Nine boys delinquent in village in 1979

Of 344 iuveniles dealt with Of 344 juveniles dealt with as delinquents in Huron county during 1979, nine were boys charged by Plym-outh Police department. Twenty-eight of the 344 delinquents were females.

The county juvenile judge also dealt with 114 unruly juveniles, of whom 46 were male and 68 were female.

Six of the nine delinquents charged by local police live in Plymouth

Of the 458 complaints, 410 were committed against residents of the county.

A total of 94 complaints was for burglary, robbery, theft, shoplifting or receiving stolen property. Another 82 were for breaking and entering and criminal tresnassing.




