

'Finances precarious but good through '82'

"We can probably make it through 1982 but unless things change drastically, we'll have to face a new levy in 1983," Supt. Douglas Staggs told Plymouth Board of Education Monday night during a review of the critical financial situation.

He said Plymouth Local School district will lose \$141,915.82 as a result of the 8.9 per cent reduction in state funds during the current fiscal year.

Appropriations for 1982 were approved on his recommendation. They show earmarkings of \$43,768 less in the general fund than last year.

These appropriations are \$2,249,561.87 in the general fund, \$24,106 in Title IV, for special education; \$51,139 in Title I; \$43,548 in permanent improvements; \$4,864 in Titles IVB and IVC; \$15,556 in the farm fund; \$19,000 for guidance services; \$150,306 for food services; \$13,074 for uniform supplies and \$183,235 for bond retirement.

An outstanding bond issue, amounting to under \$27,000, will be settled this year.

Staggs said the appropriations, worked out by him and the treasurer, Mrs. Frederick E. Ford, are "minimal appropriations, there's no fact, they'll allow us to

continue the program we have now with a few cuts."

One reason why costs are going up, Staggs said is the higher expense of heating. In two months, he said, the school spent for natural gas half of what was spent during all of last year.

Valuation of the district, Staggs said, is \$36,690,358.

He called on board members and patrons of the district to bombard legislators with written and oral appeals to "address the problem; they're not doing it because they're so bound up with the elections in November."

A calendar for 1982-83 was adopted. It varies only slightly from the county calendar.

First day of classes will be Aug. 31. Labor day, Sept. 6, will be a holiday. A teacher in-service day will take place Oct. 8. Thanksgiving recess will be Nov. 25-26. Christmas recess Dec. 23-Jan. 3. Martin Luther King, Jr., day will be observed Jan. 17. Presidents' day on Feb. 21 will be a holiday. Easter recess will be Mar. 31-Apr. 4. Memorial day, on May 30, will be a holiday. Last pupil day will be June 1.

Keith Diebler was hired as assistant baseball coach at \$429 for the season.

A change in the elementary

reading program was presented by Mark Sheely, principal of Plymouth Elementary school. The change was recommended by a committee of teachers and administrators and two patrons, Mmes. Bil Young and John Echelberry.

The board took the recommendation under advisement and will decide at the Apr. 12 meeting. Cost factor for the first year, Sheely said, will be \$6,274.19, of which \$1,943.40 will be paid by pupils.

Pre-school registration for kindergartners and first graders will be conducted in Plymouth Mar. 31 and in Shiloh Apr. 2, the board was told. The Rev. Arthur Hamman, president, was absent.

California battery of tests for pupils in grades two, four, six and eight are about to begin, Sheely told the board.

James Craycraft, principal of the high school, said today will be parent visitation day. If a pupil's parent, guardian or close friend reports in his stead, the pupil will be excused for the day. The surrogate will attend the pupil's classes, which will not be altered because of his attendance, and must turn in the assignment for the day and relay the assignment for the next day to the pupil.

Joe Irelan was hired as custodian in Plymouth Elementary school.

Births exceed deaths by 434

Births exceeded deaths in Huron county during 1981 by 434 persons, Dr. Howard C. Sparks, health commissioner, says in his annual report.

Births numbered 412 males, 377 females, of whom 545 were born at Norwalk, 236 at Willard and eight elsewhere.

Deaths numbered 365, of whom 217 were recorded at Norwalk, 102 at Willard and 46 elsewhere.

Main cause of death was cardiovascular disease, to-

talling 222. There were 69 cancer deaths, 28 of respiratory diseases, 11 as the result of accident or collision, five by homicide or suicide, four from diseases of early infancy and 30 from other causes.

Persons aged 80 to 89 comprised the largest number of deaths, 118. Those 70 to 79 numbered 85, those 60 to 69 numbered 85, those 50 to 59 numbered 39. Persons over 90 who died amounted to 29.

On appointments

Plymouth Board of Education took action Monday night to postpone notification of extra-curricular assignments to certificated staff until after Apr. 1.

It did so on recommendation of the superintendent, who said the decisions on supplementary contracts may require some consultation before they are revealed. He ticked off what decisions they are, without singling any of them for special notice. What it amounts to is that almost all of the extra-curricular assignments (read athletic coaching) will be held in abeyance until the board can sit down and reason together as to how it should proceed.

Perhaps the board will wish to consult with a full membership, in which case it will have to do so after Apr. 12, when it says it will appoint a successor to Mr. Vredenburg.

