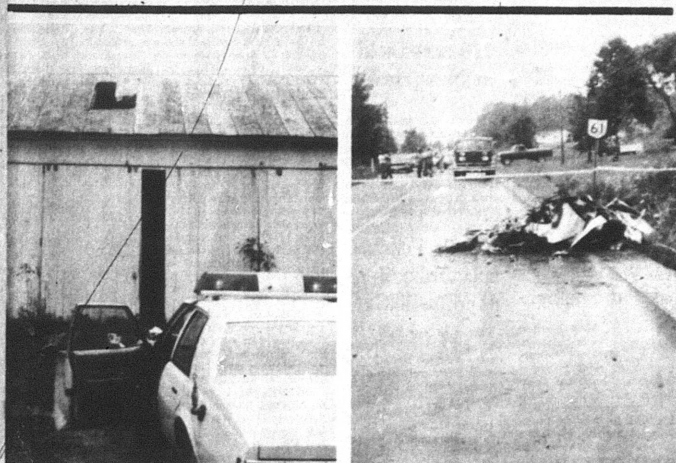

Mayor to push zoning, names Taubee, Howard

Enactment of a village zoning ordinance was undertaken July 29 by Mayor Dean A. Cline.

He appointed Councilmen Bill Taubee and Ervin Howard to a committee to work with an appointed member of the village planning commission.

Former Mayor Eric J. Akers strongly recommended in his letter of resignation that the village have such an ordinance.

Finally, on July 29, after two aborted meetings when there were not enough councilmen present, loose ends of legislation were concluded.

Three ordinances were adopted.

James C. Root, village administrator, told the council the last of the two easements required for the water line from Willard have been obtained.

He strongly suggested that the village put an engineer on a retainer's fee for future planning.

Root also said the village has purchased a device by which water leaks can be determined. This takes, he said, patience and time.

His question of what the council plans to do about buildings that have not connected to the sanitary sewer system was left unanswered.

Aircraft explodes, two New Jerseyans die

Two New Jerseyans plunged to their deaths on a farm in Updike road south of here Monday at 2 p.m. when their single engine aircraft exploded in mid-air.

Charles Conklin, Jr., 44, pilot, and his wife, Dorothy, 41, both of West Milford, N.J., died when their 1953 Mooney aircraft came apart over the premises of the William H. Riels in the south side of Updike road.

Earlier, the aircraft, which state highway patrol officers said was bound from Wisconsin to Mansfield, was reported by witnesses to have encountered some difficulties. It circled the south edge of the village with its engine sputtering, Mrs. William C. Enderby told The Advertiser. She awakened her husband, who was napping, to warn him of her fears.

Highway patrolmen said the plane was headed north in an apparent maneuver to resume the last leg of its journey when the wings blew off. They were found east of the Riel property, together with parts of the fuselage and some of the Conklins' luggage.

The pilot's body was found in a barn immediately west of the Riel premises. His passenger's body was found in a field about 50 yards east of the Riel house.

The engine, or what remained of it, the wheels and some of the framework of the aircraft alighted in the northbound lane of Route 61 a few steps north of where it crosses Updike road.

FAA investigators on the scene said they had no idea why the aircraft disintegrated and implied an investigation to determine what occurred will take some time.

The third ordinance approves changes in the billing for multi-housing units, by which credit is to be given for the monthly minimum charge for water and sewer usage. This problem erupted when several owners of such units came to the council, objecting they had not received credit for what their renters were paying monthly as a minimum charge. They were being billed for the total water usage for the quarter, whereas their renters were paying for 2,000 gallons a month, which had not been deducted from the quarterly bill.

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A revised sub-division ordinance, already passed at a public hearing, was tabled at the request of Councilman Ervin Howard.

No action was taken, either, on a revised trailer ordinance which the rule committee under Howard is reviewing.

The mayor requested that each committee put the substance of its meetings in writing to the other committees of the council. This, he said, will save time from lengthy discussions at regular council meetings.

Howard was chosen president pro-tempore of the council by his colleagues.

ORDINANCE NO. 22-81
AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THAT BILLINGS FOR THE WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENTS BE MADE ON A MONTHLY BASIS, WITH READINGS FOR ACTUAL USAGE AND BILLING THEREFOR BEING MADE ON A BIL-MONTHLY BASIS AND THE MINIMUM CHARGES FOR SUCH SERVICES BEING ASSESSED IN THE BILLING FOR THE INTERVENING MONTHS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, this Council desires to provide that billings for the Water and Sewer Departments be made on a monthly basis; and

WHEREAS, in order to implement such billing at the earliest possible time so as to ensure the continued effective and efficient administration of the Water and Sewer Departments, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, property, health, safety and welfare; now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, 5 members thereto concurring:

Section 1. That the billings for services of the Water and Sewer Departments of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall be made on a monthly basis, with readings for actual usage and billing therefor being made on a bi-monthly basis and the minimum charges for such services being assessed in the billing for the intervening month.

