## Parking restrictions eased by council

More revisions were made Tuesday night by village council to the proposed parking ordinance.

Two hour parking will be in effect in the Square from 8 a. m. until 5:30 a. m. This will allow those who live in the Square to park conveniently.

Councilman Mrs. Allan Raymond suggested the two hour period would be a hardship on those residents.

Councilman Michael R. Taylor said some money should be spent to fix up the village parking lot in East Main street so it can be usable by blacktopping and lighting the area.

No further discussion ensued when it was noted the First National Bank of Mansfield plans to blacktop the lot to the west of the present telephone building.

Two other changes were made to the parking ordinance that will permit parking only in the north side of Birchfield street and provide a half hour loading zone area in Plymouth street from the Square to the edge of the McQuate property. Parking will be allowed on both sides of the street to within 20 feet of the intersection of West High street.

Councilman David A. Howard asked if all drains in a building or house were being properly connected to the sewer.

He seemed to have reason to think that some householders to save money were only having their bathroom drains connected.

Mayor Elizabeth G. Pad-

dock suggested the contractors doing the work meet with him and Village Administrator James C. Root to discuss how to solve such problems. No action was taken with the hope that the householders will attempt to make sure the connections are properly made.

Root told the council an E.P. inactivity of the sewer system and lagoons made earlier in the day was satisfactory and that great improvement was found in the lagoons, which village employees have been working on to hold until the time they are properly rippedraped.

He asked the council to give thought to hiring a present CETA employee who is losing his status and is saving the village money by keeping village vehicles going. A decision will be made at the next meeting.

The village has acquired a former state patrol cruiser for the use of the utility department. The police department has also acquired two used vehicles. Each cost \$1,400.

Of the two cruisers that have been in use, one will be retained by the department and the other given to the utility department so it will have two cruisers to use for errands that are now being done by large and more gas consuming vehicles, as Taylor pointed out.

Because of the illness of James Neely, the promised new health insurance policy

that the council promised to village employees cannot be activated. Neely's sick leave will expire in November. Meanwhile, the dental insurance and life insurance that the new policy will provide are being denied to the other employees, and they will continue under the present Blue Cross coverage.

The council directed Solicitor Robert A. McKown to prepare a contract to hire Alvin M. Kelley to head the village income tax department. He has accepted the council's offer for a six month contract whereby he

will be paid \$800 a month for three months and \$600 for the last period.

Councilman David Howard instructed Root to prepare space for him to work in the village building. It had been suggested that what is now a utility storage room be converted to a small office. Root suggested that Kelley use the council room during the day and could securely place his records in several of the closets in the room, thus saving any expense until it is known if the income tax will win out at the polls in November.

## Police dog nabs suspect

A bad check to purchase a motorcycle touched off a man hunt that ended in Plymouth Tuesday afternoon.

Marvin Shepherd, Boughtonville, sold a motorcycle to Jackie Lee Taylor, Pt. Clinton, and discovered the check was not good. So he notified the Huron county sheriff's department.

Word went out about the check, and alert employees of the Willard United bank were aware that several other checks submitted for collection by Charles Lazar through four will attend classes in Shiloh.

## Schools to open Wednesday

Plymouth schools will open Wednesday for the 1979-80 school year, with an anticipated slight decrease in enrollment of perhaps half of one per cent.

A spanking new \$1.35 million junior high and elementary building at Shiloh will be occupied for the first time on Wednesday.

Ten new instructors will begin their teaching careers in Plymouth Local School district Monday, when they will meet for orientation. All teachers will assemble Tuesday to prepare for the opening of classes on Wednesday.

Bus routes will be the same as last year, save that on opening day pupils should report to their bus stations at least 15 minutes early.

Junior high and high school pupils will attend classes between 7:45 a. m. and 2:40 p. m.

Elementary pupils will attend classes between 8:45 a. m. and 3:45 p. m.

New workbook prices and fee schedules will be sent home with pupils Wednesday.

Cafeterias at Plymouth and Shiloh will operate on opening day.

Prices are 55 cents for pupils in grades one through eight, 65 cents for pupils in grades nine through 12. Lunch tickets should be purchased weekly.

Pupils wishing to apply for free or reduced price lunches will be given applications during the first week of school. Until these applications are processed and approved, all pupils must pay full price for their lunches.

Future accident insurance forms will be sent home with all pupils on Wednesday.

