\$18,280 paid to court here during 1979

Plymouth mayor's court collected a total of \$18,280.50 for fines, court costs and permits during 1979.

Police Chief W. Robert Seal's report for 1979 shows the police department had a bad year. In 1979, 1,385 complaints were recorded, versus 552 in 1978.

The report, with the 1978 figures in parentheses, shows: 110 (163); stolen vehicles reported, 3 (2); missing persons, 17 (4); traffic arrests, 108 (27); collision reports, 123 (75); deaths at funerals, 49 (33).

Three breaking and entering cases were solved. In 1978 nine were investigated. One murder and one suicide were investigated this year and none in 1978.

The department received 46 harassing telephone calls and six in 1978.

The cruisers chalked up 56,105 miles in 1979 and 44,628 in 1978.

Settlements Teachers to get \$122,000 accepted 11% pay increase to end law suit

A strike of teachers in Plymouth Local School district was averted Dec. 20 when they and their employer, Plymouth Board of Education, reached agreement on a two year contract.

The agreement was ratified by the teachers Friday. Miss Suzanne Farrar, principal negotiator for the teachers, said her colleagues are "happy; the compromises we made were good ones."

Vote of the Dec. 20 was 47 to 3 to accept the contract. The new contract calls for a starting salary of \$10,000, up from \$9,500. Miss Farrar said that until state law compelled Plymouth district to raise the starting salary for the holder of a baccalaureate degree to \$9,500, the base pay of \$9,350 offered by Plymouth district was the lowest in northern Ohio.

The figure of \$10,000 in 1980 will rise to \$10,750 in 1981. Only a few new teachers are hired each year. The key to the new contract agreement is that experienced teachers will also receive commensurate raises.

The board of education will pay 100 per cent for medical insurance up to a maximum amount, but teachers won't know what that level is until July, Miss Farrar said.

Teachers who drive their own vehicles on official business will be reimbursed at the rate of 22 cents a mile. The present figure is 20 cents.

Miss Farrar acknowledged the package amounts to an 11 per cent increase across the board, seven per cent of which is in salary.

Plymouth Education association at first demanded \$10,200 for first year teachers and \$11,000 in the second year of the contract.

A strike that would have begun yesterday had been threatened by the teachers, who charged that the board and its negotiators had used stalling tactics since the negotiations first began in November, 1978, and after an impasse panel had made recommendations to the board, which recommendations were endorsed by the teachers.

Miss Farrar added that teachers had begun to prepare a reduction in force program, by which teachers would know in advance what is the likelihood of their retention if the board were forced to reduce expenditures.

Dental insurance is also a part of the contract for the first time.

An out-of-court settlement of \$122,000 was approved by village council during a special meeting Thursday to end the lawsuit pending with the American Empire Finance Co., the bonding agent for Quentin Alderman Co. Inc., the sewer contractor who defaulted in completing the installation of the sanitary sewer system.

The council acted on the advice of Village Solicitor Robert A. McKown, who frankly said he recommended the settlement rather than any further legal entanglements, that would cost the village much more if the suit went to a jury trial in the district court in Cleveland.

McKown carefully pointed out that after Alderman defaulted and left the village without completing the installation of the sewer system, the bonding company did take over and put its own money into it. This he said amounted to cost to \$200,000.

During a meeting on Oct. 14, 1975 in Cincinnati when McKown, Mayor Elizabeth Paddock, Eugene C. Gerken, the engineer for the project, met with Louis Gilligan, who represented the bonding company, it was determined that the project should be finished. Gilligan said "we have a mutual interest in getting the contract done as fast and without interruptions for the people."

He then said the bonding company was willing to forego the \$80,000 in retainage held back from the payments to Alderman, which represented a 10 percent fee on each statement presented to the village to assure the work would be completed. This amount was used to complete the system. This was done by McDaniel and Co., Amherst.

The mayor said he thought the suit did go to trial, which she also wished to avoid because it would be so time consuming, the village would most likely win, but the cost would not be worth it.

The one item which is not resolved is the individual claims of numerous residents for damages which they say were caused by the sewer construction.

These claims will have to be presented to the insurance company of Alderman. He had been obligated to take out full insurance coverage.

The settlement of the village's suit is that the construction company was bonded by American Empire to complete the job within 365 days, which it failed to do. The council had at one time extended the date for 60 more days but by then the contractor simply walked off the job.

