CAC to receive applicants Tuesdays at village hall

Low income families living in Huron county may appeal to Erie-Huron Counties CAC in the village hall Tuesdays from 1 to 4 for assistance in paying winter heating bills. Assistance is available up to \$400 for the season to pay for gas, electric, fuel oil, propane gas, kerosene, coal or wood fuel. The money is deposited directly to the fuel supplier. If the applicant is 60 or older, or is handicapped, a credit of the remaining balance of the \$400 payment may be extended for future costs during the heating season. Households experiencing an immediate crisis situation that need such items as emergency fuel supplies, warm clothing, blankets, replacement of windows, shelter, foodstuffs, medicine and such may be eligible for a one-time voucher payment of up to \$50. Non-farm families of two persons with annual incomes of \$5,525 or less or monthly incomes of \$469 or less are eligible. For farm families of the same size, the figures are \$4,800 and \$400, respectively.

On interest in education

Consider that 65.1 per cent of our local tax dollar goes to support our schools (and let's not make any mistake about it: we don't support our schools so much as those who don't live in the district support them, in the ratio of about \$3 to \$7). Perhaps we all ought to look more carefully into the performance of the schools.

The General Assembly is considering a bill to require proficiency tests of candidates for diplomas. If they don't pass the tests, they don't get diplomas.

And already the educational establishment is assailing the move, which is no more than what other states have done or are beginning to do. The argument is that some pupils simply can't pass a proficiency test and it is wiser to let them go through the motions, to graduate them, to send them out into the world. Otherwise, the argument continues, the pupil will simply stay in school forever.

These arguments in one forum come on the heels of an announcement of a survey made by the Board of Regents. It showed that freshmen in state institutions require remedial reading and mathematics to a number that is embarrassing. In some institutions the levels were higher than in others (and in one, notably, the figures were zero; a wire service said "this occurred because of special adaptations to the admissions process") but they are nonetheless disturbing. Why? It's obvious. If the best prepared of our young people are deficient in such basic equipment as reading and mathematics, what of their classmates and peers who didn't go on to college?

For our part, we have long felt that a basic shortcoming of our system is that we allow pupils to select what courses please them, rather than what's good for them.

The wire service report referred to above states that most high schools require three years of English (why only three?) and one year of mathematics.

Our rationale is this: if it is worth while to teach John English and mathematics, then it is equally worth while to teach Fred English and mathematics, in the same volume and content, consistent with his capacity to learn.

Simultaneous with these discussions, another report deals with discipline in the schools. It suggests that access to drivers' licenses be denied to those who disrupt school discipline. Professional school people argue that, "since we don't have the issuing authority, why should we be saddled with the denial of licenses?"

We don't think this argument necessarily holds water.

And we're in favor of proficiency tests as a condition of issuance of a diploma, so long as we can have some input as to the content of the test.

Because, as we've so often said, education is too important to leave to the professionals.

20% electric rate increase to take effect immediately

An increase in electric rates of almost 20 per cent was passed Tuesday night by the village council.

Since the bills for January are in the mail, the increase will begin with the next billing period.

Ohio Power Co., from whom the village purchases electrical power at a wholesale rate, was granted a rate increase of 13.9 per cent by the Federal Power commission. The company had originally asked for an increase of 21 per cent, and apparently the banding together with 12 other municipalities which also purchase at the wholesale rate saved Plymouth about seven per cent.

Administrator James C. Root showed his displeasure about it by saying the village had not been notified the rate increase had been granted and he discovered it by checking the January bill from the company.

A meeting of the municipalities involved took place in Wapakoneta Jan. 19, but Plymouth was not represented.

Root estimates the electric fund has lost about \$5,000 in the two months involved in rates and the fuel adjustment clause.

The new rates will leave the first 100 kw. at the present rate, but all over 100

will be billed at 48 cents. Alvin Kelley, village income tax administrator, told the council about \$3,000 has been collected on withheld taxes from persons working in the village.

He estimates the Apr. 15 collection, a quarter of withheld taxes, taxes from individuals and estimated payments by businesses for 1980, will come to about \$25,000.

He urged the mayor and council to appoint a board of review. The mayor appoints one, the council one, and the two choose a third member.

Mayor Eric J. Akers said he has his choice in mind and urged the council to appoint its committees in deciding its choice.

Kelley suggested that the word "shall" be changed to "may" in the wording of the section of the income tax ordinance pertaining to enforcement of the rules of the ordinance.

He said it is not fair that most people will adhere to the ordinance and pay their taxes on time and a handful not. During his study of municipalities which have an income tax, he found that enforcement was not actively acted upon.

First reading was given to an ordinance establishing the salary for the director of taxation at \$5 an hour for not over 35 hours a week, with all fringe benefits the pay ordinance now calls for. Annually this will amount to \$9,100.

The position of deputy director was established at an annual salary of \$501.