Has any harm been done? We think not. Neither to teacher-cum-coach nor to the public.

Save the fact that it ought not to be so overpowered a consideration that whether John Doe or Max Soe coaches one team or another is more important than 13 pupils being tapped by the National Honor society (and how many attended that ceremony, by comparison with a basketball game?) or that the board is considering installation of a new reading program (and what is more important than reading) in the elementary grades. It may be helpful to point out that except for a teacher and two likely candidates for appointment to the school board, Monday's meeting was attended by three others, all members of the Fourth Estate.

A 48-year-old Shelbion admitted in federal court in Cleveland Mar. 1 that he aided and abetted the robbery of First Buckeye Bank, N.A., at Shiloh Oct. 17, 1980.

Cecil H. Oney, will be sentenced after a presentence investigation is complete, Judge John Manos said.

Oney and Wendell Odell Gibbs, 32, Mansfield, were charged with robbing the bank of \$38,004.

The FBI said Gibbs entered the bank alone and Oney drove the getaway car. Gibbs, Oney and possibly a third suspect escaped after abandoning the car in a field south of Shiloh.

This is living end: collect sugar packets?

For years I thought I was simply wise about what things can be real collectible things. Silver, coins, stamps, diaries, bottles, the list is endless.

But something new has been added: This I discovered in a magazine I happen to see a week ago and simply could not believe it. Little packages of sugar.

This can open a whole new world. Everyone drinks coffee and all you have to do is say you need some sugar, and many places will hand you little packets of it.

You can do two birds with one packet, save the little envelope and put the sugar in a container. Granted it may take a lot of cups of coffee, but maybe you will end up with enough sugar to make one recipe of jelly.

We can — maybe most of us, anyway — remember when milk came in bottles. I really cannot remember, but I think they were returned when new filled bottles arrived. No doubt many simply got thrown out, but that is now a big collecting area.

Who in the world back then would even think of saving one?

Every time I throw out a jar, I stop and say to myself, "Should this be saved for 50 years from now for our grandchildren?"

This thinking can kin of overcrowd your house and really drive you out of your mind.

You can be practical about it. Just get a nice big box and start stashing this and that, like an empty bottle of catsup or peanut butter.

I am willing to bet that maybe in 10 years or so such every day things will be worth a mint. Look at the Avon bottles. Over the years I bought the stuff here and there because a friend was

selling it. It got used, and out went the container.
Anyone who was a bride in the 1940's must remember what was called flauta wares, brightly colored bowls.

Like everyone else we had a set of three, and naturally over the years one by one got broken.

I suspect the way to be assured that you will leave a good bunch of antiques to your children is to simply go out and buy this and that to save and never use.

If old radios are making it today as antiques, just give an electric frying pan a few years. Another thing that is really available is some of the fancy catalogues we all get in the mail. I could really kick myself for not saving some of them. I either threw them out or gave them away. Start another box and save the ones you get now. Really old Sears and Ward's catalogues are the thing to some people.

I once heard some man from the Ford museum in Dearborn say they are now saving current things that they will put on display in years to come because by

then they will be real museum pieces.
Food is the one thing you do not save. You cook it, eat it and somehow must come out even though your water and sewer bill goes up.

Just try this little mixture. You will enjoy it coming and going.

It will serve six very nicely. Open a can of pineapple chunks, a pound and four ounces can. Manage to get six canned peach halves and five of pears and 24 melon balls, which may be fresh or frozen, and right now must be frozen. Put them all together in a bowl.

Then mix a cup of brown sugar with a half cup of sweetish white wine, a fourth of a cup of cider vinegar, 15 whole cloves and two sticks of cinnamon. Throw in a pinch of curry. Cook it up, pour it over the fruit and chill it.

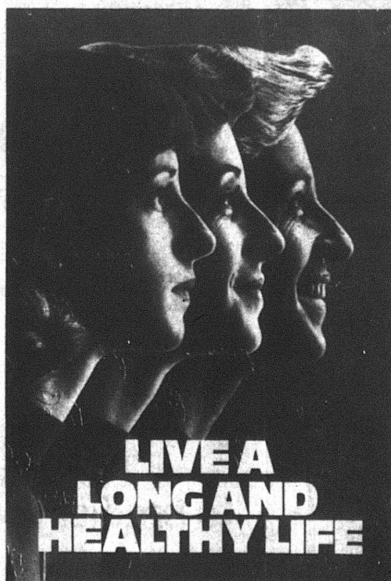
