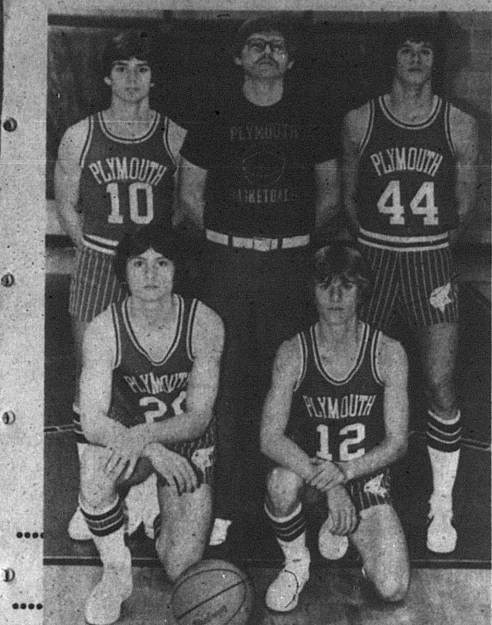




Fate of Red in hands of these five

Whether Plymouth basketball fortunes, like the fabled Phoenix bird, rise from the ashes this season is in large part dependent on the performance of these four players and their new coach, S. Michael Tracey, standing, center.

The Big Red meets Buckeye Central, generally a tough foe, here tomorrow in the third consecutive home game.

Three of the four are 11th graders and one, Marty Carty, kneeling at left, is a 12th grader. All are lettermen. Steve Tackett, a fifth letterman, was absent on picture day. The others are Rob Smith, kneeling, and Steve Mowry, left, and Brad Postema, standing.

Flames singe Red in overtime, 61 to 53

What befell Plymouth in overtime here Tuesday night was exactly what happened to the lady who backed into the airplane propeller.

Mansfield Christian's Flames scored seven unanswered points in the first overtime period and walked away with a 61 to 53 verdict in their first meeting ever with Plymouth and their first engagement ever in the Black Fork Valley conference.

It was a dull contest for one half. Neither team played particularly well until Plymouth began to find itself midway through the third quarter.

Scoring seven straight points, the Big Red forged to within a point of the Flames, only to have them shoot two free throws. These were by

Jeff Ellington, who was the hero of the overtime period with six points.

Plymouth went to the rest stop a point in front at 35 to 34.

After the visitors regained the lead and advanced to 38 to 35 lead, Plymouth scored nine unanswered points and took the advantage at 44 to 38. It was 48 to 42 with 1:36 left to play.

The Flames got a bucket by Mike Harjo and a free throw by Ellington and were right back in it. After a Red time out, Kevin Wallace converted a hook shot and with 19 seconds left, Ellington's field goal gave the Flames the lead at 49 to 48.

Plymouth called time out with four seconds left and worked the ball to Br-

Postema, who was fouled. With two shots coming and one second left, the Flames called for time. Then Postema tied the game with a successful shot. The second teetered off the rim.

In overtime, Marty Carty, who scored 14, got two free throws with 1:54 left. Then the Flames went to work. Wallace scored, Ellington fired two free throws, Jamie Hitchman got two more, Ellington scored and it was all over.

Plymouth shot well enough, with 17 good ones in 42 tries. But the Flames were better. 21 of 40.

Each team scored 19 free throws. Plymouth missed six, the Flames four.

It was a ragged contest throughout. Plymouth was charged with 22 turnovers. Mansfield Christian with 26. A 32-foot shot by Ralph Butler at the buzzer gave Plymouth a tie at 20 at the end of the second period.

Water supply: holding

Test of Chapman well 'satisfactory'

Preliminary reports say that production of the Chapman water well during the testing period that began this week is satisfactory.

The village's own wells have managed to produce enough water to fill the water tower, although at the beginning of the week, the clear well was not filled.

Contrary to published reports that water was pumped from the Chapman well to fill the tower, this was not done.

If the well is to be connected to the village system, easements must be obtained from property owners north of the village to the well.

Mayor Eric J. Akers appointed Councilman James Holloway to investigate obtaining them, should the well be used.

The report of the water consulting firm made on the village water system is due this week.

Two councilmen resign posts at Shiloh

Two councilmen and a trustee of public affairs at Shiloh resigned Nov. 26.

Mrs. Audrey Lemaster and Harry Foster, councilmen, left the governing body. Foster resigned in anticipation of a vacancy on the board of public affairs, which occurred when Lewis Lemaster resigned.

Mayor Francis Gowitzka appointed Foster to succeed Lemaster.

The Lemasters gave no reasons for their resignations.

Councilman Richard Tallman requested an exception be made in his case, since he does not need trash collection service in his storage room next to the village hall. He said boxes that collect there are promptly taken for storage purposes by others.

The council said if an exception is made in his case, others will seek to extend the practice.

Strike forces PLW to lay off 24 employees

The prospect of a bleak Christmas in Plymouth locomotive works, Inc., beset by a work stoppage since Oct. 1 when the labor contract with hourly employees expired, furloughed 24 office and middle management employees.

Some of them have worked for PLW or its predecessor firm, the Fate-Root-Heath Co., all their adult lives.

Signs were that unless negotiations with Local 2161, UAW, result in a settlement of the strike issues early soon, there will be another layoff of office and middle management help before Christmas.

Those negotiations were reported at press time to be sporadic in nature and non-productive in character. Some head-to-head conversations between PLW and its parent firm, Banner Industries, Inc., and the UAW have been conducted but those privy to them say they "haven't gotten anywhere".

Striking employees swear almost to a man that PLW has no intention of settling the strike before Christmas "because they don't want to pay Christmas vacation time".

Under Ohio law, non-striking employees who are furloughed because organized workers of the same employer are on strike are not eligible for unemployment compensation without the authorization of the employer. PLW has given that authorization and the 24 employees who were furloughed are in process of applying for these payments. What will be done about their fringe benefits — medical, dental and pharmaceutical coverage and life insurance coverage — hasn't been said.

Meanwhile, save for orderly picketing at four sites around the company premises in West High, Bell and Spruce streets, it was all quiet on the southwestern front. A report that PLW had notified Plymouth Police department that it intended to move the controversial truck that was the object of violence on Nov. 12 could not be confirmed by The Advertiser at press time.

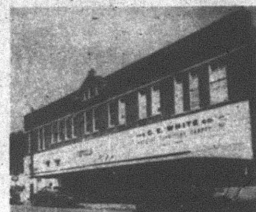

Britten, Rittman, 5 to 0, and again over Kline, 2 to 0, in overtime.

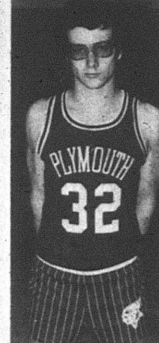

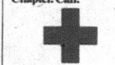
