A highway trooper in Missouri found 39 "objectional words" in the American Heritage Dictionary.

In Anaheim, Cal., books taken off the list approved for instruction include "Silas Marner," all of Shakespeare save "Hamlet" and "Romeo and Juliet," all of Charles Dickens but "Oliver Twist" and Margaret Mitchell's American classic, "Gone With the Wind".

Copies of these volumes and some others that have been banned at one place or another are part of the American Library Association traveling exhibit.

Some of the others include Ira Levin's "Rosemary's Baby," Ken Kesey's "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest," Bernard Malamud's "The Fixer" and J. D. Salinger's "The Catcher in the Rye".

One would wish that such an exhibit could be brought to Plymouth. Not to encourage any prurient interest (and truth to tell, it's a long time since we read, and committed Portia's soliloquy to memory, "The Merchant of Venice"), but when we were 14 years old, life was a lot slower than it is today and mores were substantially stricter, yet there was no one, absolutely no one, in that community who objected that "The Merchant of Venice" was obscene, or prurient, or vulgar, or Communist, or especially offensive racially, including the large and important Jewish community) but to seek to show the young, and particularly the young, that their elders don't know it all. Not by a long shot.

In Genesis 38:9 one finds reference to a man called Onan that would be out at most dinner tables, even in the bosom of the family.

Which is not to say, perish the thought, that the sacred book isn't all it ought to be, or that it should be banned.

What needs to be said is that the witch hunters who would ban, or burn, books, or clothe statues in the Toledo Museum of Art, or censor magazines need to consult a psychiatrist.

Nobody in the course of human history has ever satisfactorily proved that examination of scatological or prurient pictures or texts produces commensurate behavior.

Price too high, buyer balks; school annex won't be sold

An appraisal of \$28,400 on the annex at Shiloh is too steep for the prospective buyer, Plymouth Board of Education was told Mar. 23, and no effort to sell the building at auction will be undertaken, the board ruled.

John Hedeon, a realtor, appraised the property at that figure, plus or minus 10 per cent.

The prospective buyer has said he is not anxious to buy at that price.

Supt. Douglas Staggs told the board there is no need to solicit the services of an auctioneer and to

pay for advertising unless there is vigorous interest. It does not cost much to sit as, Staggs said. The building is used for storage. It stands at the northeast corner of Main and Mechanic streets.

Nine seek nomination in new 90th

Not much competition for Huron county seats on the board of county commissioners will appear on the June 8 ballot.

Michael Fegen, Norwalk attorney, dropped out of the GOP race. He did not file a nominating petition.

William Ommert, Norwalk, and Walter Wilhelm, Jr., North Fairfield, an unsuccessful candidate last time around, are the GOP nominees.

Incumbent Maurice Smith, Democrat, New London, has no opposition.

Neither does James Westendorf, a Norwalk radio station manager, who filed as an independent.

Hottest competition will be for the nomination to seek the new 90th district seat in the Ohio House.

Five Republicans and four Democrats have filed nominating petitions.

Republicans are Richard Rench, Milan, a realtor, previously a candidate in Huron county and its legislative district; Robert (Mac) Morrison, Bucyrus, high school principal in Colonel Crawford district in North Robinson, who will retire from education; Paul Cappel, Willard, where he is a teacher; Marian Meyer, Bellevue, chairman of the Bellevue GOP committee, and Trina White, Norwalk.

Democrats are Gene Slagle, Gallon, formerly a representative and a senator from this legislative district; May or Paulette Ritchey, Gallon; John Allison, Norwalk, county Democratic chairman, and Robert Casey, Gallon, a school teacher.

They're sopaipillas and they're delicious!

Have you ever eaten something really out of this world either in a friend's house or a restaurant and forgotten to ask for the recipe?
You really should carry a piece of paper and a pencil with you every time.
I could kick myself for not remembering the name of a Chinese beef dish we had in San Francisco. As a result, we have gone through a lot of beef trying to figure it out. Once we had the year of veal. That was back when you could buy it, and I worked and worked trying to duplicate what we could order in a nice place in Akron and finally won. Frankly, I thought my version was tastier than theirs.
When we were in Denver for the holidays, our children took us to a fantastic Mexican place. Some architect must have designed it while sipping a case of scotch. It was a real fun place for families. They had puppet shows for kids and kind of a stage show for adults. Should you go to Denver, simply ask where that Mexican place is, and everyone will know.
It was very efficiently run, sort of like a cafeteria. There were perhaps three choices of what to eat. The tables were set so you were isolated from the others, and if you wanted a waiter, you raised a little flag, and bingo, one appeared from nowhere.
Mexican food is really good, but sometimes a little can go a long way.
I really had never eaten it until the second Christmas we went to California. It started when we met an old school friend, who took us to a lovely place which really impressed me, and I thought that as soon as I got home, we would get into this cookery.
After five such meals in a week, I had had it.
The last one was in Los Angeles. A dear friend whom we had always suspected was a little on the gay side took us to what he said was the best place in the world to eat. He is still a good friend. He was the guy who moved me and the kids from one house to another in Ethiopia when I was flat out with typhus fever and so sick I could not raise my head.
After a few minutes, our daughter looked at me and said, "Mom, we are the only women in this place." I will say that they did have a nice ladies' room.
He served with most anything.
They are called sopaipillas.
Mix a cup and half of flour with two teaspoons of double acting baking powder and a dash of salt. Work in two Now I have finally found a recipe for a little tidbit that is served with Mexican meals, and it is good. Actually it can be served with most anything with your fingers so it gets crumbly.