Section 2. That the provisions of this Ordinance shall have retroactive application for the billing period commencing June 15, 1981.

If any such unit is not individually metered, water service shall not be provided to said unit. Each unit of a multi-unit facility, created or established prior to the date of this ordinance shall be individually metered and in all respects treated as a single entity under the provisions of this and other related ordinances, unless application for exemption from said requirement be made to the Village Administrator and he finds that such individual metering is not feasible, economically impracticable or otherwise unreasonable. The owner of any multi-unit facility, not so exempted from the individual metering requirement, shall cause each unit to be plumbed to accommodate the installation of a meter not later than three months after receiving notice by the Administrator to do so. Upon failure of the owner of any such non-exempted multi-unit facility to install, as set forth above, plumbing facilities that will adequately accommodate a metering device for each separate unit, the Village shall terminate and suspend the water service to the entire facility until the actual charges for water service, as well as sewer service, being allowed a credit of 2,000 gallons per unit per month against such bill for the actual amount of the water service, thus paying for the amount used, in excess of the aforesaid minimum, (2,000 gallons per unit per month) at the rate estab-

lished by ordinance, for such excess amount.

Section 2. That existing Section 5 of Ordinance 18-78 and any other ordinance or part of any other ordinance in conflict herewith is hereby repealed.

Notice of Application of General Telephone Company of Ohio for Increases and Adjustments in Rates and Charges

Pursuant to the requirements of Section 4909.19 of the Ohio Revised Code, General Telephone Company of Ohio hereby gives notice that on June 30, 1981, it filed with the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio an application (PUCO Docket No. 81-383-TP-AIR) for authority to increase and adjust its rates and charges for telecommunications service and to change its regulations and practices affecting the same.

This notice contains the substance and prayer of the application. However, any interested party desiring complete detailed information with respect to all affected rates, charges, regulations and practices should inspect a copy of the application and all attached schedules at the office of the Commission, 375 South High Street, Columbus, Ohio. A copy of the application may be inspected by any interested party at the office of the General Telephone Company of Ohio located at 100 Executive Drive, Marion, Ohio. A copy of the application and the proposed tariff sheets is also available for inspection during normal business hours at any public business office or Phone Mart of General Telephone Company of Ohio. In addition, the proposed tariffs were mailed to the mayors and legislative authorities of all municipalities served by the company on March 27, 1981, as part of the company's notification of its intent to file.

This application affects rates and charges for telecommunications services to all customers of General Telephone Company of Ohio, provided pursuant to its Exchange Rate Tariff, P.U.C.O. No. 6, and General Exchange Tariff, P.U.C.O. No. 7.

Any person, firm, corporation or association may file, pursuant to Section 4909.19 of the Ohio Revised Code, objections to the proposed increases and adjustments in rates and charges, and to the proposed changes in regulations and practices affecting the same. The objections may allege that such application contains proposals that are unjust and discriminatory or unreasonable. Recommendations which differ from the application may be made by the staff of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio or by intervening parties and may be adopted by the Commission.

Local Exchange Service

The application proposes to change and restructure the existing exchange rate groups and charges. The proposed local exchange rate groups will identify only the main stations within each exchange. Zone rates for one and four-party charges within each exchange, which some customers pay in addition to their basic rates, will be increased. Other zone charges will remain the same or decrease. The extent of existing extended area service (EAS) will determine the amount of a supplemental charge to be added to the exchange local service and zone rate charges. The EAS supplemental charge will be applied in all exchanges having EAS. (EAS is not optional). Local exchange service customers will pay a separate charge for each telephone provided by the company in addition to the appropriate local service rate, zone rate (if applicable), and EAS supplemental charges (if applicable). Multi-party residence and business service and two-party business service will be eliminated. Certain base rate areas and zone areas within certain exchanges will be expanded. As proposed in the application, General Telephone Company of Ohio will offer only one, two, and four-party residence service, and one-party business service as local exchange services.

The average percentage changes in monthly rates for residence one-party, two-party, or four-party exchange service and for one-party business exchange service in representative communities, should the requested increase be granted in full, are shown below. Proposed rates for services in the company's 232 other exchanges are contained in the proposed tariff sheets which can be inspected as stated previously.

Nonrecurring Charges

The company proposes to restructure its service connection charges into a number of individual elements corresponding more closely to the work functions performed. Under the proposal, residence telephone service could be connected for the minimum nonrecurring charge of \$16.00 in a location where telephone service previously existed if the customer accepts the telephone instrument in place. If additional work functions were required, the maximum proposed charge for installation of residence service with one company provided telephone could be as much as \$33.00.

