Council standing firm: no rate rise for ColGas

Plymouth will stand pat on its proposal of a one year natural gas contract at no increase in rates, village council told Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc. Tuesday night.

The company proposes the village a three per cent raise for a one year contract.

Councilman G. Thomas Moore asked if the council will know any more by next year. Taylor replied the answers will come if the company takes a Plymouth rate case before the PUOCO to justify its request for the increase.
