Ex-villagers coordinating Nevada's 'Marriage day'

Nevada's governor and the mayor of Las Vegas proclaim St. Valentine's Day, Sunday, as "We Believe in Marriage" day in Nevada and Las Vegas.

And two former Plymouthites, Wayne Kessler and his wife, the former Marcia MacMichael, are coordinators of the event.

"Valentine's day provides a traditional day of romance for thousands of Nevada couples," says Governor List. "It is a fitting occasion to promote the special relationship that exists between husband and wife, particularly since married couples provide one of the greatest social resources in the country today."

The "We Believe in Marriage Day" campaign was organized by Worldwide Marriage Encounter, the largest pro-marriage organization in the world, according to the Wayne Kesslers.

Norwalkian in running

A 40-year-old Norwalk businessman will seek the Republican nomination for representative to the new 80th Ohio House of Representatives district.

Richard E. Rench has served as Republican finance chairman in both Erie and Huron counties. He is currently serving on both the Huron county central and executive committees.

In 1980 Rench was elected alternate delegate for the 17th Congressional district to the Republican national convention as a Reagan delegate. Later in the year Rench was chosen to head the Huron county campaign of both Ronald Reagan and

veteran of Air Force service. He practices in Norwalk, where his wife if guidance counselor in Norwalk High school.

He is village solicitor in Monroville and Walkman. A Norwalk attorney who earlier made an unsuccessful bid to be Huron county prosecutor will seek the GOP nomination to run for commissioner in November.

Michael R. Fegen is so far the only Republican with his hat in the ring. There are signs that Walter J. Wilhelm, 43, North Fairfield, a former Plymouth resident, may run. He was unsuccessful in the GOP primary in 1980.

The winner will oppose the incumbent, Maurice Smith, who is completing his 12th year as commissioner.

A second GOP candidate for county commissioner has told the board of elections he wants to run.

He is William L. Ommert, Norwalk route 1.

Milford G. Gayheart, Plymouth, was fined \$100 and court costs in Norwalk Municipal court on a charge of assault and sentenced to 30 days in jail.

He also was fined \$150 for petty theft and sentenced to another 30 days in jail, which was suspended.

Robber pleads guilty

A 32-year-old Mansfield man pleaded guilty in federal district court Feb. 2 to robbing the Shiloh branch of First Bankers Bank, N.A., at gunpoint on Oct. 17, 1980.

Wendell O. Gibbs, 582 Springfield street, is held under \$250,000 bond pending a pre-sentence investigation ordered by Judge Manos in Cleveland.

He admitted he robbed the bank of \$35,004. He faces a sentence of 25 years and/or a \$10,000 fine.

Gibbs is subject to additional penalty because he failed to appear and defaulted on a \$75,000 bond to stand trial Feb. 23. He is also under indictment on charges he robbed a bank at Franklin Furnace on July 23 of \$37,049.

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Vredenburg resigns post as school board member

In a surprise move Monday night, Larry O. Vredenburg submitted his resignation as a member of the Plymouth Board of Education.

"Gentlemen: Please accept my resignation, effective upon finding a replacement or April 1, 1982."

"I have no problem with the Board or Administrative relationship. It has been better than I could have expected."

"The problem seems to be with a couple of relatives and very few people who for the last three years have contributed my children's

accomplishments in sports or any activity to the fact that I am on the School Board. I can understand that this may be expected, but I cannot handle it, and my son or daughter should not have to."

"Thank you, 'Larry O. Vredenburg'." Apparently he had discussed it with the board president, the Rev. Arthur Hamman, but the other board members seemed unaware of it.

Mrs. Roger Pugh did not want to act upon the resignation, saying the board should "get the book out

to see what procedures are necessary to accept it and choose a new member." Her motion to table it went unseconded.

Douglas Staggs, superintendent, recommended the board act immediately because of the time element in finding and screening a new member before Apr. 1.

Donald M. Echelbarger made the formal motion to accept the resignation. Mrs. Pugh voted nay. A special meeting will be Feb. 25 at 7:30 p.m.

