Mayor fires back at David Howard, alleges conflict

Another round in the bout between Councilman David A. Howard and Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock was fought Oct. 2.

When the mayor asked for approval of her monthly court account, which amounted to \$3,093 for the general fund, Howard said, "I can't believe her." He said he wouldn't accept any report from her so long as she is mayor. Howard said there are cases before the court that are contested and should be transferred to other courts for adjudication or trial. One of these is the case of Orlo J. Strohm, he said.

She replied that Strohm had engaged in plea bargaining, that he has pleaded guilty, that he has been fined and that he will pay the fine.

Howard then said there are other cases, but he refused to identify them, saying "I've been told about these in confidence".

Councilman Michael R. Taylor was visibly upset because he could not reconcile the mayor's report with that of Chief W. Robert Seel. The mayor pointed out to him that her report was five pages long and that he was looking only at the last page.

There being no approval from the council, the mayor simply handed the report and her check to the clerk.

She said Monday that Howard's attacks on her honesty are needless.

"I made one mistake and I owned up to it. Does David Howard think I am so stupid as to make the same mistake again? I challenge him to show me or anybody else that there are any cases in this court that should have been transferred to another court and if he can do so, I'll resign on the spot. But if he can't, then he should resign. What's more, his conduct in counseling a young man who was arrested by the police is an obvious conflict of interest, a matter on which I chided him once before, and when it comes to motions of censure and overkill, it wouldn't be such a bad idea to pass one about him."

Seneca East has scored only one touchdown in its first five games. The three scores it got against Lucas bring the season's total to four.

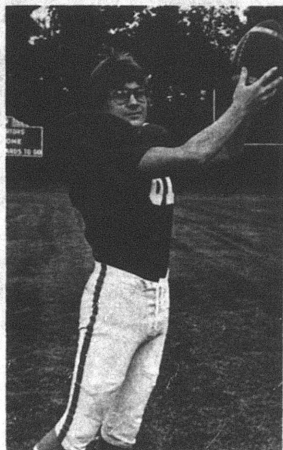
As for Plymouth, this contest affords the Big Red a chance to avert a winless season. Coach David Coulter is emphasizing this week that mistakes are what cost Plymouth opportunities to win or tie in at least three games. In the last two games, Plymouth has fumbled 11 times and lost all of them.

The ground game has produced respectable yard-

age in the last two outings, certainly enough to win at this level of competition. The mistakes at critical junctures pulled the teeth of the ground game just when it seemed to be establishing some momentum.

For some 12th graders - Tim Keene, Gary King, Doug Miller, Gary Ryman and Gary Blankenship - who've never been beaten by Seneca East, this one on Saturday is something of a challenge.

On the basis of the two teams' performances against Hopewell-Loudon, the guess here is that Plymouth ought to be favored, but only slightly.

Fumbles lead to three Crestview scores, Red falls

Fumbles led to three Crestview touchdowns in a Black Valley conference football game here Friday and Plymouth took its worst beating ever at the hands of Crestview before the smallest home crowd in memory.

The score was 39 to 6. After a scoreless first period, in which the Big Red offense advanced briefly into Cougar territory before an interception killed the drive, Phil Gowitka intercepted Fred Stimpert's pass at the Plymouth 38. On second down, James Jamerson fumbled. When the Cougars recovered, they set out to score. A 51-yard dash by Scott Pruner through right tackle led the Cougars to the Red 10, whereupon Pruner went in on the next play. The pass to Phil Pratt for the PATs was good.

The clock read 9:01 in the second period. Crestview kicked off and on the second play, attempting to pass, Steve Tackett was ruled to have fumbled. With possession at the Plymouth eight, Crestview lost 20 yards in two plays on penalties. A flank pass to Pruner brought the Cougars back to the Plymouth 18, whence Stimpert passed to Lyle Chronister for the second score. It took the Cougars

eight plays to go to the last eight yards. Chronister took Stimpert's pass for the PATs. The clock read 7:08.

Crestview was not yet finished. In the next series, after a pass completion for 20 yards to Gary Blankenship off punt formation on fourth down, Plymouth fumbled again. Crestview recovered at the Red 40. Pruner got 15, a 16-yard pass to Pratt gave the Cougars first down at the nine, and Pruner in two plays got home. The last one started from the two. Troy Miele ran the PATs.

Ahead 21 of 0 at the half, Crestview had all the better of it statistically. With 32 plays, Crestview had seven first downs, 124 yards rushing, 42 yards passing on four completions in eight tries. Plymouth, with 28 plays, had five first downs, 58 yards rushing, 25 yards passing with one completion in four tries. Crestview lost two throws by interception, Plymouth only one.

Crestview intercepted Tackett to stop the first series after the second half kickoff but could not advance and was compelled to punt. Plymouth returned the favor. Gowitka's high kick fell into the arms of Lyle Chronister, who threaded his way down the north sideline for 46 yards and a fourth score. Brian Birchell ran the PATs. By this time Plymouth was clearly out of it. The despair on the bench was so thick it

could be cut with a knife.

Plymouth obtained possession early in the fourth period at the Crestview 22, having earlier lost the ball by fumbling at the Cougar 12. A short Crestview punt was downed at the 22. Plymouth managed the score in three plays, Blankenship bolting in from the one on second down. The run for PATs was far short.

Crestview was to score once again.

It took the kickoff and marched 63 yards in 10 plays. Stimpert rolled out to his right to get it home from the one. He kicked the PAT.

This in its first season in the new conference, Plymouth has failed to win a game. Only one game with each opponent counts in the standings. Plymouth plays Crestview again in a week's time, on Crestview's field, where there have been problems with keeping the lights lit. Plymouth is probably praying the lights don't come on at all.