Kelley's position was temporary to set up the tax system and provision had not been made for a permanent position and salary.

Mayor Akers said he is talking to several people about filling the position of

clerk-treasurer and will consult with the rules committee before he makes a definite appointment.

By resolution the council formally accepted Raymond Brooks' resignation for the best interest of the village and with regret.

Akers said the state examiner was here Monday and still did not find the village books adequate.

These are now balanced through Dec. 31, 1977.

The mayor and Root have been working on them and believe that in two weeks they will be up to date. The examiner is to return in 30 days to check. If he finds them satisfactory, the village may then request an audit.

The mayor said he will

welcome any help from any citizen in straightening out the village records.

Councilman Ervin Howard, chairman of the rules and administration committee, said two candidates for the village solicitor had been interviewed, Richard Wolf, Ashland, and Lee Shepherd, Shelby.

He said the committee's choice was Wolf, who is a member of the Ashland college faculty and is the law director for Ashland.

The position is to be offered to mayor, Eric J. Akers, for an annual retainer of \$1,200, \$55 an hour for any excessive work, if he is willing to attend from 10 to 12 meetings a year.

Seven clerks in 10 years: is it a record?

Plymouth may hold the record for changes in the position of village clerk-treasurer.

In the last decade, seven have filled the position.

The late J. Phillips Moore, father of Councilman G. Thomas Moore, resigned his council seat in the fall of 1969 to take the position when Mrs. Harold Lippus resigned to spend the winter in Florida.

He held it until the summer of 1971, when illness forced him to retire.

Mrs. William Wheeler, who had been the utility clerk under Mrs. Lippus but at that time was not in the village employ, was appointed to fill the last six months of Mr. Moore's term.

Quentin R. Ream was elected to a four year term beginning Jan. 1, 1972.

After three months, he resigned because the work was too time consuming along with his regular duties as an employee of the then Peoples National bank.

Mrs. Delores Baker was appointed by the mayor to

the position. She resigned after one year in office to take a better paying position.

The utility clerk, Mrs. Barbara Hass, filled the position until the present mayor, Eric J. Akers, received his law degree from Ohio Northern university.

He served until the end of 1972, when he began practicing law in Ashland.

It was at the time he took office that the annual salary for the position was raised from \$4,500 to \$5,000.

After Akers left, William G. Hamilton was appointed to finish Ream's four year term.

He served the remaining two years and ran unsuccessfully for reelection. He was defeated by Miss Anita Riedinger, who was the village utility clerk.

She left the office in March, 1978, when she married.

Raymond L. Brooks, retired postmaster, was then appointed and was the only candidate for the position in November, 1979.

He signed his resignation Friday, when it was requested by Mayor Akers.

President of the chamber, Dr. James Holloway, said this week there is "a great possibility of a restaurant opening in the village in the near future."

Crestview clinches first BFVC title

Crestview scored 13 unanswered points toward the end of the third period in a Blackforn Valley conference game there Friday and defeated Plymouth, 89 to 71.

Until that point, it was an exciting game that featured splendid play on both sides. From the outset, it was the sensational Fred Stimpert, who wound up with 31 points, the game high, versus Plymouth's two guns, Randy Neeley and Jeff Ream.

But Neeley was held scoreless in the third quarter, restricted to four shots at the basket, and Stimpert matched the eight points that Ream achieved.

Plymouth stayed close to a team whose shooting was remarkable. The Big Red trailed by four after eight minutes, having matched the Cougars basket for basket, and by six at the half. It was in the third period that Plymouth faltered. Its defense collapsed. The Cougars managed 16 shots at the basket and converted nine of them. Plymouth's offense wasn't up to the task. It got 20 shots and made only six. So Crestview went into the final quarter with a good lead, at 63 to 48.

Despite the best performance of the year by Steve Tackett, an 11th grader, in the final eight minutes, he scored 10 points - Stimpert returned to action after a rest midway in the period and scored nine points. Crestview outscored Plymouth in the last quarter by three.

Neeley, ever dependable, kept Plymouth in the match in the early going with 12 points in the first eight minutes and four more in the second.

Ream, meanwhile, was limited to four shots, with just one success, in the first quarter. He warmed up thereafter. In the second period he got eight shots and canned three of them and added two free throws. His point total for the night was 22, high for the Big Red. Tackett's total of 18 was a career high.

In all, Plymouth got 76 shots and made 32 of them. It missed only two of nine free throws.

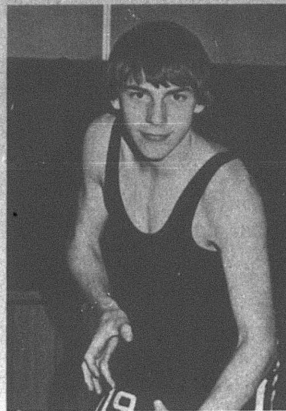

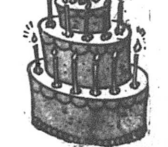
