Village staff issues ultimatum on pay

Plymouth's financial woes were added to Thursday night when village employees made known their newest payroll demands.

For the most part, salary increases are not being sought. Employees are asking for a cost of living adjustment, which can mean almost 15 per cent added to their current salaries that have been in effect since February, 1979. They wish this to be retroactive to that date.

Time-and-a-half for overtime hours is being asked. At present, straight time is being paid or compensatory time given for extra work.

Terry Jump, electrical superintendent, who is the spokesman for the employees, says there is no way he can take time off because of the demands of his job.

Their other demands include more paid holidays during the year, two days a month sick leave and the assurance that the council will review the pay ordinance every January and make adjustments.

The salary increases are for the utility clerk, Mrs. John Ganthorn, who is asking for \$4 an hour from \$3.50 (she contends that CETA workers assigned to the village are earning \$3.85 and she feels her job carries more responsibilities) and regular patrolman, who have served their six month probationary period, asking for \$14,500 annually from \$10,575.

Instead of being paid bi-weekly, employees want that changed to weekly.

Jump also brought up the fact that although the council has approved a new hospitalization plan with expanded benefits, it has not shown any of the employees in writing that it is actually in effect.

Notice was given to the council by Jump that they

expect answers to all the demands by the next regular meeting Aug. 25.

Just what the employees will do if the council rejects all or any of the demands is not known.

Last week when the general fund payroll was not met, the police department contemplated not working and officers informed that if they walked off the job, they had terminated their employment.

Four members of the council, Ervin and David Howard, Dean Cline and Douglas Brumbach, went along with Mayor Eric J. Akers' suggestion of changing Section 20 of the income tax ordinance for the sixth time since the ordinance was adopted last December.

The change of allocating funds will provide for the general fund payroll to be met for the remainder of the year. Akers estimates this will be about \$17,000.

Because of the absence of Councilmen G. Thomas Moore and Michael R. Taylor, an emergency ordinance which requires five

councilmen to vote could not be passed.

Consequently, two special meetings, Friday night and Saturday noon, were necessary to make that change, which required three readings of the altered ordinance.

The mayor asked the council what it wished to do about placing a levy on the November ballot to benefit the general fund. Sept. 5 is the deadline, submit a levy to the board of elections.

He pointed out that if a levy were on the ballot, the anticipated revenue could not be included in any recommendations of the financial planning committee, since it could be voted down.

None of the councilmen made a comment.

The mayor also pointed out that he felt the clerk-treasurer's duties were burdensome, and that the reserve funds should be done away with where they exist.

"Just keep a healthy balance in each fund and earmark it for capital improvement," he said.

He has contended that the village in the past set up fund the utility accounts illegally because they did not have state approval.

The first reserve fund, which was for the electric department, was ordered by the state to maintain 10 per cent of the value of the electrical distribution system in 1963.

The mayor also told the council he believes that all the village funds can "hold their own" except for the general fund, which will either have to be strengthened with a fresh tax or more money from the income tax fund.

He estimates the police department should have about \$82,000 next year to operate at full strength, however, the budget approved last month only earmarks \$38,000 for it.

There are now three "ifs" concerning the proposed water line from Willard's treatment plant to the village.

They are dependent on which municipality can obtain a grant to install the line or if no grant is available.

Village administrator James C. Root said he has been on the telephone to every agency he can think of to see what is available and each tells him to "try to obtain a grant," but they have not been forthcoming.

He strongly suggested the village obtain good engineering advice for which there is a chance of a grant.

The mayor suggested there is the probability of water

rates being increased to cover the cost of the village's share of the line.

Who will own what part of the line if installed seems to zig and zag from Nick Zick road and Route 61 to Skinner road and Route 61. More meetings are planned with the village's water committee and the Willard council and city manager.

Brumbach suggested if no grants were available, perhaps the village could turn to Fm HA to obtain a low interest loan. If that does occur, he said, FmHA would end up setting new water rates as it did for the sewer system.

The mayor seriously asked the council its opinion of paying for something that Plymouth would not own.

Councilman David Howard said he was opposed to Willard charging Plymouth the double water rate since Plymouth is out of Willard's city limits, and its ordinance calls for a double rate for such service. Willard has now said that it would charge \$1.20 instead of \$1.26 a thousand gallons used, and if over 5,000 gallons is used in two months, the rate would drop to 60 cents.

Brumbach replaces Taylor

Newly-appointed Councilman D. Douglas Brumbach was named to the village planning commission Thursday night.

He replaces Councilman Michael R. Taylor, who plans to be out of town for some time.

Mayor Eric J. Akers requested the council to make the change and Councilman Dean A. Cline nominated Brumbach.

Also serving on the commission are Mrs. Charles Pritchard, Miss Luella Vandervort, Kenneth Osborn and the mayor.

The main purpose of the commission will be to study a zoning ordinance and make recommendations to the council.

During the last 25 years several proposals have been made, but several councils turned them down.

The main objections have been that some councilmen did not feel anyone has the right to tell a citizen what he can or cannot do with his property and that out of economic necessity. Two families might wish to occupy dwellings zoned for one family only.

Schools to open Tuesday; some bus routes altered

Public schools will open Tuesday. Elementary pupils will attend sessions from 8:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

Junior high and high school pupils will attend classes from 7:45 a.m. to 2:40 p.m.

Bus schedules have been altered this year, Supt. Douglas Staggs reports. Parents

may call the bus garage to learn if their child's schedule

has been changed. Pupils who ride school buses should be at the bus stop 10 minutes early on the first day of school.

Parents of all pupils are reminded of Ohio law that requires all children to be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, poliovirus, measles and rubella. Pupils not so immunized may not remain in school more than 14 days. The pupil or his parent must provide written evidence of compliance with the law.