School administrators look for first day attendance at 1,350 pupils, including those who will attend Pioneer Joint Vocational school.

Pupils not yet registered to attend classes in Plymouth district should do so before Wednesday. They should report to the building principal.

ORDINANCE NO. 10-79  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, UNANIMOUSLY ORDAIN:

Section I. Authority and considerations for placement of devices.

The Chief of Police is hereby authorized to place and maintain traffic control devices upon any street or highway under his jurisdiction as are necessary to effectuate the provisions of this Ordinance or to regulate, warn or guide traffic and such other traffic control devices as he shall deem necessary for the proper control of traffic. The Chief shall determine the location, timing and coordination of such traffic control devices upon the basis of an applicable engineering or traffic investigation and shall consider the following:

(a) The maximum safety and protection of vehicular and pedestrian traffic from physical injury or property damage.  
(b) The existing and potential traffic movement, volume and conditions.  
(c) The location and frequency of accidents, including studies of remedial measures.  
(d) The recommendations of the Fire Chief and Director of Public Safety.

(e) The acceleration of transportation of persons and property by vehicles so as to expedite travel and promote public safety.  
(f) The convenience and welfare of the general public in parking, standing, loading and unloading and the use of the streets as affecting business concerns and places of assembly.

(g) Economy in the expenditure of money.

Section II. Conformity with state manual.

All traffic control devices

COUNTY, OHIO, DESIGNATING CERTAIN IN SAID VILLAGE AS THROUGH STREETS AND REQUIRING THOSE THROUGH STREETS TO STOP AND YIELD TO ALL ONCOMING TRAFFIC AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS The members of Council of the Village of Plymouth deem it necessary for the safety of the inhabitants of said Village and motorists traveling within said Village to designate certain streets in said Village as through streets and other streets as stop streets.

NOW, THEREFORE, MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, UNANIMOUSLY ORDAIN:

Section I. Authority and considerations for placement of devices.

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(a) The maximum safety and protection of vehicular and pedestrian traffic from physical injury or property damage.  
(b) The existing and potential traffic movement, volume and conditions.  
(c) The location and frequency of accidents, including studies of remedial measures.  
(d) The recommendations of the Fire Chief and Director of Public Safety.

(e) The acceleration of transportation of persons and property by vehicles so as to expedite travel and promote public safety.  
(f) The convenience and welfare of the general public in parking, standing, loading and unloading and the use of the streets as affecting business concerns and places of assembly.  
(g) Economy in the expenditure of money.

Section II. Conformity with state manual.

All traffic control devices

placed pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance shall conform to the Ohio Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways, as set forth in Ohio Revised Code 4511.08.

Section III. Powers of Chief of Police.

The Chief of Police is hereby empowered to:

(a) Designate any street or highway as a through street or stop street and require all vehicles stop or yield the right of way as may be required before entering the same.

(b) Designate any intersection as a stop intersection and require all vehicles to stop at one or more entrances to such intersection.

(c) Designate any intersection as a yield intersection and require all vehicles to yield the right of way as required.

(d) Designate any street as a one-way street and require that all vehicles thereon be moved in one specific direction.

(e) Designate and mark lanes to be used by traffic moving in a particular direction regardless of the centerline of the roadway.

(f) Erect signs directing slow-moving traffic to use a designated lane or allocating specified lanes to traffic moving in the same direction.

(g) Designate those portions of any street, where overtaking and passing other traffic or driving to the left of the centerline of the roadway would be especially hazardous, by appropriate signs or markings on the street to indicate the beginning and end of such zones. Such zones may be marked by an advisory yellow line placed parallel to and to the right of the normal centerline or offset marked lane line.

(h) Place markers, buttons or signs within or adjacent to intersections and require that a specific course of direction be traveled by vehicles proceeding in lanes by either permitting, prohibiting or requiring turns at such intersections.

(i) Install traffic control devices, signals and signs at any location to regulate traffic.  
(j) Establish safety zones, crosswalks, zones of quiet and play streets.

(k) Close any street or portion thereof to vehicular traffic which is in the process of construction, reconstruction or repair.

(l) Determine the location of any necessary bus stops and taxicab stands.

(m) Determine the location and limit hours of truck loading zones.

(n) Designate dangerous railroad crossings and erect stop signs thereat.

(o) Erect "No U Turn" signs at any location to prohibit a vehicle from being turned so as to proceed in the opposite direction.