Systematic Reclassification

The company is proposing to systematically reclassify an exchange, assigning it to the next higher or lower exchange rate group, and thus raising or lowering the applicable local service or EAS supplemental charges for basic service, when the number of telephones which customers can call toll-free exceeds or drops below established limits for a specified period of time.

Optional Equipment and Services

Rates and charges for some optional equipment and services would be increased. The monthly charge for a company provided telephone will be \$1.50, the same as the current residence extension rate. There will no longer be a monthly customer credit for each telephone provided by a

customer. Varying increases are proposed for such options as two-line telephones with holding features, three-line telephones, sound booster handsets, speakerphones, cradlephones, and chestphones.

Paystation Telephone Service

The company proposes to increase the paystation rate from \$1.10 to \$2.00. The proposed rate for semi-public paystation service is a flat rate equal to the business one-party rate plus \$12.00, plus zone charges (if applicable). The existing credit against the flat rate for coin-in-box revenues generated will be discontinued.

Mobile Telephone Service

Proposed rates for mobile telephone service are broken into rates for items of equipment which range from \$2.00 to \$95.00 for monthly rates, and from \$20.00 to \$75.00 for nonrecurring charges, depending upon the item, and for the exchange access line furnished for all mobile telephone service. The proposed rate for the exchange access line is \$35.00.

Private Line Services (Special Circuits)

Increases are proposed for private line channels and associated equipment.

Centrex

Proposed rates for centrex CU service and for centrex CO service are restructured from present rates, but do not involve an increase in rates for this service which is offered only to existing customers.

Private Branch Exchange (PBX Services)

Rates for most manual and electromechanical PBX's would be increased substantially. For example, increases in the monthly rate for the common equipment associated with such PBX's would be \$66.00 for a Leich 40 PBX, \$105.00 for a Leich 80 PBX, and \$120.00 for a GTD-120 PBX.

Rates and charges for the GTD-1000 PBX would be increased. Significant increases are also proposed for installation and service charges for these PBX's.

Key Telephone Systems and Equipment

Rates and charges for the key telephone systems would be increased. For example, the proposed change in monthly rate for a six button key telephone set is an increase of \$3.00. Increases also are proposed for most optional features and equipment associated with these systems and sets.

Miscellaneous Products and Services

Increases in rates and charges are proposed for most of the miscellaneous products and services. Proposed rates and charges may be found in the company's proposed tariff sheets.

Flexible Pricing (Minimum Level Pricing)

The company is proposing minimum level pricing for certain communications systems and equipment. For such systems and equipment, rates and charges will be identified as a minimum level only. The maximum level of such rates and charges would be two times the minimum level. The applicable rates and charges which may be anywhere within the range of the minimum and the maximum levels would be covered in a price list furnished to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.

Not less than twenty days prior to the effective date of any changes in the rates and charges for such systems and equipment, the company would furnish to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio a new price list reflecting such changes in rates and charges.

Station Connection Expensing Adjustment

The company also is requesting permission to adjust its rates and charges on October 1, 1982, October 1, 1983, and October 1, 1984, to reflect increased expense to the company for performing the inside wiring portion of station connection work previously capitalized and charged to FCC Account No. 232.

The prayer of the application requests the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio to do the following:

- Find that the company's present rates and charges and the regulations and practices affecting the same are unjust, unreasonable and insufficient to yield reasonable compensation for the services rendered;
- Find that the rates and charges and regulations and practices proposed are just and reasonable and will provide not more than a fair and reasonable rate of return on the value of the company's property actually used and useful for the convenience of the public;
- Approve the filing of the proposed schedule sheets contained in Schedule E-1 of the application, modified to reflect such revisions thereof as may become effective, pursuant to orders of the Commission, during the interim between the filing of the application and the date upon which the schedule sheets become effective;
- Order that the proposed schedule sheets become effective forthwith;
- Approve the withdrawal of the present schedule sheets contained in Schedule E-2 of the application;
- Grant such other and further relief as the company is reasonably entitled to in the premises.

