accounting applicable to the method of accounting regularly employed and without deduction of Federal taxes based on income, and without deducting taxes imposed by this

income, and without deducting taxes imposed by hus Ordinance.

H. Non-Resident — An individual, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, association or other entity domiciled outside the Village of Plymouth.

Should it appear that any taxpayer has paid more than the amount of the tax to which the Village is entitled under the provisions of this Ordinance, a refund of the amount so overpaid shall be made, provided a proper claim for refund of such overpayment of tax has been filled by the taxpayer, or same may be applied toward the declaration of tax due for the resuling year. # It's time for dog tags

Richland county auditor announces the sale of dog tags and several new places where they may be obtained. He has arranged for vari-ous places over the county to sell tags.

Huston Carry Out, Shiloh, nd First National Bank of fansfield, Plymouth, will

and First National Dans on Mansfield, Plymouth, will sell the tags.

"This will be the second year we are using a new type heavier tag, which is shaped like a heart and has a hook on it which is placed on the collar," Swank says. "We have saved \$3800 on this new type of tag due to the high price of the rivets used over the previous years. Many complaints were received because of the difficulty in placing the old type tag on some of the kinds of collars. Cards will NOT be mailed to each individual dog owner. The cost of the cards, printing and postage was very costly to the county and only a few returned the cards. The over-all savings of changing

this procedure will amount to approximately \$10,000 to the tax payers. The county auditor is placing a cut-out in the local newspapers and dog owners may cut the form out, fill it in and mail it along with a check to the additor's office which will in turn will send the tag direct to the owner. Dog tags are now on sale and may be purchased through the Jan. 20 deadline without paying a penalty. The price is \$6 a tag and \$30 for kennel license. After Jan. 20 there is a penalty of \$2 per tag and \$5 on kennel license."


