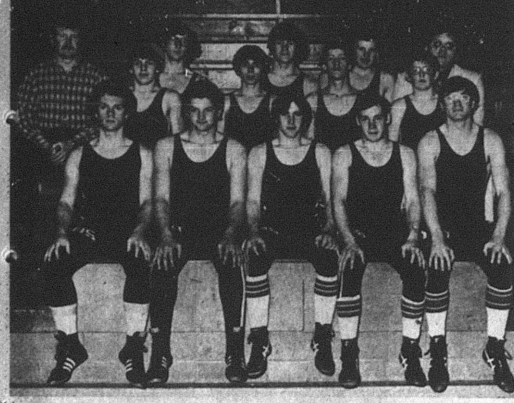

Mapleton downs Big Red, 79 to 55

The lights went out in Mapleton's gymnasium Tuesday night, on occurrence that's not so rare at that school.

Plymouth scored the first basket but then the Mounties took it to the Big Red and walked away with a 79 to 55 victory.

After Co-Capt. Randy Keeley, who led all scorers with 19 points, bagged the first field goal with a garbage shot, Mapleton ripped off 12 unanswered points, four of them by Tim Rogers. Brad Metcalfe, who eventually went to the bench with five personal fouls and a technical foul, meshed a field goal and the Mounties scored five more points before Plymouth could produce another score.

The period concluded with Mapleton at 20 and Plymouth at eight.

Plymouth played Mapleton even in the second period, each team getting 21 points. At the Mounties scored eight field goals and Plymouth only seven.

Mapleton outscored Plymouth in the second half. The Mounties got 20 in the third quarter and 18 in the fourth. Meanwhile, Plymouth managed only 10 in the third and 5 in the fourth.

Once again, it was mistakes by an inexperienced team that cost Plymouth early. During the first period, Plymouth was charged with nine turnovers, Mapleton with just four. And by halftime, the figures were 12 and 10, respectively. Plymouth wound up with 24, Mapleton with 23.

The Mounties controlled the boards, 27 to 21. And they outshot the visitors with exactly 50 per cent, 32

successes in 64 tries for field goal. Plymouth fired for field goals 54 times and was successful with 24, a percentage of 44, enough to win a dozen games.

Marty scored 16 for Plymouth, the only other player in double figures.

Mapleton had four in double figures, led by Jeff Fingulin with 17. Rogers had 15, Bob Schneider and Rich Ashton 11 apiece.

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'Junk' foods can't be sold or served in local schools

Junk foods won't be available during school hours to pupils of Plymouth Local School district, Plymouth Board of Education ruled Monday night.

In a new policy statement, the board said it won't serve or allow to be served "foods that are either low in nutritional value and high in caloric content or low in nutritional value for the cost per serving."

Specifically, candy and chewing gum, soft drinks, punches and fruit drinks, potato chips and snack chips, ice cream and ice cream products and sweet rolls, including doughnuts, cakes and cookies, won't be sold on school premises between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m.

A policy on the reporting of child abuse was also adopted. Teachers who believe a pupil has been abused are directed to report the fact to their principal, counselor or superintendent, in that order. If teachers believe their concerns have not been dealt with suitably, they are authorized to make direct telephone calls to Richland County Children's Services. Principals will notify Children's Services or the police department when cases of suspected child abuse or neglect have been reported.

"Abuse" is defined as sexual contact or sexual conduct with a minor, unusual, cruel or prolonged punishment as a means of enforcing discipline, and evidence of injury inflicted other than by accidental means.

"Neglect" is defined as abandonment of a child by his parents, lack of proper parental care, failure of parents to provide necessary subsistence, education or medical care, failure of parents to provide special care made necessary by the child's mental condition and placement of a child with a non-relative for unusual time periods.

The board will conduct its annual reorganization meeting Jan. 4 at 4:30 p.m. Authorization was given for Kerstin Marie Bond, a kindergarten, to attend classes in the district as a tuition pupil, pending construction of a home by the child's parents.

Fiscal problems plague council, Seel, Root

Reenactment of the one per cent municipal income tax overshadowed other actions by village council Dec. 4.

The need to economize affected every deliberation of the council.

Village Administrator James C. Root was obviously displeased with the prospect that some staff cuts need to be made.

