Village finances improving, report shows

Plymouth's finances seem well under control, according to the clerk-treasurer's report to the council for October.

The general fund shows a balance on Oct. 31 of \$38,419.92. Receipts were \$5,066.98, \$9,421.45 was disbursed and \$5,035.14 was transferred to it.

The income tax fund has a balance of \$20,139.02, the cemetery fund \$5,148.61, the fire operating and maintenance fund \$559.51, the park fund \$2,591.81, the federal revenue sharing fund \$6,548.91, the fire pump fund \$73,276.25, the sewer district service fund \$47,622.53, the sewer operating and maintenance fund \$12,998.91, the sewer reserve fund \$44,689.98, the ambulance operation and maintenance fund

\$1,192.61; the ambulance reserve fund \$9,969.57.

Also, the electric operation and maintenance fund \$40,764.99, the electric reserve fund \$38,091, the water operation and maintenance fund \$11,715.21 and the water reserve fund \$2,185.77.

Some of the receipts for each fund during October, in addition to regularly received payments for services and tax money, are from the interest generated by short time investments.

The street department had a balance of \$2,097.83 and the state highway fund \$1,471.48.

Both funds will be receiving gasoline tax money and motor vehicle license money which has been released by the state auditor to each county this week.

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Hourly help agrees to 36-hour week

The single blast of the Plymouth Locomotive Works whistle Monday at 6:30 a. m., 25 minutes earlier than usual, heralded the beginning of what amounts to a 10 per cent wage cut for hourly employees.

Members of UAW Local 2161 voted unanimously last week to accept their employer's proposal to cut the work week to 36 hours, four days of nine hours each.

The company had made other proposals but the reduced work

week was that which found approval among employees.

Alternative to a reduced work week was the indefinite furloughing of 10 per cent of the work force, already depleted by 22 fresh layoffs in the past month.

New gas contract approved by three to one vote

Over the objections of Councilman John Heeden, who voted yes for the third time on the passage of a new contract with Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc., three councilmen gave their approval Nov. 10.

The PUCO could not furnish figures so quickly but he said it informed him that rates set by it were about 11 per cent lower than what a municipality could negotiate.

Heeden wanted a "roll back" clause inserted in the contract.

Jerry Tischer, manager of ColGas's Mansfield district, said it is impossible with this contract to include such a clause since the contract is based on 1980 costs and what costs will be in the two years the contract runs are unknown.

Representatives of John Sawvel, electric consultant, Findlay, explained a preliminary report to the council.

Councilman Billy Taulbee and Ervin Howard were absent.

Councilman G. Thomas Moore said he has been checking with the Consumers Council and the PUCO and discovered that the council was able to furnish him with figures of averages charged throughout the state, which range from \$46 to \$80 monthly. Plymouth's average rate under the new contract will be about \$60.

The final report will include rate changes, which will increase somewhat for low users, and lower rates for high users.

It will also assure that the electric fund should maintain a year-end balance of about \$90,000.

They strongly suggested the village carry more insurance on the system. Their preliminary inspection sets

the value of the distribution system at about \$800,000.

J. C. Landers, Ernst & Whinney accountant assigned by the state to work with the village over its finances, explained the new accounting system the state will put into effect Jan. 1, 1982.

He said because of the greater detail, the council will have better control over the village's spending and receipts.

He then asked for an executive session to discuss personnel, which lasted an hour. When it was finished, no announcements were made of what had been discussed.

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If bench comes through, Red may be 7-and-13

Dunn doesn't expect that Lucas will be a contender for league honors.

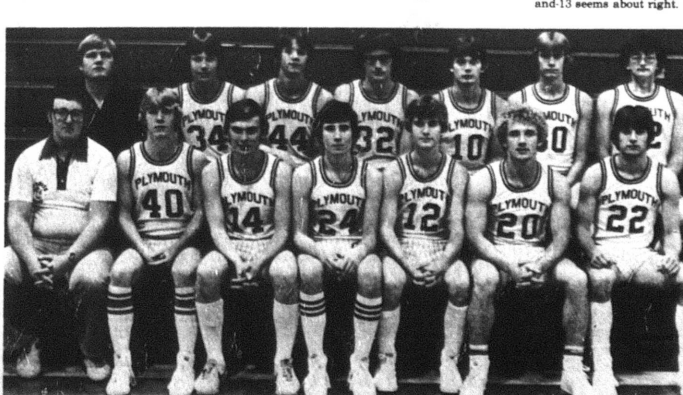
As for Crestview, on whose roster appears Dunn's

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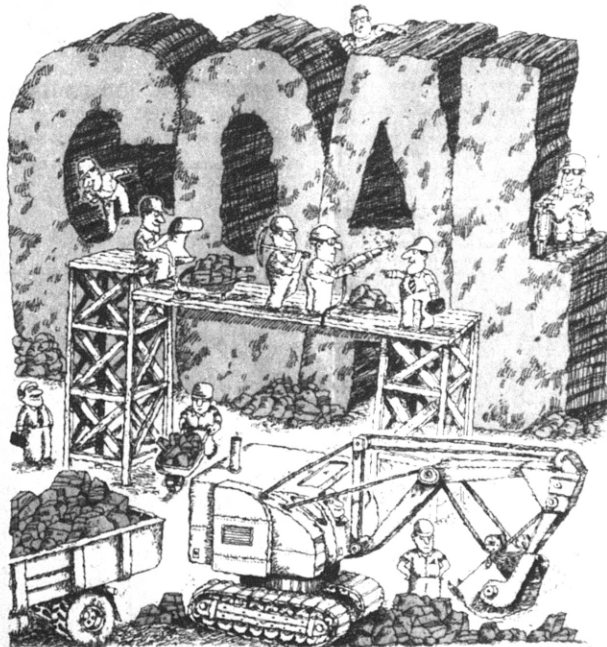