WHEREAS, keeping the economic situation and inflation rates in mind, the cost of purchasing and distributing electric power to the point where this Council must increase the rates charged to consumers; now therefore,
BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, 5 members thereof, that
Section 1. This Ordinance Nos. 8-76, 7-78, 18-79 and 2-80 and any provisions of any other legislation of the Village of Plymouth in conflict with any provision hereof shall be and are hereby repealed and the new electrical light and power Ordinance for the Village of Plymouth shall be and is hereby adopted as follows:
Section 2. A written application will be received from each customer before connecting such customer or transferring an account to his name, which application, when duly accepted by the Clerk of Utilities Department, shall constitute the agreement between the Customer and the Village.
Section 3. Where the application is not the property on which the electric service is to be used, a deposit of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) will be required of such applicant or his agent. The applicant is required to furnish good and sufficient freehold surety on said application which surety shall be required to sign a contract with the Village of Plymouth for the electric service. Suitable application forms shall be provided in accordance herewith by the clerk of the Village Utilities.
Section 4. Electric meters shall be read monthly and electric bills shall be rendered monthly and shall be payable at the Municipal Building Office, in the tariffs of the following sections. Bills become due and payable on the fifteenth day of the month of issuance and must be paid on or before the twentieth day of the month of issuance. Bills remaining unpaid after the fifteenth day of the month following service may be shut off without notice. When electricity is shut off for non-payment or other violations, it shall not be turned on again until the amount of all charges, plus penalty, is paid in full together with the cost of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) to reimburse the Municipal Electric Department for the expense sustained in shutting off the electricity. Failure to receive notice by mail shall not excuse consumers from paying the electric bill including any late charges. No person having a delinquent account with the Municipal Electric Department shall be given electric service at any other service location until all delinquent accounts have been paid in full. When the final payment date as hereinbefore specified falls on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, final payment date shall be extended to include the next regular working day.
Section 5. The wiring, apparatus and appliances on the premises of each customer shall be installed in accordance with the National Electric Code and conform to the rules and regulations that are in effect at the time of construction. The services rendered under the following tariffs include the delivery of energy and service to the customer's property. All service rendered to customer's equipment will be billed to the customer for labor and material required on the basis of cost plus ten percent at the time of service.
Section 6. The provisions of this Ordinance shall have retroactive application for the billing period commencing June 15, 1981.
Section 7. The Municipal Electric Department reserves the right to remove a meter from any premises and substitute another meter in its place as a permanent replacement or for the purposes of testing or repairing, without the consent of the consumer.
Section 8. Upon the request from an owner or consumer and agreement to pay the cost

charge, the Municipal Electric Department will remove any domestic meter to the meter shop for a test, upon consent of a third party. If the meter is found to be inaccurate, the five-dollar fee shall be credited to the customer's account.

For the first 60 k.w. hrs. used in any month, a minimum charge of \$3.00.
For the next 40 k.w. hrs. used in any month, \$.05 per k.w. hr. and all k.w. hrs. over 100 used in any month, \$.05 per k.w. hr. Minimum Charge

This tariff is subject to a minimum monthly charge of Three and 30/100 Dollars (\$3.30) for each meter installed, (for which the customer shall be entitled to use energy).
Delayed Payment Charges
This tariff is net if account is paid in full within five days of the date of billing. If accounts not so paid, an additional charge of ten percent of the amount of the bill, (not less than Five Dollars) will be made.

Section 10. Any overtime charges incurred (holidays, weekends, after regular working hours, etc.) due to the action of the customer, shall be billed to the customer or property owners. This includes, but is not limited to: faulty wires, breakers, fuses, circuit overloads, etc.

Section 11. The Village will furnish temporary service for \$15.00. Temporary service will be metered and billed at the prevailing rates. The developer will furnish, at his expense, all temporary structures necessary for the temporary power. The location of such structure will be my mutual agreement with the developer and the Village of Plymouth Electric Department.

Section 12. A security light may be furnished to the customer upon request at \$60.00 per month. The customer will be required to pay the cost of wire and mounting facilities such as extra poles. The Village will be responsible for furnishing and maintaining such lighting.
Section 13. Any material or construction requiring more than One Hundred twenty-five (125) feet of wire shall be billed to the customer at the Village's cost for labor and material. These additional costs may include, but are not limited to: Poles, clamps, guy wires, cost of underpinning, trenching, and overhead wire and additional transformers. The customer shall furnish all masting, weatherheads, and proper ties to the Village service lines both to and from the meter base.

Section 14. Underground installations will be by mutual agreement and the developer shall pay to the Village an amount equal to the estimated difference in cost between the overhead and underground facilities. The developer will provide all trenching and backfilling consistent with the installation. Trenching and installation will not be scheduled when ground is frozen or wet.

Section 15. The developer or customer will provide all necessary easements for the installation, operation, and maintenance of the facilities including underground service, poles, transformers and high voltage lines.
Section 16. That all meetings and hearings concerning the adoption of this Ordinance have been in compliance with the Revised Code Section 121.22.
Section 17. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare for the reason that the establishment of a uniform rate ordinance is necessary for the continued operation of the Municipal Electric Department.

Section 18. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its passage by law, in conjunction with the provisions of Section 6 herein set forth above.