Police Chief W. Robert Seel told the council he has reduced mileage on routine patrols in the village, but the result is there has been more vandalism.

The mayor questioned why the Howard brothers instructed the clerk to not pay village employees for Thanksgiving day, which is a holiday provided for in the pay ordinance.

Councilman G. Thomas Moore answered by saying it was an emergency measure until the financial situation became less clouded and they would receive what is due them in time.

Fire Chief Wayne E. Strine was unhappy about his reserve funds for his department, which appear on paper but are not actually there because all funds go into one checking account for the village. As one fund went in the red bills were paid and payrolls met out of the one checking account.

He threatened court action for misappropriating fire levy money.

He also said that he did not want any of his department bills that are due to be set aside.

Councilman Michael Taylor and David Howard indicated they did not approve of his attitude while the village is in a financial crisis.

Root suggested to the council that a meeting be arranged with John Sawvel Findlay, an electric rate consultant, who did a study of the village and set up rates in 1965. The present rates that have been increased several times since then have

Inbounds play at :31 breaks tie

"The opera ain't over," Yogi Berra, the celebrated commentator on things athletic is reputed to have said, "till the fat lady sings."

The fat lady sang for Coach Keith Dierker and Plymouth's basketball team Friday night with 31 seconds left in the game. Co-Capt. Randy Neeley scored the 29th and 30th points on an inbound play, breaking a 57 to 51 tie.

Ontario called time out and prepared its attack. There were 27 seconds left. Kevin Ellison got his shot off but couldn't connect. With just

six seconds left, Brian Waterhouse, who led all Warrior scorers with 20 points, fouled Neeley. Waterhouse left the game, the second Ontario starter to foul out. Neeley missed the free throw but Ontario's chances were academic. There wasn't time enough to get the ball into the fore court.

So Plymouth won its first game of the young season, 59 to 57. Oddly, the last time these two teams played, the score was the same, save that Ontario won.

It seemed at the outset of Friday's contest that this

would happen again. Plymouth scored the first basket on a shot by Steve Tackett, who started the game in place of Matt Patrick, and Ontario ripped off 12 unanswered points. The Big Red managed to recover somewhat and cut the lead to 10 at the end of the period.

Thanks to some accurate free throw shooting by Neeley, Tackett, Patrick and Brad Postema, the Big Red pared the lead to only two points at the half.

The two teams battled evenly through the third period and Plymouth slipped

into a one point lead at 7:17 of the fourth quarter. The score was tied five times before the game was decided. Ontario led only once in the final period when, with 2:01 on the clock, Ellison connected from underneath.

Ontario outshot Plymouth from the field, 25 to 19. It was at the free throw line that Plymouth won it, with 21 successes in 29 tries. Plymouth's defense was not so rough on the Warriors, who got off 14 penalty shots and sank half of them.

Ontario was charged with 19 turnovers, Plymouth with 20.

Plymouth shot 50 per cent from the floor, with 19 of 38 tries. The Warriors were 25 to 53.

Ellison scored 16 for the Warriors.

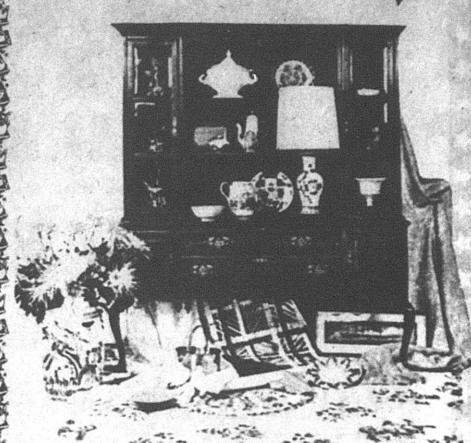

He broke down and we ate. We stopped somewhere in the middle of nowhere in Pennsylvania, no town, two gas stations and a chain motel, that was it.

Everyone who worked in the place came from small communities within 10 miles. We had a nice chat with the barmaid about how it was staffed. Then we went to the dining room, and it was unbelievable. For a flat sum, \$5.95 to be exact, we could have soup, a salad bar like you do not see around here, plus a heaping plate of turkey and all its goop and a hot buffet for more, then pie and coffee. We didn't even down a third of it. I go on the theory that one doggie bag is all one can ask for decently, so I brought my mince pie home.