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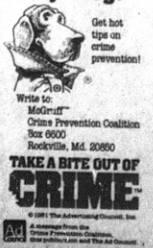
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ORDINANCE NO. 31-81
Fixing and regulating the price that may be charged by Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc., its successors or assigns, for gas to the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and to its inhabitants, for the period of Two (2) Years from and after the effective date of this ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH,

per meter per month, for all gas consumed.

A "Customer Charge" of \$3.85, per meter per month, regardless of gas consumed and 6.550¢ per 100 cubic feet, per meter per month, for all gas consumed.

A "Customer Charge" for each customer each month of Three Dollars and Eighty-five Cents (\$3.85) shall be made. If service under this rate schedule is discontinued at the request of customer, the Company shall not be under any obligation to resume service to the same customer on the same premises until the customer has made payment of an amount equal to the "Customer Charge" for each month of the intervening period, but not to exceed twelve (12) months.

From and after the expiration of the aforesaid One Year period and for the further period of One (1) Year thereafter, as follows:

A "Customer Charge" of \$3.85, per meter per month, regardless of gas consumed and 7.447¢ per 100 cubic feet, per meter per month, for all gas consumed.

A "Customer Charge" for each customer each month of Three Dollars and Eighty-five Cents (\$3.85) shall be made. If service under this rate schedule is discontinued at the request of customer, the Company shall not be under any obligation to resume service to the same customer on the same premises until the customer has made payment of an amount equal to the "Customer Charge" for each month of the intervening period, but not to exceed twelve (12) months.

The above rates exclude gas costs and the Ohio Gross Receipts Tax. All bills rendered pursuant to this ordinance shall be adjusted to reflect the effect of the Ohio Gross Receipts Tax and are subject to decrease or increase in accordance with the "Gas Cost Recovery" Provisions of the Company's Rules and Regulations, on file with the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.

SECTION 2: That it is expressly conditioned the service to be rendered by said Company, its successors or assigns, pursuant to this ordinance shall be primarily for domestic and commercial purposes and that service shall not be extended to other consumers of different classes until after all reasonable requirements for domestic and commercial purposes are fully met, and this provision shall be binding upon said Company, its successors or assigns, during each month of the year; but during any month or year, subject to the foregoing limitations and after compliance with the foregoing provisions gas may be delivered to any other consumer and additional classes of consumers at such times and under such conditions and for such rates as may be agreed upon between the Company and such consumer or consumers.

SECTION 3: The terms and conditions of the service to be rendered shall conform with

and be subject to the Rules and Regulations for furnishing gas service of the Company of file with and approved by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.

SECTION 4: That the gas furnished or delivered pursuant to the terms of this ordinance, by the said Company, shall have an average heating value of 1,000 British thermal units per cubic foot for any consecutive twelve (12) month period subject to a variance of not more than five (5) percent upward or downward.

SECTION 5: In the event of the State of Ohio, or the Municipality, should hereafter impose a tax upon the Company that is not now provided, or should hereafter increase the rate of any tax now imposed upon the Company above the tax rate now existing, other than the rate on property listed in the real estate tax list and duplicate, then the rates prescribed in Section 1 shall be increased to the extent necessary to compensate the Company for the increase in cost due to such new tax or higher tax rate. This shall be done in the following manner:

(a) If the new tax or higher tax rate is computed in direct relation to gas sold or revenues received for the sale of gas, the rates set forth herein shall be adjusted to the extent necessary to reimburse the Company for the amount thereof.

(b) If the new tax or higher tax rate is not related directly to gas sold or to revenues received for the sale of gas, then the total dollar effect thereof upon the cost of serving gas by the Company in the Municipality shall be determined based upon operations of the Company in the Municipality during the most recently available twelve month period ending on the last day of the December preceding the effective date of the new tax or higher tax rate; the total dollars so computed shall then be divided by the total sales made to the types of customers covered by this ordinance during the same twelve-month period and the rates prescribed herein shall be correspondingly adjusted.

The adjustment of the rates prescribed in this Ordinance, as provided in subparagraphs (a) and (b) above, shall be made by rounding the mathematical result of the computation prescribed to the nearest one quarter cent (¼¢) per one thousand cubic feet.

The adjusted rate shall be placed in effect and shall apply to all meter readings occurring on and after the effective date of the statute, ordinance or resolution pursuant to which the new tax or increased tax rate is imposed.

Written notification of the adjustment shall be sent to the Clerk of Council of the Municipality as quickly as possible after the effect of the new tax or higher tax rate can be determined.

SECTION 6: That any ordinance or resolution, or part of an ordinance or resolution, inconsistent herewith, is, to the extent of such inconsistency, hereby repealed.

SECTION 7: That should any section or part of a section or provision of a section of this ordinance be declared void, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 8: That this ordinance shall become effective on January 1, 1982; provided, however, that this ordinance shall have no force or effect whatsoever until the written acceptance of this ordinance is filed by the Company to the expiration of thirty (30) days from the date this ordinance is passed.
