for one player, Scott Baker, a 145-pound end. His backfield is experienced save for one player. In two-season scrimmages, the squad has acquitted itself fairly well. In the first

match, it outplayed Mapleton, which admittedly is a second division competitor in the Firelands conference. In the second, it was defeated, one score to none, by Hillsdale, which is a strong entrant in the Wayne county league.

This team is a two-way team almost entirely. The experienced players on offense will be called upon to do double

duty on defense, for the most part.

McFarren is likely to start Mike Wheeler over the ball, flanked by Barry Tuttle and Greg Reno at guards and by the two big men, Mark Lewis, 235 pounds, and Rodney Dye, 200 pounds, at tackles. Scott Baker will be the free receiver, and he's green. Gary Reno may be the tight end, and he's only slightly less green.

Mike Berberick and Jim Robinson are fighting it out for quarterback. Berberick has slightly the more experience. Capt. Jim Wallace and John Ross, both seasoned running backs, will carry the mail. Terry Tash, who won all-conference selection on defense last year, is likely to round out the backfield by playing the slot position.

On defense, Greg Reno will play middle guard, Lewis and Dye the tackles, Tuttle and Gary Reno the ends, Ross and Wallace are the linebackers. Robinson and Tash are the corner backs. Berberick is the safety and Greg Gillum the monster man.

Game time is 8 p. m. Lions club will serve a chili supper in the high school cafeteria Friday from 6 to 8 p. m. and again after the game.

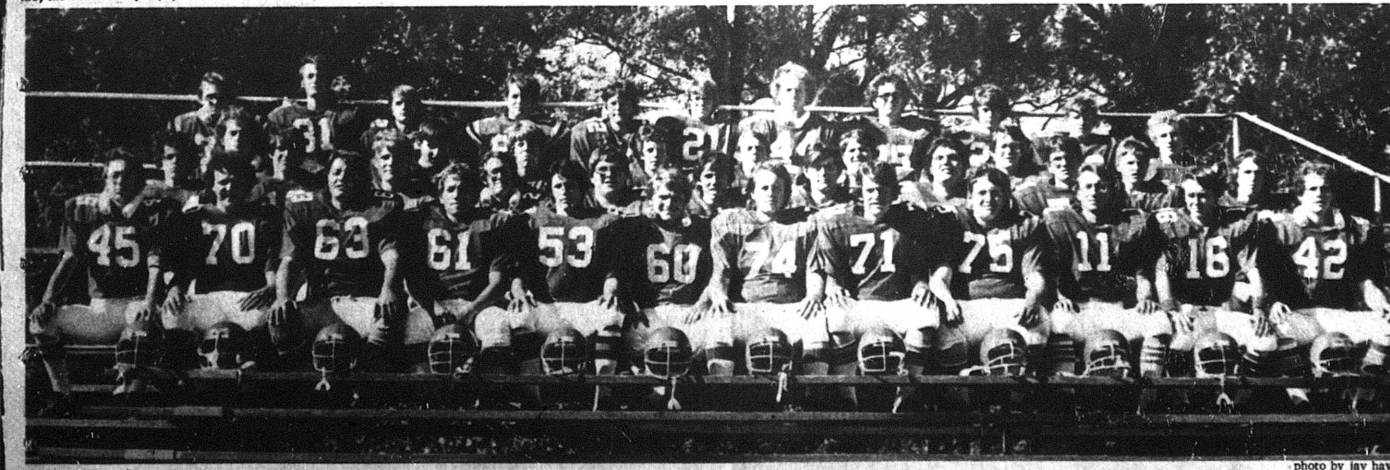

It's artichoke that adds zest to late summer salad

For years I have tried my very best to settle problems of whose dog was doing what in whose yard.

ry friend who thinks he owns a whole block and is willing to protect it from other dogs. Now it has happened to us. I planted a package of basil in a large pot and left it outside the kitchen door where it is sunny. Our crop was coming along beautifully for a couple of weeks, and I was beginning to savor the

taste of the spaghetti sauce it would make. The other morning I went to water it, and half of it was plain dead. There was one answer. A dog mistook it for a rest room.

The worst part about it all is that I can kind of guess which neighborhood dog it was. He is the most likable hound around who visits our yard each morning. I like to think he wants to be sure we are all right. We will really miss him when he leaves for college this week. Meanwhile, we are doing everything to rescue the basil, which will have to undergo a washing like I guess it happens to all of us, but who can we

complain to?
Since this is the big season of potluck things, I think I have come up with something most people do not even think about. For which I am grateful because I love all the potato salads and macaroni and baked beans the others bring.
