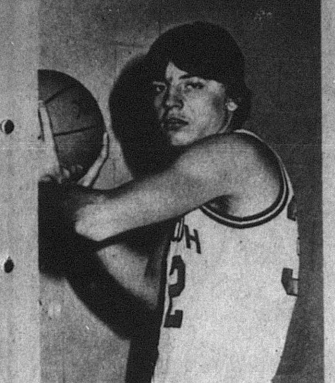

## PHS principal succumbs to accidental gunshot wound

They had arranged with Kenneth Burrer, owner of Spring Hill Fruit farm in Ganges-Five Points road, to seek deer on his land.

At about 10:30 a.m., Horton stopped to pluck an apple. The apple was beyond his reach. He grasped his weapon by the muzzle and struck at the apple with the butt of the gun. It discharged, the powerful ball that is required by law in Ohio to be used on deer entering his upper torso.

He retained consciousness. What he said to his companions was, "What a stupid thing to do!"

He was taken to Mansfield General hospital by Shiloh's ambulance. After surgery he was admitted to the intensive care unit. The round penetrated his liver and forced removal of his spleen. He developed renal complications and went into a coma on Monday.

Physicians thought late Monday that, barring complications, recovery could be anticipated.

He did not rally from a reversal on Tuesday.

Horton came here from Leontine, Ohio, he was high school principal. He was into his second contract as chief administrative officer of the high school.

He is survived by his wife, Sarah, formerly director of training of the Mansfield General hospital school of nursing, and two daughters. Plymouth Board of Education will decide Monday night what to do about replacing the dead principal. In the meantime, Douglas Stagg, administrative assistant, is acting in his stead.

All school activities for Dec. 4 were cancelled. The schools will proceed on an ad hoc basis as to cessation of activities. The Advertiser was informed at press time early yesterday.

The body is at McQuate-Secor Funeral home.

order to pass as an emergency ordinance. That was not legally passed since it is necessary to have five members voting yea for the suspension of the rules.

Because Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock and Councilman Edward O. Ramsey were absent from the Nov. 21 meeting and Councilman David A. Howard was presiding, only four council members could vote.

Ervin Howard changed his mind and voted for the passage of the tax this time around.

After John Fazzini, superintendent of the Plymouth Local School district, and James C. Davis, an officer of First National Bank of Mansfield, attacked the village's financial problems, a bit of blue sky can be seen.

Not much, but there is some.

They came up with the figure of \$47,469.51 of active funds in the village accounts. Some \$12,000 of this, however, is earmarked for bond retirement. The inactive funds that are invested total \$97,204.80 in time deposits.

At the moment the village has \$16,341.41 in unpaid bills assigned to several funds.

Raymond Brooks, clerk-treasurer, and James C. Root, village administrator, will check the outstanding bills to determine which can be delayed so that December payrolls can be met.

Along with the regular payroll, the ambulance and fire departments are paid this month.

Kenneth Echelberry said this will amount to about \$6,500. The two departments are paid twice a year.

Dr. Don Campbell, Warren Young and F.W. Motz of the Richland county health department met with the council to resolve who has the responsibility of checking on plumbing in new construction on the Richland county side of the village.

The village has never adopted a plumbing code. Dr. Campbell said that the county code is in effect since the village is part of the county health district.

## An open letter

We are concerned over the lack of interest in the school crossing guard problem, so we submit this letter to the people of Plymouth.

As you know the fifth and sixth graders have been sent to Shiloh leaving our elementary school without their services as crossing guards. The fourth grade is made up of nine and 10-year-olds, who we strongly feel are not old enough to have such a responsibility of crossing their peers.

There have been a couple of pleas sent out hoping the adults of this community would respond and aid the school with this problem. Six adults out of the entire town came forward. Two have had to quit because of change in their working hours, leaving four. That is not enough.

We are very disappointed in this turnout. Everyone is anxious to spend hours showing how concerned they are, but very few are willing to spend 30 to 40 minutes of their time to solve the problem. All that is required is that you go to your police station, which covers the liability insurance of the volunteers, and give of your time.

So why the hesitation? It takes so little time and the children rely on us, as adults, to be there. The school has left the problem lie with the community, so what do we do about it?

## Gas shut off? Here're steps!

After Jan. 1, low-income families who have received a disconnection notice from a heat-supplying utility company or who have a 10-day or less supply of heating fuel such as wood, oil, heating oil, can apply for the Low-income Energy Assistance program at the Huron County Welfare department, 180 Benedict avenue, Norwalk.

Applicants also must have an annual income no higher than the 125 percent federal poverty level and not be currently receiving energy assistance through the Department of Taxation's Emergency Credits program, or any other state of federal program.

If an eligible applicant receives heat through direct booking with a utility company, the Huron County Welfare department will help pay overdue and current charges up to \$250 to prevent disconnection of services. Eligible applicants who purchase heating fuel from a distributor can also receive up to \$250 during the heating season. Payments are made to the utility company or fuel distributor by the county welfare department.