(p) Regulate or prohibit the stopping, standing and parking of vehicles on streets, alleys or public property by erecting signs plainly indicating the prohibitions, restrictions or limitations.

(q) Designate individual parking spaces by markings, which may either be parallel or at a prescribed angle to the curb or edge of the roadway.

Section IV. Posting of signs and signals required.

No provision of this Ordinance shall be effective until signs, signals, markings or other devices giving notice of such local traffic regulations are posted upon or at the entrance to the street or part thereof affected, as may be determined to be necessary in proper position they are sufficiently legible to be seen by an ordinarily observant person.

No pedestrian or driver of a vehicle shall disobey the instructions of any traffic control device placed in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance unless at the time otherwise directed by a police officer. When both traffic control signals and stop signs are in operation, traffic shall be governed by the traffic control signal while it is in operation.

No provisions of this Ordinance shall be construed to require that a sign be required shall be enforced against an alleged violator if at the time and place of the alleged violation, an official sign is not in proper position and sufficiently legible to be seen by an ordinarily observant person. Whenever a particular section does not state that signs are required, such section shall be effective, though no signs are erected in place.

SECTION IX. All streets running in a generally east and west direction shall be designated as through streets and all streets running in a general north to south direction shall be designated as stop streets with the exception of Park Avenue. The following streets are hereby designated as through streets: Sandusky Street, Plymouth East, North Street, Portner Street, West Main Street, Mill Street, Trux Street, Mulberry Street, Plymouth Street, West High Street, Railroad Street, Bell Street, West Broadway, New Street, Hoffman Avenue, Dix Street and Mills Avenue. The following streets are specifically designated as stop streets: Willow Drive at Sandusky Street; Plymouth East at Sandusky Street; Willow Drive at Plymouth East; North Street at Plymouth East; North Street at Sandusky Street; Maple Street at North Street; South Street at Portner Street; Woodland Street at Portner Street; Spring Street at Portner Street; Spring Street at Sandusky Street; Portner Street at Square; Mill Street at East Main Street; Whitney Avenue at Mill Street; Mill Street at Trux Street; Wherry Avenue at Trux Street; Mulberry Street at Trux Street; Mills Avenue at Mulberry Street; Mills Avenue at Plymouth Street; East High Street at Mulberry Street; East High Street at Plymouth Street; Birchfield Street at Plymouth Street; Springmill at Plymouth Street; State Route 88 at Plymouth Street; East Street at Plymouth Street; Railroad Street at West High Street; Mills Avenue at Railroad Street; Railroad Street at West Broadway; Bell Street at West Broadway; Franklin Street at Bell Street; Bell Street at West Broadway; Park Avenue at West Broadway; Franklin Street at West Broadway; Pleasant Street at West Broadway; Curtis Drive at West Broadway; Brooks Court at West Broadway; Dix Street at West Broadway; Dix Street at New Street; Dix Street at Sandusky Street; Walnut Street at New Street; Walnut Street at Park Avenue; Brazlian Street at Light Street; Light Street at Sandusky Street; Sandusky Avenue at Sandusky Street; Brazlian Street at Hoffman Avenue; Alley at North Street; Wall Street at North Street; Wall Street at Dix Street; Wall Street at Trux Street; Wall Street at West Broadway; Alley at Mills Avenue; South Street at Sandusky Street.

Section X. Any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance which is a misdemeanor of the fourth degree and upon conviction or entrance of a plea of guilty, the violator shall be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment in the Village or County Jail for not more than thirty (30) days or both; a second violation within a period of one year after the first violation, the violator shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree and shall be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment in the Village or County Jail for not more than sixty days or both.

Section XI. That this Ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety of motorists and pedestrians and for the uniformity of traffic through said Village. Passed this 7th day of August, 1979.

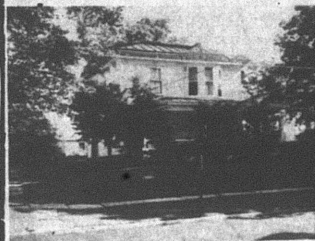

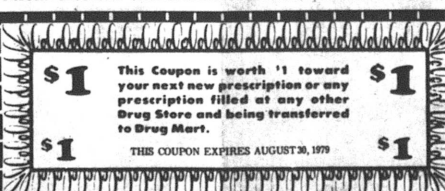