The thing about it all is that these big chains are run on computers and get just so much food. It is how they prepare it, and who ever did the dressing was a gal after my own heart. It was so home made and really better than what I can do. We left, and I thought it all over: these were local people from small towns and farms doing the cooking, and no dumb computer is going to tell them how to do anything. They probably get so many pounds of this and that, so they put it together their own way.

The moral is, if you are driving on an interstate, and need to eat, choose a lone motel with nothing around it.

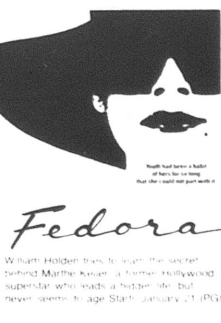

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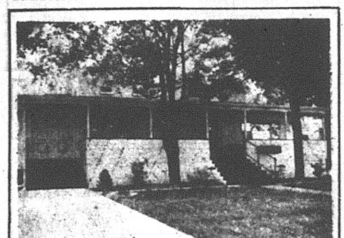

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ORDINANCE NO. 21-79
AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A TAX TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF GENERAL MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS, MAINTENANCE OF EQUIPMENT, NEW EQUIPMENT, EXTENSION, ENLARGEMENT AND IMPROVEMENT OF MUNICIPAL SERVICES AND FACILITIES AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS, ON ALL SALARIES, WAGES, COMMISSIONS AND OTHER COMPENSATION EARNED BY RESIDENTS OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH ON ALL SALARIES, WAGES, COMMISSIONS AND OTHER COMPENSATION EARNED BY NON-RESIDENTS OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH FOR WORK DONE OR SERVICES PERFORMED OR RENDERED IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, ON THE NET PROFITS EARNED ON ALL BUSINESSES, PROFESSIONS OR OTHER ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED BY RESIDENTS OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, ON THE NET PROFITS EARNED ON ALL BUSINESSES, PROFESSIONS OR OTHER ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH BY NON-RESIDENTS, AND ON THE NET PROFITS EARNED BY ALL CORPORATIONS DOING BUSINESS IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH AS THE RESULT OF WORK DONE OR SERVICES PERFORMED OR RENDERED IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, REQUIRING THE FILING OF RETURNS AND FURNISHING OF INFORMATION BY EMPLOYERS AND ALL THOSE SUBJECT TO SAID TAX IMPOSING ON EMPLOYERS THE DUTY OF COLLECTING THE TAX AT THE SOURCE AND PAYING THE SAME TO THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION, COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF SAID TAX, DECLARING VIOLATIONS THEREOF TO BE A MISDEAMOR AND IMPOSING PENALTIES THEREFOR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THREE-FOURTHS (3/4) OF THE MAJORITY CONCURRENCE:

SECTION I. Definitions

As used in this Ordinance, the following words shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this section, except as and if the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:
A. Taxpayer — A person, whether an individual, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, association or other entity, required hereunder to file a return or to pay a tax hereunder.
B. Association — A partnership, limited partnership, or any other form of unincorporated enterprise, owned by two (2) or more persons.
C. Business — An enterprise, activity, profession or undertaking of any nature conducted for profit or ordinarily conducted for profit whether by an individual, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, association or any other entity.
D. Corporation — A corporation or joint stock association organized under the laws of the United States, the State of Ohio, or any other state, territory, foreign country or dependency.
E. Employee — An individual whose earnings are subject to the withholding of Federal Income Tax or Social Security Tax.
F. Employer — An individual, partnership, limited partnership, association, corporation, governmental body, unit or agency, or any other entity, whether or not organized for profit, who or that employs one (1) or more persons on a salary, wage, commission or other compensation basis.
G. Net Profits — The net gain from the operation of a business, profession or enterprise after provision for all cost and expense incurred in the conduct thereof, including reasonable allowance for depreciation, depletion, amortization and reasonable additions to reserve for bad debts, either paid or accrued in accordance with recognized principles of

accounting applicable to the method of accounting regularly employed and without deduction of Federal taxes based on income, and without deducting taxes imposed by this Ordinance.
H. Non-Resident — An individual, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, association or other entity domiciled outside the Village of Plymouth.
I. Person — Every natural person, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, fiduciary or association. Whenever used in any clause prescribing and imposing a penalty, the term "person" as applied to any association, shall mean the partners or members thereof, and as applied to corporation, the officers thereof.
J. Resident — An individual, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, association or other entity domiciled in the Village of Plymouth.
K. Other Entity — The term "other entity" means any person or unincorporated body not previously named or defined and includes inter alia, fiduciaries located within the Village of Plymouth.