Staggs is to investigate if the board can have it as an executive session.

Playschool for toddlers to open Feb. 17

Vocational home economics department of Plymouth High school will have a play school for preschool children as part of a child development unit.

The play school will be Feb. 17, 19, 23, 25, 26 and Mar. 2 from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m.

There will be a \$3 charge for the play school. Parents will be responsible for bringing the children to Home Economics Room 108 between 7:45 and 7:50 a.m. and picking them up immediately afterward at 9:30 a.m.

All children in the school must be three, four, or young five-year-olds, toilet trained, able to see mother leave without too much difficulty and free of colds, infections, rashes and other symptoms of contagious infections.

If late and costs are marked, it will help to identify each child's clothing.

Any parent may call Plymouth High school at 687-4081 Mrs. Clinton J. Benchid, the number of children is limited to 15 and will be selected on a first-come basis.

FFA to get used tractor, board rules

Plymouth Chapter, Future Farmers of America, will get a new used tractor.

The board of education approved spending of \$1,850 for a 1966 International 706 to replace the Model 460 made in 1950.

Todd Arnold, Loren Kranz and Gary Adams, chapter members, made the convincing pitch to the board, stating the later model would not cost any more to run and would do more work in less time.

The Rev. Arthur Hamman, board president, asked how they would finance the purchase and was told the chapter has \$4,941 in the bank now and can plan on another \$4,200 when the corn and beans now in storage are sold. Of that sum, \$5,000 will be needed for putting out this year's crops.

Hamman complimented the pupils and their adviser, Keith Johnson, for doing a "good job."

\$5.9 million increase in profit for Banner

Increases in earnings and revenues for the second quarter and the first six months of its fiscal year, ending Dec. 31, are reported by Banner Industries, Inc., parent firm of Plymouth Locomotive Works, Inc.

Banner said second quarter earnings by its aviation retailing and industry products groups offset an increased operating deficit by its motor freight division.

Net sales for the quarter to Dec. 31 amounted to \$53,987,032, as compared with \$48,252,734 a year ago. Net income for the period was \$564,338, as compared to a loss of \$5,381,155. The latter figure was affected by a writedown of motor carrier operating rights amounting to \$5,689,492.

Income per share for the quarter was 14 cents, compared with a loss of \$1.34 a year ago.

The six month figures are stronger. On net sales \$106,771,780, net income was \$1,432,798, amounting to 36 cents a share. A year ago, net sales were \$100,172,737, net loss was \$35,927,267, equivalent to a loss of 88 cents a share.

Weighted grades approved

Approval of a weighted grading system was accorded Monday by Plymouth Board of Education.

Pupils taking the easier courses were receiving the same grade points as those taking the more difficult ones, the schools say. This now gives the extra credit to the latter group.

The board also agreed to hire Safeway Driving school, Elyria, to conduct the driving classes for several schools during the 1982-83 school year.

Supt. Douglas Staggs suggested it last month as a means of saving money. Even with this, it is costing the school \$80.92 for each pupil enrolled in the class.

The state reimburses the district \$50 for each pupil and a fee of \$20 is charged to each pupil, leaving \$10.92 to be paid for from the school's general fund.

Staggs' recommendation was that the classroom work be done during the school day, which fits in with class schedules, and that only the driving part be farmed out.

The Elyria firm will charge \$73 a pupil, which will be raised to \$23 to cover the costs, thus eliminating any draw on general school funds.

Having the classroom work in the school will give credit to pupils toward graduation.

Staggs said he investigated three driving schools and that the school will give credit to pupils toward graduation. The Norwalk schools are the nearest one to Plymouth using the Elyria firm.

The board agreed with the commercial firm for a year.

Staggs told the board he was "very frustrated and still in the dark" over school finances and fear has not received any information from the state department on how much will be cut in state funding.

The district receives 70 per cent of its funds from the state.

The appropriations for the year must by law be completed by Apr. 1.

Approval was given to hiring two substitute cleaners, Wade Kinzel and Delmar Nesbitt.

