

Old Charley had a word for what council's done

It is little short of astonishing that some members of the village council didn't grasp from the beginning what was happening with regard to the village bank accounts.

When the council took over on Jan. 1, 1978, there were deficits in some funds, most notably the general fund, the electric fund and the water fund, which is exactly where the deficits are now.

Bills came due month after month and income didn't amount to enough to pay them and to overcome the red ink. Matter of fact, the income didn't amount to enough to pay the bills, let alone overcome the red ink. So the red ink grew.

Since the beginning of the year, there has been careful surveillance over the appropriations, as distinguished from the cash balances, in the village, on the theory that the council knew what it was doing when it passed the appropriations ordinance. In September it was reported that the drawdown on each appropriation was fairly consistent with the total appropriation and no serious difficulty that could not be overcome by postponing payment of bill or two (such as ours, which amounts to nearly \$700) was anticipated.

Expenses of the electric system, for example, have consistently been insufficient to meet disbursements, place 10 per cent of the revenue in the reserve fund, as required by ordinance, and leave a small increment for the next month. So the clerk-treasurer, to pay bills, went to the electric reserve fund for cash. When the electric fund recovers its deficits - and presumably the recently enacted rate increase will accomplish that, although not in the immediate future - the money can be repaid to the reserve fund. We should keep our fingers crossed that no calamity befalls the electric system that will require ready cash that we don't now have.

Admittedly the procedure is a shaky one. It was done in Cleveland and the creditors of the city howled their heads off. Plymouth has no creditors. What else was the clerk to do? Stop all payrolls? Despite admonitions by the mayor on a number of occasions that the fiscal situation needed attention, the council dragged its feet. The new income tax was decided upon as a last resort, without thorough study and debate, and the money spent on two such taxes is simply down the drain.

What of the water system? It's in the red. Is the council about to raise water rates? If not, why not? And by how much?

Before the beginning of spring, it was clear that the general fund was in serious trouble. Yet two councilmen brazenly proposed pay increases and increased fringe benefits and proceeded to push for them. These were eventually enacted. Where is the money coming from to meet them? The clerk was told to pay the increases yet he had no fresh revenues to pay them. And the council didn't do anything to find them.

It is axiomatic in management that before one spends for goods or services, he sees to it the wherewithal to pay for them is at hand or forthcoming.

This council didn't do that.

At another time, during this season, Charles Dickens put into the mouth of one of his most colorful characters, Ebenezer Scrooge, a phrase that expresses our sentiments exactly: "Bah, humbug!"

Council reenacts tax

1% levied for five years on residents, non-residents who work here

A one per cent income tax, to be paid by every resident of the village who works here and every non-resident who works here, but not by residents who pay a one per cent municipal income tax elsewhere, was approved by three to one vote of village council on Nov. 21. It will take effect Saturday.

The council could not command a quorum at its regular session on Nov. 20. Councilmen G. Thomas Moore and Edward O. Ramsey were absent. Moore on other business, Ramsey on vacation. Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock was in New Jersey on family business. Councilman David A. Howard, president pro tempore of the council, presided.

After an attack on the clerk-treasurer, Raymond L. Brooks, saying that massive amounts of money placed in special accounts have been spent to pay general expenses, Howard said the

council must find within 24 hours a source of money to cover the deficit, which he estimated at \$190,000.

He said the council would meet Nov. 21 at 6 p.m. Howard waved a statement from the village depositor, First National Bank of Mansfield, showing that the electric reserve fund, which Brooks represented in his monthly report to have \$130,000 on deposit, contained only \$45,000. The fire pump fund, which is supposed to contain funds to be levied that will continue to build on proceeds of the levy until there is enough to buy a new pump, simply does not exist at the bank, Howard said.

"What are these numbers you have been giving us month to month?" He asked. "Are they fictitious?"

Brooks replied he had to use what funds were available to pay bills. He said Ohio Power Co. would cut off

electricity to the village if the bill wasn't paid.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown capitalized the situation: "In effect, what the village has been doing, without council legislation, is borrowing X number of dollars from the electric reserve fund and X number of dollars from other funds to defray the expenses of the entire village."

Howard suggested the village books be audited as soon as possible. Brooks promised to call the state auditor on Nov. 21. Plymouth is not due for a routine audit for another year. To have a special audit, a special request in writing must be made to the auditor.

McKown agreed this would be a good idea.

Howard continued after his prey like an angry hound after a rabbit.

"I'm concerned with the fact this village has been in violation of the statutes. You

have been in violation of the statutes," Howard told Brooks.

"I hope Mr. Brooks realizes the ramifications of what he's been doing over the last few months," he added.

Brooks denied that he has misappropriated any funds. "This money has all gone to pay village bills and nothing else," he asserted.

Mrs. Allan Raymond suggested the electric system be advertised for sale. Howard said that solution wouldn't help the village at all. He claimed the time interval between the decision and a sale, if it should be approved, would be 18 to 24 months, "and we need money right away."

McKown said the village could include an escape clause in the bidding procedure, under which bids could be rejected if they are too low. But, he said, the prospective

buyers probably would not want to bid if an escape clause is included.

On Nov. 22, Councilman Ervin Howard voted nay on motions to approve the new income tax. He refused to disclose his reasons.

The three vote was cast by Mrs. Raymond, Moore and Councilman Michael R. Taylor, only one of whom was elected by the voters. (Although Mrs. Raymond was elected Nov. 6 to a term that begins on Jan. 1.)

The new tax will be collected from and after Dec. 1.

Alvin Kelley, tax administrator, rushed to get a tax census into the mails by Saturday. Most prospective taxpayers received them Monday.

Taylor said that so long as the village fiscal crisis is so deep, he will not accept any councilman's pay. This amounts to \$240 a year.

Will PJVS win law suit to get election?

Pioneer Joint Vocational school will take Ohio's secretary of state to court to seek a reversal of his ruling that it can't stage an election on Dec. 19 to obtain a \$92/100 of a mill operating levy.

Secretary of State Anthony Celebrezze ruled that Ohio law holds no election can be conducted within 10 days of Christmas.

His ruling in fact was the casting of a fifth vote by the Richland county board of elections, which balloted two to two on the question, even though the county prosecutor, by law its legal adviser, said in a written opinion the Pioneer board is correct in its contention that an election can be conducted on Dec. 19.

The proposed tax, which has been held in abeyance, is comprised of 42/100 of a mill of renewed taxation and one-half of a mill of fresh

taxation. Despite the urging of many of its friends, the Pioneer board adamantly refused to submit the proposal as two levies, a renewal and a fresh tax. It says "We need them both and can't survive without both."

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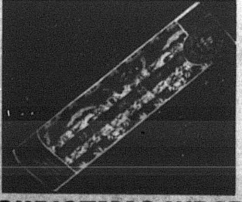
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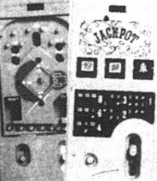

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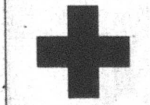