The singular shall include the plural and the masculine shall include the feminine and the neuter.

SECTION II. Imposition of Tax

To provide funds for the purpose of general municipal operations, maintenance of equipment, new equipment, extension, enlargement and improvement of municipal services and facilities and capital improvements of the Village of Plymouth, there be and is hereby levied a tax upon the earnings of each person or entity operating within the Village of Plymouth.

A. On all salaries, wages, commissions and other compensation earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, by resident individuals of the Village of Plymouth.
B. On all salaries, wages, commissions and other compensation earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, for work done or services performed or rendered in the Village of Plymouth.
C. On the net profits attributable to Plymouth, earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, of all resident unincorporated businesses, professions and other activities derived from work done or services rendered or performed and business or other activities conducted in the Village of Plymouth.

D. On the portion of the distributive share of the net profits earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, of a resident individual, partner or owner of a resident unincorporated business entity attributable to Plymouth and not levied against such unincorporated business entity.

E. On the net profits attributable to Plymouth earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, of all non-resident unincorporated businesses, professions or other activities, derived from work done or services performed or rendered and business or other activities conducted in the Village of Plymouth.

F. On the portion of the distributive share of the net profits earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, of a resident individual, partner or owner of a non-resident unincorporated business entity not attributable to Plymouth and not levied against such unincorporated business entity.

G. On the net profits earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, of all corporations derived from work done or services performed or rendered and business or other activities conducted in the Village of Plymouth.

H. The portion of the net profits attributable to the Village of Plymouth of a taxpayer conducting a business, profession or other activity both within and without the boundaries of the Village shall be determined as provided in Section 718.02 of the Ohio Revised Code and in accordance with the Rules and Regulations adopted by the Council of the Village of Plymouth pursuant to this Ordinance.

SECTION III. Determination of Income Subject to Tax

(A) In the taxation of income which is subject to taxation by the provisions of this Ordinance, if the books and records of a taxpayer conducting a business or profession both within and without the boundaries of the Village of Plymouth shall disclose with reasonable accuracy which portion of its net profit is attributable to that part of the business or profession conducted within the boundaries of the Village, then only such portion shall be considered as having a taxable situs in the Village of Plymouth for purposes of income taxation. In the absence of such book value of the real and tangible personal property owned or used by the taxpayer in the business or profession in the Village during the taxable period to the average net book value of all of the real and tangible personal property owned or used by the taxpayer in the business or profession during the same period, wherever situated.

As used in the preceding paragraph, real property shall include property rented or leased by the taxpayer and the value for such property shall be determined by multiplying the annual rental thereof by eight.
3. Wages, salaries and other compensation paid during the taxable period to persons employed in the business or profession for services performed in the Village of Plymouth to wages, salaries and other compensation paid during the same period to persons employed in the business or profession wherever their services are performed.

3. Gross receipts of the business or profession from sales made and services performed during the taxable period in the Village to gross receipts of the business or profession during the same period from sales and services, wherever made or performed.

In the event that the foregoing allocation formula does not produce an equitable result, another basis may, under uniform regulations be substituted so as to produce such result.

As used in Division (A) of this subsection, "Sales made in the Village of Plymouth" mean:

1. All sales of tangible personal property which are delivered within the Village regardless of where title passes if shipped or delivered from a stock of goods within this Village.

2. All sales of tangible personal property which is delivered within the Village regardless of where title passes even though transported from a point outside this Village if the taxpayer is regularly engaged through its own employees in the solicitation or promotion of sales within the Village and the sales result from such solicitation or promotion.

3. All sales of tangible personal property which is shipped from a place within the Village to purchasers outside such Village regardless of where title passes if the taxpayer is not, through its own employees, regularly engaged in the solicitation or promotion of sales at the place where delivery results.

