ColGas tells village it's going to PUCO

The company's proposed "date certain" is Dec. 31, 1978, which is for the evaluation of all the company's property and equipment in the village.

An altercation that began last spring in Kite, Ky., resulted Monday in the deaths of a father and son in the Knott county courthouse, Hindman, Ky.

Estil Thorneberry, 53, and his son, Major Thorneberry, 31, were fatally shot by Raymond Little while waiting for the court to convene.

Little and the younger Thorneberry were appearing in court over the shooting of Thorneberry in the hand during an argument. Thorneberry then shot the windshield out of Little's pick-up truck.

According to Chief Deputy Sheriff Henry Hall of Knott county, the men were alone in the courtroom when with no warning Little pulled a

gun and shot, killing both instantly and wounding Mrs. Major Thorneberry.

The elder Thorneberry is survived by his wife, Ada; four daughters, Martha, now Mrs. Corbin Stumbo, Plymouth; Linda McVane, Bellevue; Anita, now Mrs. Roger Chaffin, Shelby; and Mayzelle, now Mrs. Butler Moore, Plymouth; a son, Estil Jr., Monroeville, and 16 grandchildren.

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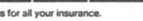

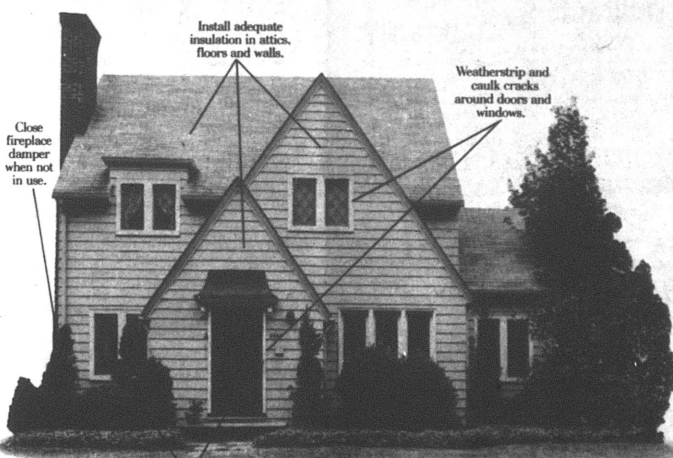

Plymouth kicked off to open the game and on fourth down, Lucas punted. The safety man couldn't contain the ball and it was recovered by the visitors at the Plymouth one.

It was no trick for Rick Hardin, the Lucas quarterback, to go in for the score on the first play. The clock read 9:43. Tom McNeely kicked the PAT. He is certainly the best kicker Plymouth fans have seen in 20 years.

Plymouth struck back in the next series. Moving from its 33, the Big Red made first down at the Lucas 45, thanks to James Jamerson's efforts. He made 14 yards in two shots and 16 in another before Co-Capt. Gary Blankenship bolted through right guard for 41 yards and a score with 6:53 on the clock.

The run for PATs was short. But Plymouth was back in the game. Lucas took the kickoff and marched 57 yards in six plays. Andy Meyers ran the last two. He was the workhorse during the drive, accounting for all but 15 yards of the push. McNeely's kick was again good.

Plymouth capitalized on a Lucas mistake with the best play in football, the fumbled punt. Phil Gowitzka kicked fantastically well on Saturday night. This one carried 54 yards. Co-Capt. Doug Miller recovered the bobble at the Lucas eight. Jamerson carried two times, the second

from the 10, to score. He ran the PATs and as the quarter ended, Plymouth was tied at 14.

From here it was all downhill for the Cubs. They took the next kickoff and marched to the Red 15. On fourth down, McNeely kicked a field goal from the Red 22.

Jeff Jacobs was intercepted on third down in the next series. Lucas struck again, marching 50 yards in six plays. Scott Cox scored the touchdown from the four. Hardin contributed 24 yards, Meyers nine and Cox 24 in the drive. McNeely's kick was a splendid thing, arcing into the night sky. Plymouth did not threaten the Lucas goal in the second half. It did not put the ball in play in Lucas territory during the final 24 minutes.

A great goal line stand in the fourth period gave Plymouth fans something to cheer about. After an interception at the Lucas 33, a clipping penalty against the Cubs gave them possession at their 34. They began a drive toward the Red goal. This carried to the half yard line with first down, whereupon the stout Red defense threw the Cubs back in four plays.

Plymouth sought to extricate itself but fumbled on third down at the Red 23. Lucas had possession at the 20 and in three plays Cox went in for the final touchdown on a four yard shot. The pass for PATs, necessitated by a poor snap from center so McNeely couldn't kick the ball, was short. Lucas clearly outplayed

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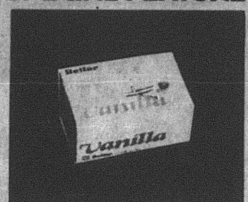
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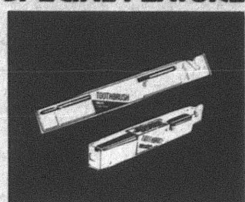
