PVN Corp. wins race to build Shelby station

construction of a radio sta-tion in Shelby was filed with the Federal Communications commission Apr. 21, Edward A. Hunter, president of one of the applicants has announc-ed.

The agreement, between Harry Wilber, Oberlin, and The Petroleum V. Nasby Corp., provides that Wilber will withdraw his application for the station in exchange for reimbursement of his expenses in filing the proposal. Under FCC rules, the FCC must approve the agreement. Hunter said the company's attorney believes approval will be given within 30 days.

company will be given within approval will be given within a Wilber filed a permit to build an FM station in Shelby in February, 1978. PVN, a corporation owned by Shelby Willard and Plymouth residents submitted a competing application in January, 1979. By law, the FCC could grant only one of

two proposals.
Hunter said, "Mr. Wilber is a fine broadcaster and would have been a formidable opponent in a hearing. We are grateful that he agreed not to oppose our bid to build a locally-owned and operated with the proposal work of the work of the proposal would have been his second station.

PVN proposes to build a transmitter and tower in Route 61, midway between Plymouth and Shelby, a location which takes advant-age of high terrain. The station's main studio will be located in Shelby. Hunter-said the company's consult-ing engineer estimates the station will reach over 70,000 people in a 700 square-mite area.