SECTION III. Effective Date

Said tax shall be levied, collected and paid with respect to salaries, wages, commissions and other compensation earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, and with respect to the net profits of businesses, professions and other activities earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, hereafter, that, where the fiscal year of the business, profession or other activity differs from the calendar year, the tax shall be applied to that part of the net profit for the fiscal year as shall be earned on and after Dec. 9, 1979, to the close of the taxpayer's fiscal year, thereafter the taxpayer shall report on its fiscal year return.

SECTION IV. Reciprocity Provision Credit for Tax Paid to Other Municipalities

Every individual taxpayer who resides in the Village of Plymouth who receives net profits, salaries, wages, commissions or other compensation for services performed or work done, or services performed or rendered outside of said Village, if it be made to appear that he has paid a municipal income tax on such net profits, salaries, wages, commissions or other compensation to another municipality, shall be entitled to a credit against the tax imposed by this Ordinance in the amount so paid by him or in his behalf to such other municipality. The credit shall not exceed 100% of the tax

assessed by this Ordinance on such net profit salary, wages, commissions or compensation earned in such other municipality or municipalities where such tax is paid.

SECTION V. Administration — Duties of the Village Director of Taxation

A. It shall be the duty of the Director of Taxation to receive the tax imposed by this Ordinance in the manner prescribed herein from the taxpayers; to keep an accurate record thereof, and to report all monies so received. All cashiers handling tax monies shall be subject directly to the Director of Taxation and shall be subject to accounting to him.

B. It shall be the duty of the Director of Taxation to enforce payment of all taxes owing the Village of Plymouth, to keep accurate records for a minimum of five (5) years showing the amount due from each taxpayer required to file a declaration and return, to make any return, to make any return, and to show the dates and amounts of payments thereof.

C. Said Director of Taxation is hereby charged with the enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance and to enforce the rules and regulations of Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, relating to any matter or matters pertaining to the collection of Village income taxes and the administration and enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance, including provisions for the examination and correction of returns and payments.

D. In any case where a taxpayer has failed to file a return or has filed a return which does not show the proper amount of tax due, the Village may determine the amount of tax appearing to be due the Village of Plymouth from the taxpayer and shall send to such taxpayer a written statement indicating the amount of tax determined, together with interest and penalties thereon if any.

E. Subject to the consent of the Board of Review or pursuant to regulations approved by the Council of the Village, the Director of Taxation shall have the power to compromise any interest or penalty, or both, imposed by this Ordinance.

A. Department of Taxation shall be created within the office of the Director of Taxation of the Village of Plymouth. Such Department shall have such deputies, clerks and other employees as may be from time to time determined by the Council of the Village, and shall receive such salary as may be determined by Village Council. The Village Director of Taxation shall recommend all appointments of personnel and purchase all equipment, supplies and material for the Department of Taxation subject to the approval of Council. The Department of Taxation shall be charged with the administration and operation of this Ordinance and shall be the direction of the Director of Taxation. The Village Director of Taxation shall prescribe the form and method of accounts and reports for said department, as well as the forms for taxpayer's returns and declarations, and shall be charged with the internal examination and audit of all such accounts and shall exhibit accurate records of all such accounts received from each taxpayer and the date of said receipt. The Village Director of Taxation shall also make written report to Council annually of all monies collected hereunder during the preceding year.

SECTION VI. Investigative Powers of the Village Director of Taxation — Penalty for Divulging Confidential Information

A. The Village Director of Taxation or his duly authorized agent or employee, is hereby authorized to examine the books, papers and records of any employer, or of any taxpayer or other person or entity, believed to be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, for the purpose of ascertaining the accuracy of any return made, or, if no return was made, to ascertain the tax due. Every such employer, supposed employer taxpayer or supposed taxpayer, is hereby directed and required to furnish to the Director of Taxation or his duly authorized agent or employee, any and all information, following a written request by the Director of Taxation or his duly authorized agent or employee, the means, facilities and opportunity for making such examination and investigations as are hereby authorized.

B. The Director of Taxation or his duly authorized agent or employee, is hereby authorized to examine any person, employer or employee under oath, concerning any income which was or should have been returned for taxation, and for this purpose, may compel the production of books, Federal Income Tax records, papers and records and the attendance of any person believed to be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, wherever he believes such persons have knowledge of such income.

