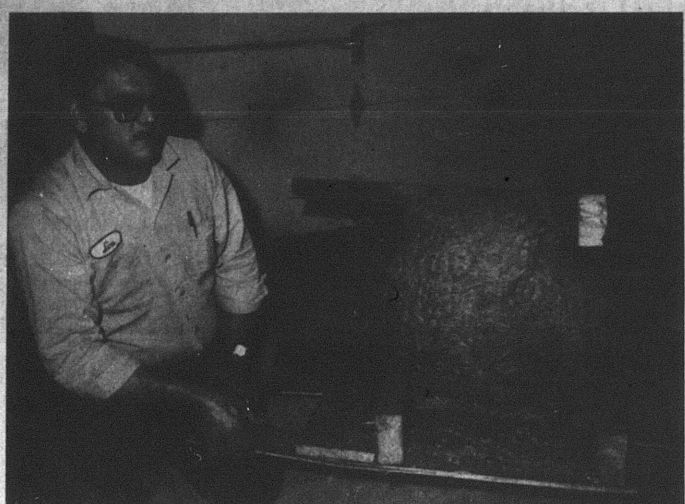

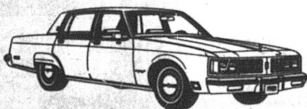

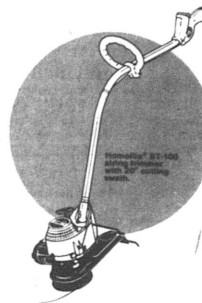

ORDINANCE NO. 14-S1
AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, RICHLAND & HURON COUNTIES, OHIO, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR, VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR, AND CLERK/TREASURER OF THE VILLAGE TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH THE CITY OF WILLARD, HURON COUNTY, OHIO FOR THE PURCHASE OF WATER FROM SAID CITY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Village of Plymouth, Richland-Huron Counties, Ohio (hereinafter referred to as Village) presently has a supply of water not capable of meeting the needs of the residents of the Village; and, WHEREAS, the City of Willard, Huron County, Ohio (hereinafter referred to as City) owns and operates a water treatment plant and distribution system capable of serving the needs of the residents of the Village; and, WHEREAS, it is necessary to have executed, on behalf of the village, a water purchase contract setting forth the terms and conditions by which the City shall sell and the Village shall buy said water; and, WHEREAS, because it is immediately necessary for the peace, health and preservation of the public safety, for the reason that the assured adequate supply of water must be maintained to meet the needs of the residents of the Village, this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure. NOW THEREFORE be it ordained by the council of the Village of Plymouth, 5 members thereto concurring: Section 1. That the Mayor, Village Administrator, and Clerk/Treasurer of the Village be and are hereby authorized to enter into a water purchase contract with the City, said contract setting forth the terms and conditions upon which the City shall sell and the Village shall purchase said water.

Section 2. That, because it is immediately necessary for the peace, health and preservation of the public safety, for the reason that the assured adequate supply of water must be maintained to meet the needs of the residents of the Village, this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure.
