

Willard water: one vote nay

Plymouth plans to proceed with a scheme to draw water from Willard but not with the approval of Councilman D. Douglas Brumback.

He voted on Dec. 22 against a resolution to approve the plans of Burgess E. Niple, Columbus water consultants, by which the mayor and the service committee will open negotiations with Willard.

Tax on phone won't be cut this year

The two per cent federal excise tax on telephone service will not be reduced to one per cent in 1981 as scheduled, General Telephone Co. of Ohio announces.

The tax, which has been decreasing one per cent annually since 1970, was frozen at two per cent for another year by the recently passed budget reconciliation bill (House Resolution 7665).

According to GenTel, the utility tax started out as a 12 percent "luxury" tax during World War I. Although repealed in 1924 it reappeared as a "temporary measure" in 1932 during the Depression.

It was broadened in 1942 to meet needs of World War II.

In 1970, the Federal Excise, Estate and Gift Tax Adjustment Act reduced the tax to be reduced one per cent each year until abolished in 1982.

But, according to the 1980 budget bill, it won't be cut to one per cent until 1982.

The "temporary" tax is to become history in January, 1983.

A Park avenue resident appeared before the council to make a complaint against a councilman who he said, insulted his wife. He had complained to the village that his electric bill of \$130 last month was out of line. It was determined that he had a defective hot water heater, which he blamed on the village for the variances in water pressure.

No quorum, Osburn proceeds —

Planners ask \$1,500,000, but nobody cares!

An effort by the village planning commission to start an application for \$1.5 million in HUD grants failed for lack of a quorum Dec. 30.

(Kennon Osburn, chairman of the commission, called a public meeting to discuss the preapplication.

Only three persons appeared and Osburn reluctantly cancelled the hearing.

Nevertheless, he submitted the application without public input or official action by the council.

The initial request is for \$500,000 with which to improve streets, sidewalks and sewers in West High, Nichols and Beel-

He said it is his understanding that the preapplication process is vital to success. If the preapplication process is approved by the federal government, he said, "there is a 95 per cent chance that the grant will be received."

In addition to the \$500,000 small cities community development block grant (SCCDBG), Plymouth will also seek an imminent threat grant provided by HUD to alleviate immediate threats to a community's health and safety.

Osburn said he was urged by Wayne E. Strine, fire chief, to seek the imminent threat grant because

the village's water distribution system is in poor condition. "The safety of the people of Plymouth is in jeopardy in event of a major fire because of poor water distribution," he said.

Osburn said he has conducted a survey of 49 households in the village, 25 of which, he said, have inadequate or no insulation at all. He added that 60 per cent of the population of the village falls into the low to moderate income range.

HUD will decide by June whether Plymouth can have the money. If this occurs, the money would flow in August.

What will 1981 bring here? Signs not so good now

If the year just closed was any benchmark of what the 1980's will bring for Plymouth, look out!

And only a few days into the new year of 1981, already there are ominous signs.

"I frankly admit I'm in serious trouble," says one Plymouth businessman.

"If this thing doesn't turn around, and turn around quickly, I predict there will be a 40 per cent business failure rate in Plymouth before the year is out," says another.

"My business is actively for sale," says a third.

The recent labor stoppage opened wounds that may never be healed and its effects won't be overcome easily or soon, if ever. We report elsewhere today that fewer than half of the hourly employees have been called back to work.

There looms on the horizon the specter of further water shortages. Even if the ambitious fellow who has steered the preliminary application for a government grant to pay for some of the water solution is successful, it is bound to be expensive to all of us. In his financial plan submitted to the board appointed by the governor, the mayor said he expects that a 50 per cent raise in water rates will, at the minimum, be required.

The largest newspaper in the state on Monday published a piece to the effect that summer jobs will be scarcer than hens' teeth. It hasn't yet investigated the job picture for June graduates. But even a blind man hereabouts can see that they are bleak.

What can we do?

"We've got to tough it out," says one businessman already quoted above.

"We've got to pull in our belts, make what economies we can, and try to hang on. To sell out, or try to sell out, seems a little foolish to me, for this reason: Why would one want to sell unless he's not making it,

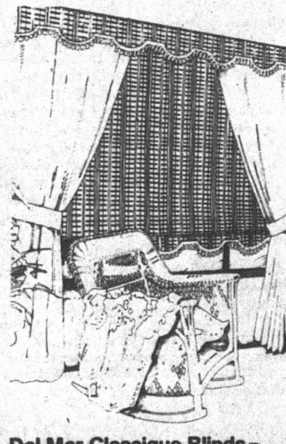

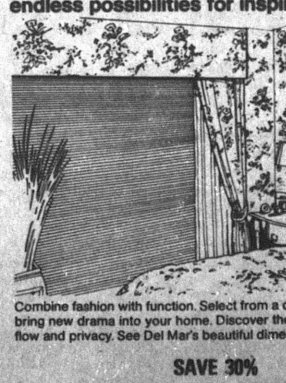

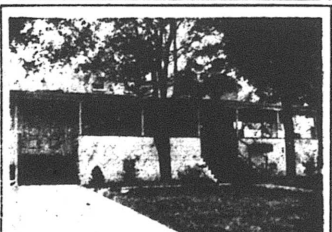

WHEREAS: The Council of the Village of Plymouth has heretofore determined the necessity of meeting current expenses, payable out of the Income Tax Fund.

WHEREAS: The Clerk-Treasurer as fiscal officer, has certified to this council that the revenue anticipated from the Income Tax for operations and maintenance is \$44,000.00 Forty-Four Thousand Dollars.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH A MAJORITY OF ALL MEMBERS ELECTED THERE-TO CONCERNING:

Section 1. That it is hereby declared necessary to borrow in anticipation of collection of Income Tax of the Village of Plymouth in the principal sum of \$11,000.00 for the purpose of paying current operating expense.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio, Four (4) members thereto concurring:

Section 1. That section 20 of Ordinance No. 10-80 is hereby amended as follows:

Section 2. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, property, health, safety and welfare, and for the further reason that a payroll is due to be paid on May 9, 1980.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 16-80 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 10-80, REALLOCATING THE FEDERAL REVENUE SHARING FUND APPROPRIATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