C. The refusal to produce books, papers, records and Federal Income Tax returns or the refusal to submit to such examination or investigation, or the refusal to answer questions or to be subject to the tax by any officer, agent or employee if a person subject to the tax or required to withhold tax or the failure of any person to comply with the provisions of this Section or with any order of subpoena of the Village Director of Taxation authorized hereby shall be deemed a violation of this Ordinance, punishable as provided in Section 8 hereof.

D. Tax returns, investigations, hearings and all audit papers and information connected therewith are confidential and shall be carefully preserved so that they shall not be available for inspection by anyone other than the proper agents of the Village of Plymouth for its purposes.

E. Any information gained as the result of the filing of any tax returns, investigations, hearings or verifications required or authorized by this Ordinance shall be confidential, except for official purposes, and except in accordance with proper rules of any agency or person divulging such information shall upon conviction be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine or penalty of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisoned for not more than six (6) months, or both. Each disclosure shall constitute a separate offense. In addition to the above penalties, any employer or employee who fails to pay the provisions of this section relative to disclosures of confidential information shall be immediately dismissed from the service of the Village.

SECTION VII. Interest and Penalties

All taxes imposed by this Ordinance, including taxes withheld or required to be withheld from wages by an employer and remaining unpaid after they have become due, shall bear interest on the amount of the unpaid tax at the rate of Six Percent (6%) per annum, and the taxpayers upon whom taxes are imposed and employers and employees required by this Ordinance to withhold taxes shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance shall be liable, in addition thereto, to a penalty of One-half (1/2) of One Percent (1%) of the amount of the unpaid tax for each month or fraction of a month for the first six (6) months of non-payment, or Five Dollars (\$5.00), whichever is the greater. Upon recommendation of the Board of Taxation, the Board of Review may abate interest or penalties, or both, and upon appeal from the refusal of the Village Director of Taxation to so recommend, the Board of Review may nevertheless abate interest or penalty, or both.

SECTION VIII. Penalties

A. The following shall be considered violations of this Ordinance:

1. Failing, neglecting or refusing to make any return or declaration required by this Ordinance; or
 2. Making any return, or failing to pay the tax imposed by this Ordinance; or
 3. Failing, neglecting or refusing to pay the tax, penalties or interest imposed by this Ordinance; or
 4. Failing, neglecting or refusing to withhold the tax from employees or to remit such withholding to the Director of Taxation.
- B. Refusing to permit the Director of Taxation or any duly authorized agent or employee to examine books, records and papers and Federal Income Tax returns relating to the income or net profits of a taxpayer; or
5. Failing to appear before the Director of Taxation and to produce books, records, Federal Income Tax returns and papers relating to the income or net profits of a taxpayer under order or subpoena of the Director of Taxation; or
 6. Refusing to disclose to the Director of Taxation any information with respect to the income or net profits of a taxpayer; or

8. Failing to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance or any order or subpoena of the Director of Taxation authorized hereby; or

9. Attempting to do anything whatever to avoid the payment of the whole or any part of the tax, penalties or interest imposed by this Ordinance.

B. Any person who violates any of the provisions of Section 8A above shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. Each day the tax report is not filed can be deemed a separate offense.

C. The failure of any employer or taxpayer or person to receive or procure a return, declaration or other required form shall not excuse him from making any information return or declaration, from filing such form, or from paying the tax. SECTION IX. Allocation of Funds

The funds collected under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deposited in the General Fund and said funds collected for the tax period of Dec. 9, 1979 through Dec. 8, 1984, shall be disbursed in the following order, to wit:

1. Such part thereof as shall be necessary to defray all costs of collecting, administering and enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance.

2. Not more than twenty-five (25%) percent of the net available income tax receipts received annually may be used to defray operating expenses of the Village.

3. At least seventy-five (75%) percent of net available income tax receipts received annually shall be set aside and used for capital improvements for the Village including, but not limited to, development and construction of sewers and street improvements, for public buildings, parks and playgrounds, and for the purchase of equipment for the police, fire, street, ambulance and utilities departments.

SECTION X. Board of Review

A. A Board of Review, consisting of three (3) electors of the Village of Plymouth, one to be appointed by the Mayor, one to be appointed by the village council and the third to be selected by the two so appointed, is created by this Ordinance. No member shall be appointed to the Board of Review who holds other public office or appointment. The members of the Board of Review shall serve without pay.