The final stage of the sewer construction, a sum of \$60,000, was borrowed from the First National Bank of Mansfield. The bank had been paid back and the village was most likely to be able to settle the other half of the money is forthcoming from the bonding company. Legal fees to Squire, Sander & Dempsey, Cleveland, and to McKown will have to be paid. Neither has submitted bills so those amounts are unknown at this time.

Bank pays 47 cents dividend

A cash dividend of 47 cents a share for the second half of 1979, an increase of three cents of 6.8 per cent over the second half of 1978, payable Jan. 2 to shareholders of record Dec. 19, was voted by the board of directors of First National Bank of Mansfield Dec. 13.

The dividends totals \$588,955, an increase of \$63,846, an increase of 12.2 per cent over the same period last year.

Two thousand 345 shareholders will participate in the dividend.

Pioneer Joint Vocational school will try for a third time to obtain fresh tax money during a special election in March.

Its board of education voted Dec. 17 to seek one mill of taxation, which is eight one hundredths of a mill more than what was sought in 1978. The question then was for \$2,100 of a mill, which was 42/100 was renewal and one-half mill was fresh taxation.

If the levy is approved in March, it will be effective indefinitely. It will produce, at present valuations, \$850,000 a year.

In the meantime, Pioneer intends to borrow money to meet expenses until the levy is approved. If it is approved, the district may by law borrow up to 50 per cent revenue that would have been generated by the tax during 1980, had the voters sanctioned it.

This would about match the loss of the 42/100 mill levy that was defeated in November.

Mayor, councilmen resign at Shiloh

Shiloh's mayor and two councilmen resigned Dec. 12. Mayor Grady McDonald, just elected to another term (he was unopposed), said he will be forced to resign as of Dec. 31.

When he did so, Frank Clina, president pro tempore

of the council, resigned that office (law requires that a president pro tempore be chosen during the first meeting of the new year) because he doesn't want to be mayor. Councilman Harry Foster resigned because he doesn't like the new members of the council.

No action was taken on any of the resignations. McDonald will be required to submit his resignation in writing. Foster will. Foster Clina's resignation was written.

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ORDINANCE 22-79 AUTHORIZING SETTLEMENT OF HURON COUNTY COMMON PLEAS COURT CASE NO. 37186 AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. WHEREAS: On or about September 16, 1971, Lonnie Caudill filed a suit against the Village of Plymouth, its administrators and councilmen, for compensatory and punitive damages in the sum of \$2,000.00.

WHEREAS: At the time of the aforesaid lawsuit, the Village of Plymouth was charging the Caudills for sanitary sewer service when the property was outside the Village limits and not connected to the Village sanitary sewer system.

WHEREAS: Although Mr. Caudill paid his water bill, his water was shut off by the Village for his failure to pay the sewer bill.

WHEREAS: The Huron County Common Pleas Court granted a temporary injunction September, 1971, enjoining the Village of Plymouth from any further action against the plaintiff, Lonnie Caudill.

WHEREAS: Eight (8) years have passed since the initial filing of the action and injuncting, and the Village and Mr. Caudill have incurred numerous expenses in preparing for trial, including but not limited to a transcript of the initial hearing on September 28, 1971.

WHEREAS: Council initially authorized payment in the sum of \$500.00 to settle the claim and the matter has been further negotiated by the parties and has been settled for the sum of \$434.30.

WHEREAS: It is necessary for the health, safety and welfare of the Village of Plymouth and its citizens that this matter be amicably concluded without litigation. NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, A THIRTEEN (13) MEMBER CITY ELECTED THERE TO CONCURRING:

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ORDINANCE NO. 23-79 AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND THE CLERK TO EXECUTE A RELEASE OF THE AMERICAN EMPIRE INSURANCE COMPANY IN CASE NUMBER C75-254A NOW PENDING BEFORE THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT FOR THE NORTHERN DISTRICT OF OHIO, EASTERN DIVISION, FOR THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$122,000.00) AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS: The Village of Plymouth, Ohio, has been engaged in litigation before the United States District Court for the Northern District of Ohio, Eastern Division, in Case Number C75-254A, relative to recovering damages for the failure of the prime contractor to complete Sanitary Sewer Phase III in accordance with its contract and

WHEREAS: The plaintiff, American Empire Insurance Company, has offered the sum of One Hundred Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$122,000.00) in full payment of said claims and in exchange for a full release of liability and

Section 4: That the proceeds of settlement, after proper credit has been extended from the retainage, shall be deposited to the Sewer Operation and Maintenance Fund for distribution according to future legislative mandate.

Section 5: That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the Village and its citizens and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.
