The 52-year-old principal of Plymouth High school died Tuesday in Mansfield General hospital of a gun-shot wound received during a hunting accident at Ganges Saturday.

Richard L. Horton, an all-Richard L. Horton, an all-situs football player at Spen-cer W. Va., as a young man, and later a standout athlete at Marshall university, Hun-tington, W. Va., went hunt-ing for deer Saturday morn-ing with three professional colleagues, Keith Diebler, high school basketball coach; David G. Coulter, high school ootball coach, and John Hart, a junior high school coach.

They had arranged with Kenneth Burrer, owner of Spring Hill Fruit farm in Ganges-Five Points road, to seek deer on his land. At about 10:30 a.m., thorton stopped to pluck an apple. The apple was beyond his reach. He grasped his weapon by the muzzle and struck at the apple with the butt of the gun. It discharged, the powerful ball that is required by law in Ohio to be used on deer entering his upper torso. He retained consciousness What he said to his companions was, "What a stupid thing to do!" He was taken to Mansfield