B. A majority of the members of the Board of Review shall constitute a quorum. The Board of Review shall adopt its own procedural rules and shall keep a record of its transactions.

C. All hearings of the Board shall be conducted privately and the provisions of Section 6 of the Ordinance with reference to the confidential character of information received by the Board shall apply to the Board of Review in all matters as may be heard before the Board of Review on appeal.

D. Any person dissatisfied with any ruling or decision of the Director of Taxation which is made under the authority conferred by this Ordinance and the Rules and Regulations related thereto, may appeal such ruling or decision to the Board of Review within thirty (30) days from the announcement of such ruling or decision by the Director of Taxation and the Board of Review shall, on hearing, have jurisdiction to affirm, reverse or modify any such ruling or decision, or to any part thereof. Any person aggrieved by any ruling or decision of the Board of Review may appeal, therefrom to a court of competent jurisdiction within thirty (30) days from the announcement of such ruling or decision.

F. The Board of Review, as created, shall serve during the life of the Ordinance.

SECTION XI. Applicability

This Ordinance shall not apply to any person, firm, corporation or to any property as to whom or which it is beyond the power of the Council of the Village of Plymouth to impose the tax herein provided for.

SECTION XII. If any provision of this Ordinance or any part of this Ordinance, or any tax against any individual or any of the several groups specified herein, is found to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, such unconstitutionality, illegality or invalidity shall affect only such sentence, clause, section or part of this Ordinance as is so found to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, and the remaining provisions, sentences, clauses, sections or other parts of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Council of the Village of Plymouth that this Ordinance would have been adopted had such unconstitutional, illegal or invalid sentence, clause, section or part thereof not been included herein.

SECTION XIII. Exemptions

The provisions of this Ordinance shall not be construed as levying a tax upon the following:

1. Funds received from local, state or Federal governments because of services rendered by persons in the United States by the person rendering such service, or as a result of another person rendering such service.
2. Poor relief, pensions, social security, unemployment compensation and disability benefits received from private insurance or from local, state or Federal governments or from charitable, religious or educational organizations.
3. Dues, contributions and similar payments received by charitable, religious, educational or literary organizations or labor unions, lodges and similar organizations.
4. Receipts from casual entertainment, amusements, sports events and similar activities conducted by bona fide charitable, religious and educational organizations and associations.
5. Any association, organization, corporation, club or trust, which is exempt from Federal taxes on income by reason of its charitable, religious, educational, literary, scientific, etc., purposes.
6. Gains from involuntary conversions, cancellation of indebtedness, interest on Federal obligations, and income of a decedent's estate during the period of administration (except such income from the operation of a business).
7. Earnings and income of all persons under eighteen (18) years of age, whether residents or non-residents.

SECTION XIV. Refunds

Should it appear that any taxpayer has paid more than the amount of the tax to which the Village is entitled under the provisions of this Ordinance, a refund of the amount so overpaid shall be made, provided a proper claim for refund of such overpayment of tax has been filed by the taxpayer, or same may be applied toward the declaration of tax due for the ensuing year. Claims for refunds shall be made on forms provided by the Village and shall be made within three (3) years of the date due of a final return.

No refund will be made for an amount less than one dollar (\$1.00).

SECTION XV. Effective Period

The Ordinance shall continue effective insofar as the levy of taxes is concerned until Dec. 8, 1984, provided, however, that annual returns for the year ending 1984 shall be filed on or before April 15, 1985. Said Ordinance insofar as the collection of taxes levied in the aforesaid period, and action or proceedings for collecting any such taxes, or enforcing the provisions of said Ordinance are concerned, shall continue effective until all of said taxes levied in the aforesaid period are fully paid and any and all suits and prosecutions for the collection of said taxes or for the punishment of violations of this Ordinance shall have been fully terminated.

SECTION XVI.

This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, welfare and safety for the reason that additional revenue is required for the day to day operation of the Village and the various departments of the Village, which is necessary for the promotion and preservation of the health, happiness and the safety of the inhabitants of the Village of Plymouth and for the protection of their properties.

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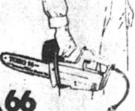
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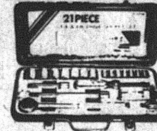


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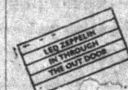
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