The schools have received an offer from Charles A. Arms, Arms Industries, which manufactures three wheel vehicles, to purchase the Shiloh annex.

The building would be used for office space. Presently it is being used for storage.

Purchased in 1966 when more classrooms were needed, the remodeling and cost of the property was \$32,000.

The school owns the property outright, but it cannot be sold privately unless two public auctions are legally conducted.

The board agreed with Staggs that the first move would be to have the buildings appraised.

If the building is sold, the proceeds, according to law, would go into a permanent improvement fund.

Schools target of study

Plymouth Local school district has been chosen as one of three school systems in the state and as of 21 in an eight-state area for a special study of federal programs and their impact on local programs.

A Columbia firm has been hired by the U. S. Department of Education to make the study.

Columbus and Warren are the other two systems in the state.

Today: Hamburger and spaghetti, bread and butter or cornbread, tossed salad, peaches, milk.

Tomorrow: Turkey sandwich, potato chips, buttered peas, Valentine cake, milk.

Monday: No classes.

Tuesday: Hamburger and rigatoni, bread and butter or cornbread, salad, peach or pear slices, milk.

Wednesday: Hot submarine sandwiches, corn or Harvard boots, Fruit Delight, cookie, milk.

Mix a half pound of margarine or butter, two cups of flour and a half cup of powdered sugar until it is crumbly.

Press it into the baking dish. Bake for 15 minutes at 350.

Pour this mixture over it: four well-beaten eggs, four tablespoons of lemon juice, a teaspoon of baking powder and four tablespoons of flour.

Bake for 25 minutes, and when it is finished, sprinkle powdered sugar over it.

If you want to be more elaborate and most likely more popular with your family, try this chocolate date.

Melt over heat a 12 oz. package of chocolate chips, a fourth of a cup of powdered sugar, six tablespoons of cold coffee, a tablespoon of rum extract, a tablespoon of mace and a fourth of a teaspoon of salt. Stir until it is dissolved, then add three beaten egg yolks.

Beat the three leftover egg whites until stiff and fold in.

and beat two cups of whipping cream and fold it all in.

Meanwhile, have a 22 oz. package of angel food cake baked. Tear it into pieces, and fold it in too.

Chill over night or all day in a good looking bowl. To perk it up a little, sprinkle some colored sugar over the top.

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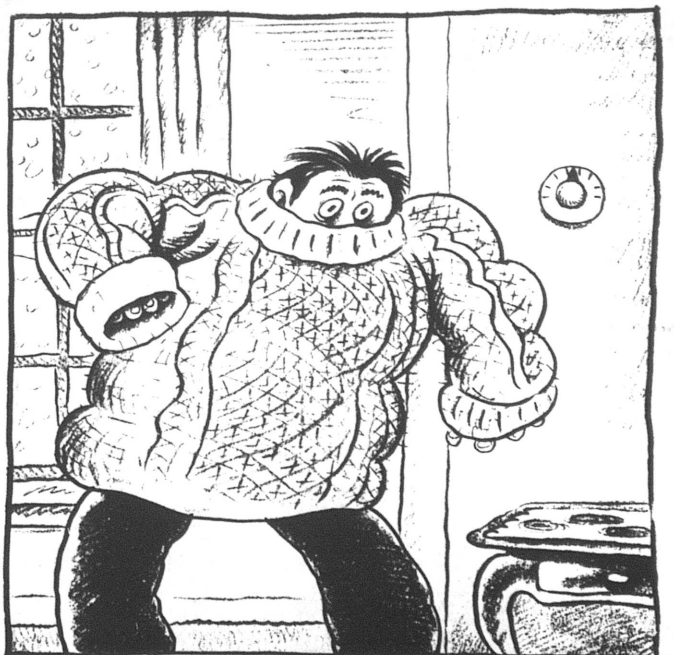
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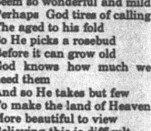
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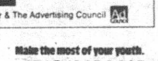
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
