# Village staff issues ultimatum on pay

Plymouth's financial woes were added to Thursday night when village employees made known their newest payroll demands.

For the most part, salary increases are not being sought. Employees are asking for a cost of living adjustment, which can mean almost 15 per cent added to their current salaries that have been in effect since Pebruary. 1979. They wish this to be retroactive to that date.

Time-and-a half for overtime hours is being asked. At
present, straight time is
being paid or compensatory
time given for extra work.




